Baby Minick

The infant son of Mr. and Mrs. S. H. Minick died at the family home at 195 Jefferson street in Eugene Tuesday morning. The funeral arrangements will be made later at the Poole-Gray-Bartholomew chapel, where arrangements are being made.

David Husband

David Husband, a minister in the Christian church, for many years a resident of Eugene, died in Salem on Monday at the age of 83 years. Mr. Husband attended Eureka college at Eureka, Ill., in preparing for the ministry and began his work in the pulpit at Bushnell, Ill. He was for ten years state evangelist for the Christian church in Minnesota from 1886 to 1896 and he held pastorates at Olivia, Minn., Wabashburg, Pullman and Sumner, Wash., between 1899 and 1906. The latter year he brought his family to Eugene.

Frank Williams

HARRISBURG, Ore., July 3.—(Special)—Frank Williams, long a resident of the Halsey-Harrisburg territory, died suddenly at the home of a friend, Oscar Yerian, near Halsey, Sunday evening. That morning he felt quite well, although he had suffered from heart disease for years. The funeral service will take place

at the Miller chapel Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock, and interment will be made in the Pine Grove cemetery. Mr. Williams was born May 21, 1864 at Halsey. Practically all his life was spent in the country south of Halsey and between Harrisburg and Eugene. He was married twice. One son, R. A. Williams, lives at Los Angeles.

Brownsville Boys Arrested For Theft

BROWNVILLE, July 3.—(Special)—Early Saturday night thieves broke into Fred Gustavson's confectionery store and got away with considerable loot. The robbers turned out to be local boys. One of them was immediately apprehended, taken into custody and jailed. Judging from the nature of the theft, the boys wanted cigarettes mostly.

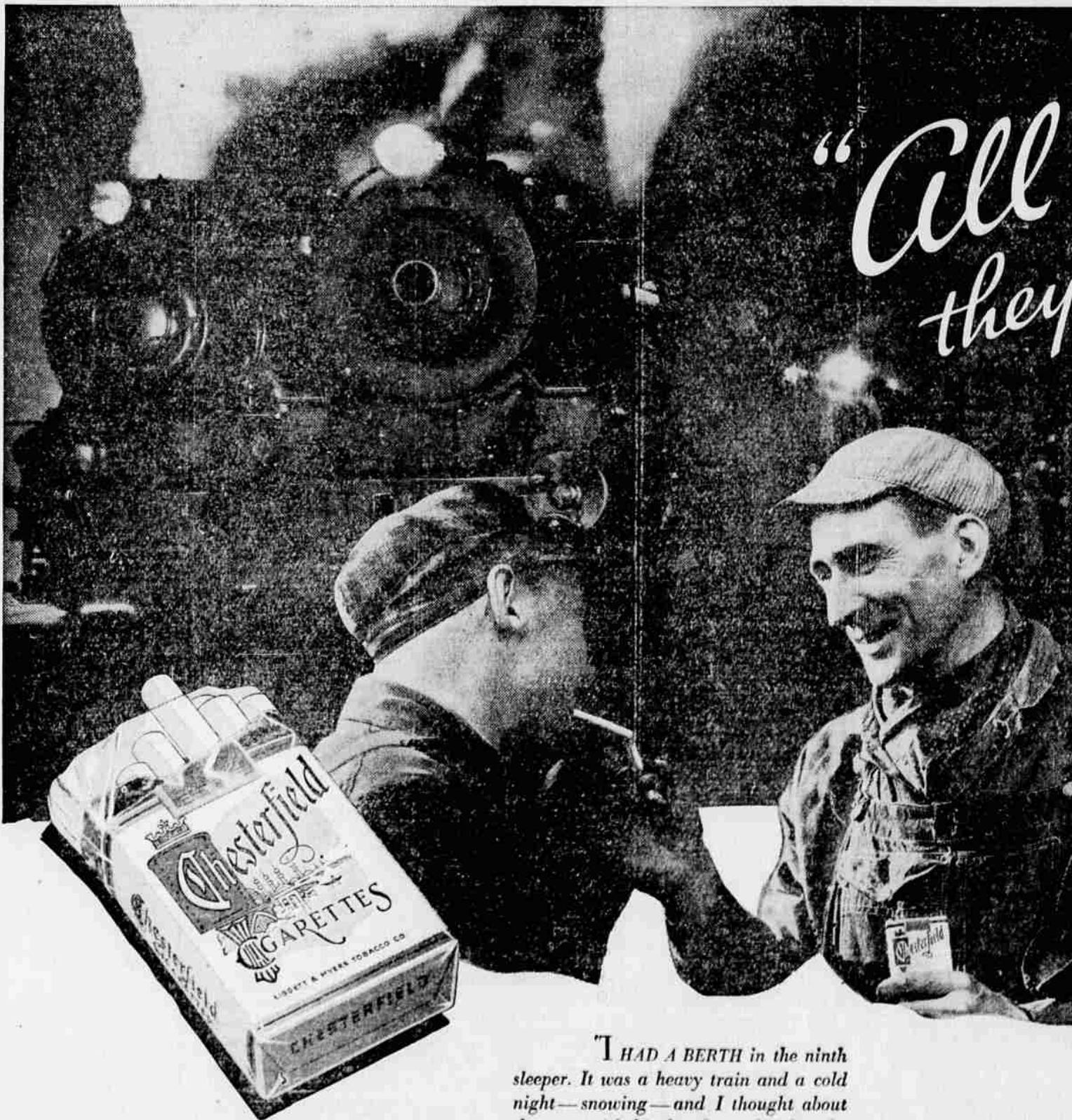
