

Legion Juniors, Corvallis To Meet Saturday Corn And Beans Down;

FASSETT TO PUT STRONG TEAM ON FIELD FOR GAME

The Eugene American Legion Juniors will meet the Corvallis Juniors Saturday afternoon at the fairgrounds at 4:30 in the first game of the 5-game playoff for the district championship.

Corvallis is said to have a powerful club, with several Corvallis high stars and Benton league players. Eugene, under the tutelage of Frank Fassett, will also put a strong team on the field, and a close battle is expected.

Practice Successful In practice this year, the locals have defeated five bush league clubs, and have lost two close ones to an older Cottage Grove outfit.

General Varrellman will probably start behind the bat for the Eugene Juniors, and Pete Russell, Springfield high school ace, will get the mound assignment. Hamer will be stationed at first base, and Mallory will play second. Austin has received the short-stopping post, with Ronald McIntyre slated for third base duty.

Two veterans from last year's club will be included in the outfield patrol. J. B. Brown, flashy Hills Creek centerfielder, will appear in that position with Dutton in left. Right field will be chosen from Goldbar, Thunemann, Davis, Almon Mauney and Loyd Seales.

Pete Igoe will be on hand for relief pitching duty, while Bill Brechtel may alternate at catcher with Varrellman. Fassett believes the lineup listed above best combines his hitting and fielding power, and is counting on it for a victory.

Dates and places for the four remaining games will be announced later.

HIGHCLIMBER takes pm over

Herb Owen, Eugene wrestling promoter, will stage the season's biggest amateur fight smoker next Wednesday evening at the armory—It Joe Bradshaw, Eugene A. C. coach, will agree to fight Herb's son Elton in a 3-round main event!

Owen issued an open challenge to Bradshaw Thursday night, promising to line up several good preliminary bouts, and turn the entire proceeds over to local charity. "Elton will fight Bradshaw five two-minute rounds," he stated, "if Bradshaw can come down to within 20 pounds of Elton's weight."

Elton is a former Eugene high athlete and is recognized as one of the outstanding scrappers of the University of Oregon. If Bradshaw accepts the challenge for Wednesday night, young Owen will fight under the colors of the university.

Bradshaw, who has staged several amateur smokers here and is coach of the Eugene A. C., is said to have been a former Multnomah club lumina. Wednesday night's fight, if he accepts the challenge, will give him a chance to prove to local fans that he knows his stuff.

In case Bradshaw feels that the time between now and Wednesday will not give him sufficient opportunity to get in condition, Owen will offer to stage the smoker immediately following the Oregon Trail pageant, on the same basis—Bradshaw versus Elton. This column will be open to Bradshaw for an acceptance or a rejection of the challenge at any time. It will make a good story, whatever he decides.

Incidentally, Bradshaw refused to accept the proffered six per cent benefit offered for Tommy Venes, by the Eugene wrestling commission. Venes, who appeared under Bradshaw's tutelage in the A. A. U. scraps, was quite badly injured, according to wire reports, and the commission generously decided to turn over their share of the Thursday night wrestling gate to him. Well, Bradshaw showed up last

night with Venes, explained that he didn't like "Thursday's" Englishman (we had rather expected he might not), and said "You chap tell the boys we want to see money the Eugene A. C. will throw the benefit, and we don't want any money from the wrestling commission." Since Venes obviously wasn't very badly off, the commission, of course, didn't press the point.

Then Bradshaw went on to explain that up to the time of the knockout Venes had made it a terrific battle, and would probably have won on points but for a lucky punch. Several Eugene fans who saw the fight thought otherwise. Not having been there, we decided to check up.

Friday morning we called Billy Stepp, sports editor of the News Telegram in Portland. "Billy," said we, "did Tommy Venes, who fought for Eugene, make a good fight of it before he was knocked out?"

Here's Stepp's answer, exactly as he gave it to us over the phone: "No, he made no fight of it at all. He hardly laid a glove on his opponent." Understand, we're not panicking Tommy Venes. It was simply too fast company for him, considering his experience, and he undoubtedly tried his best. We're simply straightening out a few points for your information.

