LOCAL BUYERS ARE

FOR ALL VARIETIES

Wheat was down a cent a bushel in the Eugene market Saturday, the Eugene Mill and Elevator company offering 73 cents for both the red and white varieties. Threshing will be started early in Lane county this year, due to the advanced spring and summer, but the crop will not be large, on account of the ravages of the Hessian fly and other adverse conditions.

Green corn was arriving in large quantities Saturday than ever before and buyers were paying 25 cents a dozen ears for it. Most of it is of good quality.

Butter, eggs and poultry were steady and there were no changes in other farm products.

Late Downturns of Wheat are Reported
CHICAGO, July 7.—(U. S. D.)—Uncertainty as to the tenor of the July crop forecast of the United States department of agriculture led to late downturns of wheat prices today.

Most traders showed a disposition to keep close to shore pending the issuance of the government report next week. An unofficial summary today noted a slight improvement of crop conditions of late in the northwest.

Wheat closed easy, 1-8 3-4 under yesterday's finish, September near 89 3-8 1-2, corn 1-8 5-8 down, oats at 1-2 decline to 1-8 advance and provisions 2 cents to 10 cent higher.

RESULT OF HEAT**

NEW YORK, July 7.—(U. S. D.)—The stock market dozed through most of today's brief proceedings and prices, with the exception of scattered issues, held to a small fractional range. It was another one of the duller sessions in the past 11 years, transfers approximating only 175,000 shares. The close was steady.

Few speculators could be lured into the financial district for the half-day business owing largely to the continuance of the heat wave and the small chance of making any profit in the current sparse share dealings, news of importance was scarce.

Few commentators would venture a guess as to when the equities market will be able to attract sufficient following to pay commensurate house expenses. From a technical standpoint, the consensus was that the market is in good condition and only waiting for some constructive impetus to give a better account of itself.

CREAM SHORTAGE IS LOOKED FOR SOON

PORTLAND, July 7.—(U. S. D.)—Market for butter continued to reflect far greater strength upon the open market with continuation of speculative buying. Premiums were still available, which permitted the creameries to hold down the price on butterfat. Indications point to a real and acute shortage of No. 1 cream.

Trading in the egg market continued firm and strictly fresh offerings and these were generally commanding extreme top quotations with others selling more or less in an indifferent way.

Keen demand was continued at the week-end for live chickens in the local trade with the call still in excess of the supply although neither was extremely pronounced. No change in prices was suggested.

Over supply of country killed lambs was generally showing along the wholesale way with receivers trying to maintain prices but with little success. Veal was cleaned up, hogs rather firm, beef slow.

Apricot deal was nearing its 1934 close. Fresh arrivals are practically exhausted with the current movement chiefly out of storage. Demand was good and prices are steady to firm and fractionally higher.

Tomato deal continued to gain strength with prices held better for Californian while The Dallas stock was being maintained generally at recent high figures.
