Bloody Shirt is Waved
A bloody shirt worn by one of the wounded men was waved before council members at today's meeting of the council as Matt Mehan, member of the executive committee of the International Longshoremen's association, shouted "this blood is on your hands."

The wounded men, all struck by buck-shot were: Elmus W. Beatty, shot in right jaw and neck; Peter Stephenson of St. Helena, shot in abdomen, both arms and chest; Bert Yates, buck-shot in side of head; W. Huntington, shot in right arm.

Lawson Declines Comment
Chief of Police B. K. Lawson refused to discuss the shooting or the morning's developments. "It is too desperate a situation to talk about," he declared.

Police said they had heard threats by strikers to bomb the residence of Chief Lawson. Guards were placed about the house.

Police captains in charge of the groups of regular and special police at Municipal Terminal No. 4 where the shooting occurred, sent in a call to central headquarters a short time later for 500 rounds of shotgun ammunition and a supply of gas bombs. Between 700 and 800 pickets had concentrated in the terminal area. About 350 police were on duty there.

Defense is Alleged
Fred M. West, assistant police chief, said "We did not shoot until the strikers fired at us from the bushes and pelted the train with rocks."

"Shots came at us from the bushes and our men opened fire," he declared.

"It was either defend ourselves or get shot and the police decided to shoot." Ninety police were on the train. Captain West said rocks were hurled by the pickets before shots were heard.

Mrs. Grace Berg, who has been in San Francisco for the past three weeks attending the Bernard Uhlman school of Knitting, has returned and is now giving the instruction in the latest knitting ideas to the women of Eugene at the McMoran and Washburne store.

Mrs. Berg reports that the instructions were most interesting and very complete. Each of the 70 women in attendance was required to make a scrap book showing all the new patterns and knitting stitches as developed by Miss Claire A. Wolff, of New York. While this was fascinating work it called for a tremendous amount of time and very little of the three weeks was spent in recreation.

Mrs. Berg is now teaching and showing the Mexican blanket of four fold zephyr yarn; baby jackets, helmets, bonnets, mittens and robes. Children's dresses and sweaters of bouffette; Shetland floss and twinkle crepe yarns are most interesting. There are also bouillon afghans, meditation robes, the new popcorn robe and, of course, sweaters, blouses and dresses.

Of most interest for the fall is the Paris fashion in looted wear with full instructions for their making. McMoran and Washburne will receive two of these Paris fashions each month. They will be available in three sizes and Mrs. Berg will give full instructions in making.

Many Eugene women are already knitting garments for fall taking advantage of vacation leisure time. Others are planning to do as soon as the pagan activities are over.

Simpson, Cowgill Under Fire From Game Board Head

PORTLAND, Ore., July 11.—(P)—Discord broke in the ranks of the state game commission at the afternoon session here Tuesday as critical inquiries were directed at Ralph P. Cowgill, engineer for the commission, and Gene Simpson, superintendent of the commission's farms, Matt F. Corrigan, chairman of the game commission, reprimanded both.

Cowgill was criticized for the purchase of reportedly inefficient incubators for the state farms, and Simpson was accused of having purchased grain and mash of poor quality and without having obtained executive board approval for any purchase.

George Wells, foreman of the Pendleton game farm, declared the new incubators were "junk" and "the cheapest ever bought." Chairman Corrigan said the grain, purchased through the state board of control, was "about 20 or 25 per cent chaff," and that it did not conform with samples.

Man Injured When Car Strikes Pole

Sunshine Seven Minute Icing
(A new use for egg yolks)
1 cup sugar
2 egg yolks
1-2 cup boiling water
1 teaspoon vanilla
Beat egg yolks in top of double boiler; add sugar and then the boiling water, gradually. Have water in bottom of double boiler boiling gently. Place egg mixture over water and start beating immediately with rotary type beater. Beat constantly until mixture looks fluffy and will stand in peaks when beater is pulled out of it. Flavor. Orange juice might be substituted for water.—Mrs. W. R. Armstrong, 1302 W. 11th Ave., Eugene.

Orange Frosting
1 grated rind of an orange
1 teaspoon brandy (can be omitted)
1/2 teaspoon lemon juice
1 teaspoon orange juice, more if needed
1 egg yolk and powdered sugar to stiffen.
Grate rind, add brandy and juices, let stand 15 minutes, strain through a little square of cheese cloth or its equivalent, add powdered sugar and yolk of egg. Walnut meats halved and placed on cake after frosting is made a very attractive cake.—Mrs. Marie Golden, R. 1, Junction City.

Lady Baltimore Frosting and Filling
1 1/2 cups sugar
1/2 teaspoon light corn syrup
2-3 cup boiling water
2 egg whites, stiffly beaten
1 teaspoon vanilla
6 figs chopped
1/2 cup chopped raisins
1/2 cup chopped pecans
Combine sugar, corn syrup and water. Bring quickly to boil, stirring until sugar is dissolved. Boil rapidly without stirring. Pour syrup in fine stream over egg whites. Add vanilla. Continue beating until frosting is of right consistency to spread. For filling add enough frosting to fruit and nuts to make a filling that will spread easily. Spread between layers and spread remaining frosting on top and sides of the cake.—Miss Melus Hill, 1458 Hilyard St., Eugene.

Mocha Frosting
3 tablespoons butter
3 cups powdered sugar
3 tablespoons cocoa
3 tablespoons strong coffee
1 teaspoon vanilla
Cream butter and powdered sugar, mixed with cocoa. Add coffee and vanilla slowly, until frosting will spread easily. Decorate with walnut halves.—Mrs. F. C. Swindall, 1975 Emerald St., Eugene.

Princess Yvonne Leads
Climaxing the most feverish day of vote-getting yet in the Oregon Trail queen contest, Princess Yvonne Stevens, candidate of organized labor for the role of Queen Susannah III, was declared winner for the "Princesses' Day" contest and awarded the first prize of 100,000 votes. Miss Stevens was able to maintain her lead in the contest.

Princess Marjorie Wilhelm, second place holder, also held her position in the line-up established by the previous count, and walked off with the second prize of 80,000 votes for obtaining the second most votes between last Saturday evening and Tuesday afternoon. The balloting yesterday failed to change the relative position of any of the candidates, the totals merely being advanced, in two cases above the million vote mark.

Totals in yesterday's count were as follows: Yvonne Stevens (labor), 587,005 plus 100,000 prize; Marjorie Wilhelm (fraternal), 427,253 plus 50,000 prize; Jo Skene (veterans), 355,055; Marion Davis (service clubs), 319,720.

One reason for the exceptionally large count yesterday was the quarter million votes that were dropped from an airplane in the early afternoon by Hobi Airways. Up to the time of the close of the ballot boxes Tuesday there was a steady stream of persons coming into pageant headquarters and other balloting places with large blocks that had been picked up off the streets.

600 feet for Redwood or yearly allowed production of 7,351,124,000 feet for Douglas fir, 4,928,772,000 feet for western pine and 540,876,000 for redwood.

Basing calculations for 1934 on the average monthly production allowed in the first three-quarters of the year this would give an estimated increase in allowed production for 1935, as compared with 1934, of 2,204,460,000 feet of Douglas fir, 1,211,448,000 for western pine and 166,956,000 for redwood.