Getting around to wrestling, now that the fight business is taken care of, Herb Owen is looking for an opponent for Terrible Texas Teddy Waters next Thursday night. Texas Teddy defeated Castillo Thursday night at the armory, and two members of the local wrestling circle are anxious to meet him.

Bullard Jackson says "Let me in the ring with that conceited ass." Del Kunkle makes no rash statements, but admits he'd like to meet Waters. Either way, it would be a great match. Owen will probably decide between the boys by Sunday, and announcement of the match will be carried at that time.

Votes, Queens, Thrilling Bouts Armory Features

Princess Yvonne Stevens won 75,000 votes, Princess Marian Davis won nearly as many, and Texas Teddy Waters won a thrilling wrestling bout in the features of Thursday night's program at the Eugene armory.

Another packed house greeted Promoter Herb Owen, and they were rewarded with three grappling matches which were as "hot" as anything Owen has staged this year. Although some of the grapplers committed mayhem on the referee, or threw stools at the police force, they all went in and exhibited some of the most spectacular wrestling of the season.

Texas Teddy Waters defeated Castillo, the Spanish don, in the no-time-limit main event, and though Teddy got in an occasional punch, the bout was comparatively clean, with Waters demonstrating a wrestling technique, without benefit of rough stuff, that would do credit to a champion.

Sailor Trout defeated Harry Hill in the semi-windup, and Bulldog Jackson drew with Del Kunkle in the opener. The bouts were uniformly good, although the main event probably outclassed the others by a narrow margin.

Waters amazed fans with his ability to "take it" coming out of semi-consciousness to win the first and third falls. The match started slow, with each man respecting the other. The

action soon got under way, however, and after 12 minutes the Spaniard nailed Teddy with a series of neck-cracking chockholds. Ted, apparently out on his feet, crashed to the mat time and again, then suddenly rose and unleashed seven of the fastest headlocks ever displayed in the Eugene ring, polishing off Castillo in 14 minutes for the first fall.

The second tumble was a thriller, with Castillo repeatedly applying a suffocating, and Waters looking for a break. Ted began looking for openings for his legitimate tactics, but Referee Elliott kept him under control, and the Don finally clamped on an unbreakable suffocant, with Ted giving up in 20 minutes.

Although the first two falls provided plenty of fireworks, the last was an entire barrage. After both boys had gone at it to top speed for some seven or eight minutes, Castillo got Waters off balance with a Sonnenberg, and then bounced off the ropes a half-dozen times, literally lifting the cowpuncher off his feet with the most terrific series of butt hits ever exhibited here.

Waters was to all intents and purposes, through for the evening. Castillo, with one last mighty lunge, smashed him to the mat and climbed aboard to take the fall. But no, for Texas came up with a hammerlock, rolled over, and forced the Spaniard to get the mat. The fans sat dazed for a moment, gasping at the sudden quiet following the whirlwind of action.

DETROIT CLIMBS TO FIRST PLACE OVER PROSTRATE YANKS

NEW YORK, July 12.—(AP)—A tall, husky shouldered lad from the Oseck hills, 22-year-old Lynwood "Schoolboy" Rowe, who never saw ball players in uniform until two years ago, stood the New York Yankees on end yesterday afternoon. When he finished with them they were in second place and Detroit was leading the American league.

Rowe's support was flawless. He gave only six hits, walked four—and won, 4-2.

Chicago's last place White Sox hung one on the next-to-last Philadelphia Athletics, 3-2.

Another masterpiece in pitching was turned in by Carl Hubbell, of the New York Giants, who beat Pittsburgh in the nightcap, 11-1.

After the Pirates had won the opener, 3-1, Hubbell gave but six hits, fanned eight and did not walk a man.

The Chicago Cubs shaved a half-game off New York's lead, winning over the Braves, 7-4.

Dean Injured Brooklyn split with Cincinnati, Emil Deonard saving the opener after Van Lingle Mungo had blown five runs of a six-run lead, going on from the sixth to win, 9-7. Cincinnati won the nightcap, 13-5.

St. Louis lost more than a game in Philadelphia. Paul Dean, one of the two winning pitchers on the Cardinal staff, was laid up with a sprained ankle which will keep him out for three weeks.
