

LIONS HEAR TALK BY H. L. EDMUNDS

Harold L. Edmunds, president of the United States National Bank, was the principal speaker for the luncheon of the Lions club Tuesday noon at the Eugene hotel. The meeting was held a day early due to the Fourth of July holiday. Mr. Edmunds spoke on the "Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation" giving a very enlightening and interesting talk. The speaker reviewed the history of banking beginning with the fifteenth century when Italian businessmen had institutions similar to the later banking houses. An interesting observation was the fact that the first paper money was used in China and it became necessary to discontinue this and return to coins since there were so many clever forgers. The history of banking in our country was traced beginning in the fifties and sixties when all money was loaned on the banker's own capital. As deposits increased around the latter part of the century loans were made both on the wealth of the banker and the deposits.

Mr. Edmunds elaborated on the provisions of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation saying that it guaranteed deposits up to \$2500 and has been extended to another year and will guarantee deposits up to \$5000. He voiced the benefits of the deposit insurance showing that it has put more money in circulation greatly benefiting business, and a decided dropping off in postal savings has been noted since the insurance plan.

The plan has a capital of \$200,000,000 with the government subscribing \$150,000,000, \$70,000,000 by member banks of the plan. About 14,800 banks in the country are participating.

Miss Violet Pearl Nelson played a saxophone solo and Mrs. Martin gave a reading. A. A. Reid was supervisor for the program and R. M. Calkins, city attorney, introduced the speaker.

A committee from the club assisted at the flag raising ceremonies at Eighth and Willamette street immediately following the luncheon to celebrate the lead of the group's candidate in the Oregon Trail Queen contest. Four new members have been approved for membership and will be initiated at the luncheon Wednesday, July 11.

Murders are Legalized
The cabinet in its session passed a brief, laconically phrased law making legal the shooting of the past few days. The law said:
Measures adopted to quell the highly treasonable attack of June 30 and July 1 and 2 are legal because they were undertaken as measures for the protection of the state when in danger, ("statu non est.")

Minister of Justice Franz Guertner added that these measures not only were justified by law but must be looked upon as a statesman's duty.

The cabinet further decided that the chief of the storm troopers will no longer be a member of the cabinet. Some 20 other laws were passed, but these had to do with purely domestic matters not affected by the present situation.

FREDDIE SAFE?

BERLIN, July 3.—(AP)—Reports circulated in Amsterdam that the former crown prince had been expelled from Germany were branded "nonsensical" by the Hohenzollern administration here today, the Exchange Telegraph news service reported.

While saying that the crown prince was not in Berlin, the administration was insistent upon denying that he had been expelled from the country.

maash fine with wooden potato masher. Then add one pound of sugar for each pound of fruit and boil about 15 to 20 minutes longer. Watch carefully, so it doesn't burn. Then spread the mass very thin on a flat tin or platter to dry. During the day put out of doors in the sun (under netting) to dry, but bring in at night. Several days are required in drying. Then cut in strips roll in sugar. Store in tin boxes or crocks, tightly covered, store in a cool dry place.

Homemade Hominy
(For Wheat or Corn)
To one quart clean grain take one tablespoon baking soda cover with water; boil one-half hour; then remove from fire and wash through several baths of cold water or until the outer skin comes off the grain. Then boil in clear water one hour. It is ready to serve. It is good fried in bacon fryings or butter.—Mrs. J. A. Adkins, R. 1, Junction City.

Indian Bread
For a large loaf take 3 pints of sifted Indian meal, 3 pints of rye meal, one teaspoon of good hop yeast, one teaspoon molasses. Mix very soft with warm water, pour into your bread pan, in which you are going to bake, let stand an hour or two till light, bake with a steady fire three hours.—Mrs. L. R. Gray, 918 W. 4th.

Frosted Creams
This is a pioneer recipe for cookies made from real sorghum molasses and has been handed down through several generations in our family. They have all other cookies beaten in my estimation. Try them and you'll be convinced.

1 scant cup of sugar
2 eggs
2-3 cup of shortening
Beat well together
Add
1 cup of sorghum molasses
3 level teaspoons of soda
3 tablespoons of vinegar
1 teaspoon of ginger
1/4 teaspoon of cloves
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon

Use plenty of flour to make a stiff dough. Roll out cut into squares. Bake in a moderate oven and when done frost with boiled frosting.
Boiled frosting: 1 cup of sugar, 1/2 cup of milk. Boil until it forms a soft ball in cold water. Beat and spread on the creams or cookies.—Mrs. Fred B. Johnson, Springfield, Ore.

Pioneer Bread
Take any amount of sour dough. Mix as for biscuits and roll out one-half inch thick. Cut in five inch strips two inches wide.

To bake: Have plenty of ashes in the fireplace and in these hot ashes make a hollow place and sprinkle with cold ashes. Then lay in strips of dough side by side and first cover with a few cool ashes then hot ashes and on top put hot coals.

charge of 60 cents for small trucks, and 90 cents for 3-ton trucks and over; a charge of 90 cents for a bus with driver, and 5 cents for each passenger.

