

OBSIDIAN SUMMER CAMP IS LOCATED BY SCOUTING PARTY

The site of the 1934 summer outing of the Eugene Obsidian club was officially located on White Fish creek, on the northwest shore of Crescent lake, east of the Cascade summit, it was announced Monday by Percy Brown, who will be in charge of the summer camp this year. A scouting party consisting of J. Ed Turnbull, Bailey Castello, Sid King and Mr. Brown located the camp Sunday.

Located within a short hiking distance of Diamond Peak, numerous lakes and several smaller mountains, the 1934 camp will take the Eugene party into a new area this year, Mr. Brown declared.

A special feature of this summer's outing will be a four-day trip by motor to Diamond lake and Crater lake during the second week of camp. Cars can be driven directly to the camp site, which is about one mile off the Willamette highway.

During the first week in camp a climb of Diamond Peak will be made and an over-night hike to Odell lake will be scheduled.

The camp site is one of unusual beauty, being located at the northwestern end of the lake with a full view of the broad expanse of Crescent lake and the mountains to the east. The location for sleeping tents will be in a group of small trees, affording plenty of shade during the afternoon, while permitting the morning sun to warm the tents.

A large open space is available for the cook and mess tents while a broad, sandy beach borders the lake shore, where swimming, boating and water sports will be concentrated.

The lake at this point has a gradually sloping beach. Swimmers can reach deep water about 50 yards out from shore and it is planned to build a swimming raft and anchor it at this point.

Boats for fishing and pleasure cruises will be maintained at the camp, according to Mr. Brown.

The summer camp will run from Sunday, Aug. 5 to Aug. 19 this year. About 30 persons are expected to spend the two weeks in camp and many others plan to spend a few days or to go to camp for some of the climbs and hikes, it was reported.

6 tablespoons jelly

Put unbeaten egg white in a bowl and jelly, beat until stiff as desired. This makes an icing which stays soft. It is lovely for any cake except a cake for luncheon as it stays soft. Chocolate Filling and Icing

1 1/2 cups sugar
2 tablespoons chocolate.
Pinch of butter
Mix and dampen with cream, or milk. Set on stove, and let it boil up good; let cool, then beat until stiff enough to lay on cake.—Mrs. Bob Baughman, Dexter.

Sour Cream Frosting

3-4 cup thick sour cream
1 cup (heaping) granulated sugar
Beat for about 5 minutes, stirring occasionally to prevent scorching. Remove from fire and beat with a spoon until cool. If desired, one cup of chopped nuts may be added just before putting it on the cake. This is delicious with any cake and especially with dark cakes.—Miss Dorothea Freese, 1551 Pearl St., Eugene.

Delicious Cake Filling

Soak 1 cup dried apricots in warm water 1 hour, then bring to boil. Put through sieve. Drain strained apricot pulp of excess juice. Mix 1 1/2 cups powdered sugar, 1 1/2 tablespoons cornstarch and 1-2 teaspoon salt. Add 1 cup of apricot pulp and cook in double boiler 10 min., stirring occasionally. Peel and slice 5 bananas, add to apricot, cook 5 min. longer, add 2 tablespoons lemon juice. Beat until creamy. Spread between and on top of any plain white cake and sprinkle with coconut.—Mrs. J. Longshoremen's board, which opened its first public hearing in efforts to settle the longshoremen's strike and prevent a general walkout by 120 other unions here.

The board, headed by Archbishop Edward J. Hanna, opened its hearing in Federal Judge Frank Kerigan's courtroom, confronted with the decision of the teamsters' unions here and in Oakland to join the strike Thursday unless the controversy is settled.

Victims Are Honored

Nearly 5000 spectators gathered today near the longshoremen's headquarters during funeral services for the two men fatally wounded in riots along the waterfront.

Although the longshoremen had announced they would ask a police escort for the cortege, there were no officers present the strikers even directed traffic in the badly congested district.

Four trucks, flower covered and draped with crepe, were to carry the coffins and to the cemetery. The body of Howard S. Sperry, a longshoreman and war veteran, was to be interred at the Presidio here and that of Nicholas Bordosio, union waiter, in Woodland cemetery.

Among the large crowd mingled many men attired in worn service uniforms.

PORTLAND CRISIS

PORTLAND, Ore., July 9.—(AP)—While representatives of more than 20 unions considered plans for a general strike, operations in Portland's strikebound waterfront shifted today to the Linton area where six gasoline and oil tankers moved into docks to discharge cargo. One hundred regular policemen, carrying shotguns and sidearms, patrolled the Linton oil plant district where the big tank steamers were pumping gasoline and fuel oil for their holds.

A general labor meeting, closed to everyone except accredited members of the strike committee, began at 1 p. m. today for discussion of plans for a general city-wide strike designed to paralyze all major activities in the city. Union representatives were expected to vote on whether they favor such a general strike call. Should an affirmative vote be cast, the move would be referred to the several locals for separate vote.

SEATTLE BALKS

SEATTLE, July 9.—(AP)—Seattle teamsters will not join with the San Francisco teamsters in a walkout in sympathy with striking longshoremen, President Dave Beck of the local teamsters' union said tonight, but he added that the decision to do so there was "not surprising."

NEW YORK PROTEST

NEW YORK, July 9.—(AP)—Some 200 left wing longshoremen, members of the marine workers' industrial union, and sympathizers, staged a demonstration today against the unloading of the steamship Virginia. The Virginia arrived here this morning from the west coast, where, speakers at the demonstration declared, it had been loaded by non-union labor.
