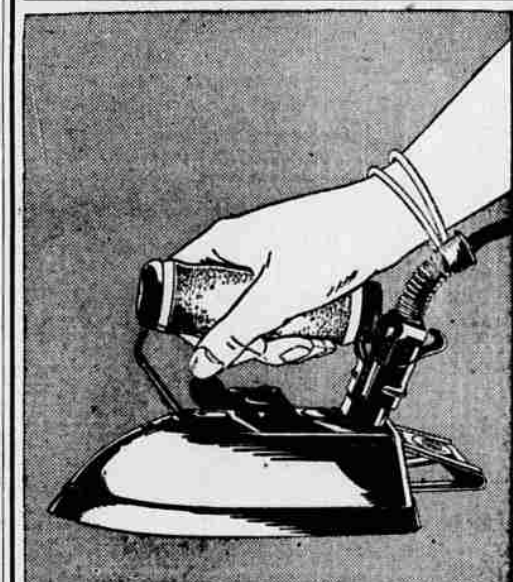

Long-Haul Truckers Granted Increases
PORTLAND, Ore., July 2.—(AP)—
 Union long-distance truck drivers struck Sunday, but employers acceded to their demands and by night practically all had returned to work.

The strike, long expected but delayed, according to H. W. Dail, secretary of the union, because of the longshoremen's strike, was called to ask for wage increases of 20 per cent and improvement in working conditions.
There were a few small companies holding out, but settlement with these was expected during the day, and there was little likelihood of any appreciable tie-up in truck traffic.

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