WASHINGTON, July 3. — (AP) — Calls for June 30 bank condition statements were made simultaneously today by the controller of the currency, the federal reserve system and the federal deposit insurance corporation. It was the first time the FDIC had taken such action. The FDIC call will bring together information on the condition of 7067 state banks not affiliated with the federal reserve, which has never been available before.

pickets who were prohibited from entering the property, one freighter was unloaded and a cargo of flour was poured into the hold of another at municipal terminal No. 4 here today as the port of Portland was nominally "opened" for the first time since a general waterfront strike was called 56 days ago.

The terminal was quiet. Not more than 75 union pickets, representing the international longshoremen's association and striking seamen, were stationed on a road leading to the wharf. They appeared to pay little heed to the waterfront operations. Police-regulars and specials—paced the dock, passing their time in idle conversation.

The steamer Illinois of the States Steamship company, taking a cargo of flour, was the first ship to be loaded here in eight weeks. Eighteen men were employed at the task. Three hours before, 54 men started discharging newsmen from the holds of the British motorship Silvercedar at the same terminal.

Cal Young's Noted Prairie Schooner In Bend Carnival

Cal Young's famous prairie schooner, which 84 years ago to the day, was winding its arduous way to the Oregon country will celebrate its anniversary tomorrow by another trek across the mountains.

But times have changed, as any old pioneer will admit after viewing some of the supposed "pioneer" costumes that have been parading the city of late, and when Cal's historic old wagon is taken to Bend tomorrow for participation in Bend's big Fourth of July celebration, it will whisk across the once almost impassable McKenzie pass at about 50 miles an hour, mounted, alas, on one of "these here new fangled gas wagons."

This sorry sight, however, will not be the sight that will greet the cordial people of Eugene's neighbor city across the pass. Through the co-operation of the Eugene Pageant association, Eugene is sending an entry to participate in Bend's annual water carnival, similar and in many ways copied after the Associated Students' canoe fete, which will be held on the waters of the Deschutes river adjacent to Bend's beautiful city park.

The Eugene float will be a duplication of the winning entry in the student's canoe fete this year, which took Oregon history as a theme. The float will be a dramatization of the attacking of a covered wagon by Indians, and if any of the perfection of the student's float can be attained in this revival for the people of Bend, it will be an impressive entry and draw much attention to Eugene's Oregon Trail pageant.

N. Thomas Stoddard, assistant pageant manager, is in charge of the Eugene delegation which is arranging and presenting the entry. Robert K. Allen, Mr. and Mrs. Bud Travis, and George Scharf are the others taking part.

While no local Fourth of July celebration is scheduled, several surrounding towns plan suitable observation. Creswell is slated for a program and other events have been planned.

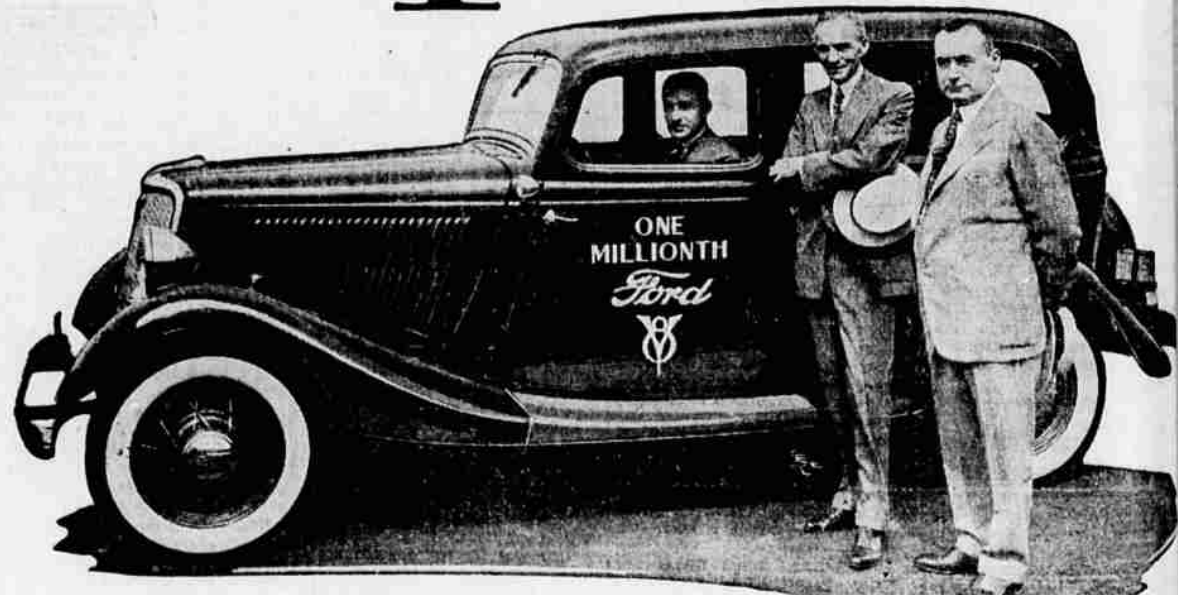
