

71 REACH SUMMIT OF MIDDLE SISTER ON OBSIDIAN TRIP

Seventy-one persons reached the top of the Middle Sister Sunday, in the largest party ever taken up a mountain by the Eugene Obsidian club. Cliff Stalsberg, president of the club, was leader of the party.

The climb was started from the base camp near Camp Scott at 9 o'clock Sunday morning. The group went up the north slope of the mountain, traveling most of the way on snow. At one point, near the summit, it was necessary to cut steps in the icy snow a distance of about 100 feet. Ropes were used at this point.

Add to them an equal weight of fine powdered white sugar and the white of two eggs; work the paste well together with the back of a spoon. Then dip your hands in water, and roll the preparation in balls the size and shape of a nutmeg, and lay them on a sheet of paper, the distance of at least an inch apart; when all are done, dip your hands in water, and pass them gently over the macaroons. This will make their surface smooth and shining. Put them in a cool oven and close it; in three quarters of an hour they are done.

If this recipe is strictly followed, there can be no failure, and the macaroons will be found equal to any made by professional confectioners.—Mrs. Eugene B. Tinker, Rt. 1, Creswell.

Suet Pudding

1 cupful whole suet chopped.
2 cups flour
1 teaspoonful salt
2 teaspoonful baking powder
Sift flour, salt and baking powder together. Put suet in dry ingredients thoroughly. Place in cloth bag and steam for three hours. One cupful of raisins may be added if desired. Serve plain or with any pudding sauce desired.

Frosted Creams

2 eggs
1 cup shortening
1 teaspoon soda
1 cup molasses
1 cup sugar
2 tablespoon ginger
1 cup sour milk

Method—Cream shortening, beat in sugar till light. Add well beaten eggs, yolks, and molasses and ginger. Stir soda in milk and add to other ingredients. Add enough flour to make a pretty stiff dough that can be handled without sticking. Flour the bottom of a large bread pan and roll dough out on the bottom of the pan to about 1-3 inch thickness, trim off edges. Bake in hot oven about 15 or 20 minutes. When done cut with a knife in squares before removing from bottom of pan.

Election Cake

The traditional "Election Cake" is dark, rich, spicy and fruity. A combination that no man ever could resist from Hamilton and Jefferson days on down. So if modern women feel inclined to carry on after the fashion of yesterday, they must bake an "Election Cake" at least a week before the great day. "Oregon Trail Week." Here's the way to do it:

One yeast cake
1 cup lukewarm water
1 tablespoon granulated sugar
2 teaspoons salt
1 tablespoon lard
4 cups flour
2 cups brown sugar
3 eggs

1 cup of seeded raisins
1 cup shredded citron
1 teaspoon nutmeg
1 tablespoon cinnamon
1 teaspoon clove
2 tablespoon lemon juice
1½ teaspoon soda
1 cup butter.

Dissolve yeast cake in lukewarm water. Add lard, sugar, salt and 2 cups flour. Mix thoroughly and let stand in a warm place over night (or 6 to 8 hours). Then cream butter and slowly beat in brown sugar, beating until creamy. Add ½ cup flour and mix thoroughly. Add eggs well beaten. Add raisins, citron, lemon juice. Add sponge or yeast mixture to cake mixture. Dissolve soda in a little warm water and beat into batter. Mix and sift remaining flour with spices and stir into mixture. Mix thoroughly and turn into buttered and floured deep cake pans. Cover with a lid or cloth and let stand in a warm place until double in bulk. Bake 1 hour in a moderate oven.

This cake can be frosted but the fruit makes a frosting unnecessary. I like the addition of a cup of chopped pecans or English walnuts to this cake.—L. E. McNeese, 1005 West 7th, Eugene.

HITLER TERROR STORY

cellor, bitter conservative critic of some of the Nazi methods, had become a question of burning moment in Germany when his friend and patron, President Von Hindenburg, gave his blessing to Chancellor Hitler today.

"Blessings on You Little Man" The president from his retreat in Neudeck where he is lying ill telegraphed the chancellor:

"You have saved the German people from serious dangers. I express to you my deep thanks and gratitude, with cordial regards."

