all of whom are having experience with new trends. Dr. F. L. Horde of the University of Minnesota will describe the work of the general college at his institution, a project that has attracted national attention. The lower division, a subject that is receiving a great deal of attention, will be the topic of Dr. Elam J. Anderson, who will describe the work being done at the institution of which he is president, Linfield college.

Round Tables Set

"Present Educational Trends" will be the topic of Dr. F. J. Kelly, chief of the division of higher education for the government. Dr. Kelly has done considerable research in this field, and is regarded as one of the outstanding authorities in the country. Dr. George W. Fraser, president of the Colorado State College Teachers' College, will talk on "Achieving Social Objectives in Higher Education," and will also deliver an address on the more technical but highly interesting topic, "The Selection and Training of Teachers for the New Educational Objectives."

Round table discussions, which are expected to produce a great deal of valuable data, will be held every afternoon. These will take up four topics on the responsibility of higher education, and will cover students, commonwealth, adult education and social planning.

Wonder Frosting

1 cup apple sauce, unseasoned
1 egg white
1 egg yolk
1/2 cup sugar
Put these together in large bowl and beat for 60 minutes with a wire whip. The first 25 minutes you're disgusted, then you look hopeful. When the time is up, you're overjoyed. You have something entirely different. It's so thick it stands alone. Is lovely in a baked pie shell. Do not heat with electric beater; it will not get stiff.—Mrs. Dorrie Morris, Cottage Grove, Ore.

Apple Whisk Frosting

Put 2 egg whites into a bowl add 3-4 cup of powdered sugar, 2 grated tart apples and a few grains of salt. Beat with a wire whisk until stiff, and then beat in 2 teaspoons of gelatin which has been allowed to stand in 2 teaspoons of cold water for a few moments, and then melted over steam. Spread this whip on bottom layer to within 1/2 inch of the edge; wait a few minutes before putting on

morning and proclaimed the determination of organized labor to stand behind the striking longshoremen and marine workers.

Cargo Working Goes On

"The labor council," said Edward Vandeleur, who was named chairman of the strategy committee, "is going to insist that we prosecute the strike on the waterfront with everything at labor's command. The council is behind the fight and I want the world to know it."

One of the first steps of the strategy committee was to meet representatives of the longshoremen and marine workers to advise them on procedure before President Roosevelt's labor disputes board, which decided yesterday to use its authority under the new congressional enactment on collective bargaining. The board will hold hearings on its own initiative Monday.

To and for along the lines of frowning machine guns and glittering bayonets, non-union workers continued to haul cargo from badly congested San Francisco piers to warehouses in the nearby industrial district. The guard held everything on the state-owned waterfront area in its martial grip. There was no attempt at violence and commanding officers said no indication of resistance had come from strikers since the militia moved in Thursday night.

TRAIN MOVE BLOCKED

Picketing maritime workers counted another triumph tonight after preventing a freight train from entering municipal terminal 4 with cargo for reshipment by water.

A cordon of police armed with death-dealing guns and demoralizing tear and "vomiting" gas held strikers back from the tracks but the crew would not take the train through, because they feared retribution for themselves or families at some future date, it was stated.

Police officials, who had mobilized 110 officers, were a bit critical of the crew's refusal.

Unions Veto Strike

Members of the train crew gave as their immediate reason for refusing to take the train into the terminal the fact that several rocks were hurled at the train by pickets, thereby creating a hazardous situation. This was the third futile attempt to forcibly move export cargo to the docks by rail.

Portland's general strike committee, comprised of representatives of each of 80 local unions will meet Monday to plan a course in case a general strike is called. It was declared several unions have voted to strike if their leaders deem it advisable.

Since other unions have contributed to strikers' subsistence they have individual interest in the strike's outcome, members declared.
