The University of Minnesota's big experiment with its "General College" for undergraduates who are "finding themselves" was outlined to a large audience at Friday's main session of the educational conference at the University of Oregon, and it provoked much debate.

The experiment is based on the theory that few students are really "stupid," and that many are unexcited, and it breaks away from traditional teaching methods and uses many new devices to orient its students culturally and for further scholastic work.

Bratton, Whitman college; Otto Hartwig, labor representative on Industrial Accident Commission, Salem; Rex Putnam, superintendent of schools, Albany; Gilbert Wren, Stanford university; and Wendell Van Loan, principal Roosevelt junior high school, Eugene.

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In his anxiously-awaited statement of position on continental affairs, Sir John said the recent Anglo-French conversations had resulted in a greater feeling of peace and security in Europe and will greatly improve conditions on the continent if powers affected fully enter the proposed eastern regional pact.

Sir John supported the statement that Louis Barthou, French foreign minister, when the latter left London, that Britain and France were co-operating in trying to effect permanent peace in Europe. At the same time the foreign secretary denied French inferences that Barthou "got more than he expected," meaning some sort of alliance.

"We are undertaking no new obligations whatever—there is no select alliance with any power," he said.

In the first government statement since the departure of Barthou, Sir John revealed that Britain is urging Germany to enter an eastern pact and return to the league of nations.

He said Britain deems Russia's inclusion in the league a paramount necessity for the peace of Europe.

Sir John emphasized that Britain regards an eastern pact as a peace move, not a war move aimed at any one country. He said he and Barthou were fully agreed there was no intent or thought of "building up one group against another," making it clear that the pact was aimed to aid Germany and not aimed at her.

The chief mission of Barthou, the foreign secretary said, was to outline reasons for the necessity of a pact of mutual assistance embracing the Baltic states, Russia, Poland, Czechoslovakia and Germany.

The attitude of Italy toward the pact—the Locarno treaty—was similar to that of Britain, he said. Neither Italy nor Britain was undertaking new obligations but both fully sympathized with support of an eastern reciprocity program.

More than \$1,000,000 insurance of this type was estimated to have been written during the past week. One company alone wrote \$60,000 in such policies yesterday.

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