So far as was known to the general public, Von Papen was still forbidden to leave his apartment adjoining Hitler's. Several of his close collaborators were dead.

Those executed in Saturday's ruthless "liquidation" of Nazi extremists and rightists opposed to the Nazi regime, included Werner Von Alvensleben, Von Papen's close friend. The vice chancellor's adjutant, Friedrich Von Tschirsky, was reported to have committed suicide. Von Papen's secretary, Hubert Von Bose, was said to have gone the same way.

Others close to Von Papen were said to have been given the alternative of doing away with themselves or facing the firing squad.

It was apparent to all that Hitler and his chief adjutant, Hermann Wilhelm Goerring, were, in the present situation at least, firmly in the saddle.

With principal leaders of the opposition already dead and other shootings rumored hourly, opposing forces had no directing heads to lead them into action.

Government buildings were still heavily guarded by police today and police with rifles walked the streets.

Berlin was going about its business, but the atmosphere was still tensely charged as rumors floated back and forth through the streets.

France Blamed Again In these rumors, France emerged as the "mysterious foreign power" which Hitler charged Saturday with having been in communication with the conspirators against him.

The French embassy denied flatly that the French government had any connection with the conspiracy, but the rumors continued in circulation.

Among the kaleidoscopic developments was the arrest of Major Muelner von Muelheim, for many years adjutant to the former Crown Prince Friedrich Wilhelm who was taken into custody because of his known friendship for General Kurt von Schleicher. The latter, former chancellor and firm monarchist, was killed "resisting arrest" Saturday.

Lane Grand Jury In Session Monday

The work of the grand jury was lightened somewhat when James Ward decided to waive indictment and trial on a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon.

PEIPING, July 2.—(AP)—The explosion of a bomb on the Peiping-Mukden railroad line, killing six Chinese and injuring 15 others, was revealed today. Diplomats feared Japan would seize the line and precipitate a serious international situation.

WASHINGTON, July 2.—(AP)—Faced with reports of continued dry weather with extreme heat over the drought area the farm administration was expected today to urge its purchasing agents to speed cattle buying and expand the program to include sheep. About 300,000 head of cattle

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have been purchased in addition to the 500,000 which have been shipped to packing plants. The 300,000 are being held on farms or at concentration points awaiting disposal.

WASHINGTON, July 2.—(AP)—The treasury announced today it would advertise in a few days for bids and sites for postoffices and other public buildings to be constructed at Grants Pass, McMinville and Newberg, Oregon.

WASHINGTON, July 2.—(AP)—NRA still had not received a signed letter of Blue Eagle compliance from Henry Ford today, though a local dealer indicated his intention to bid on approximately \$2,500,000 of war department contracts.

WASHINGTON, July 2.—(AP)—Joseph P. Kennedy, New York financier today was chosen chairman of the new securities and exchange commission after a two hour conference among the democratic members of the commission. Recora may resign as a result.

ROSEBURG, July 2.—(AP)—Alvess Cranson, 50, resident of Roseburg for the past 54 years, died here Sunday as the result of heart failure. He was one of Roseburg's principal property owners, and held extensive land interests in eastern Oregon and Canada.

SALEM, July 2.—(AP)—Jack Dalton, sentenced to 10 years in the state penitentiary from Klamath county, April 25, 1930, for assault and robbery, was granted a pardon today by Governor Julius L. Meier on condition that he go to Davisville to live with relatives. An outright pardon was issued to Stephen Clink, sentenced to two years in the penitentiary from Lincoln county for burglary.

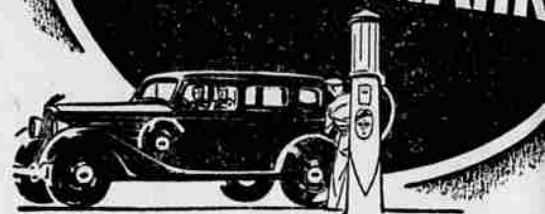
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
