SUDS CELEBRATE.
BEAT L. A. TWICE

The Seattle Indians defeated the Los Angeles Angels in both games of a doubleheader at Seattle Wednesday in a Fourth of July celebration all their own—the first time the league leading Angels suffered a double defeat in the 1934 Pacific Coast season.
The Indians took the first game, 11 to 2, and startled the southern club by walking off with the night-cap, 5

to 4. These victories brought the Redmen to a .500 rating in the standings and gave them an edge of two to one in the current series. However, the Los Angeles club remains in first place with seven victories and three losses.
Home runs featured the Sacramento-Hollywood game. Two each in the first game, which the Senators took 4 to 2, and another pair in the second. They lost the second game by a reversed score.
San Francisco took both games from Portland, 5 to 3 in a 10-inning opener, and 19 to 9 in the nightcap. Two homers for the Beavers gave them a lead in the eighth frame of the opener but the Seals tied it in the ninth and added two in the last inning. In the second Portland led till the

eleventh but four for the Seals made them the victors.
The Mission Reds and Oakland split their doubleheader.
Woods Gains Right To Payne Rematch By Defeating Abad
YAKIMA, Wash., July 5.—(AP)—Henry Woods, 138, flashy negro lightweight, today awaited another meeting with Cecil Payne, former Louisville, Ky., slugger, after winning the right with an impressive 10-round win here last night over Davy Abad, 136, on Panama.
Payne, Woods' conqueror twice last winter, promised the negro the chance

if he won from Abad. Woods scored an eight-count knock-down in the sixth and used his flashing left to advantage throughout the bout.
Although unanimous, the decision was unpopular with many of the fans. The American Legion staged the show.
