Dr. J. A. Flanagan of Eugene has just received his certificate of membership in the 12th International Veterinary congress which will meet in New York City, Aug. 13 to 15.

The International Veterinary congress is an organization approximately 75 years old and its membership includes the leading veterinarians of 60 countries. The meeting in New York next month will be the first ever held in America.

President Roosevelt has consented to act as patron for the 12th International Veterinary congress and Secretary of Agriculture Wallace will officially open the congress. The program will include about 80 discussions of the whole world. A portion of the program will be broadcast on the U. S. department of agriculture form and home radio program. The broadcasts will be 9:30-10:20 a. m. Tuesday, Aug. 14, and at the same hour on Thursday, Aug. 16, on the NBC network.

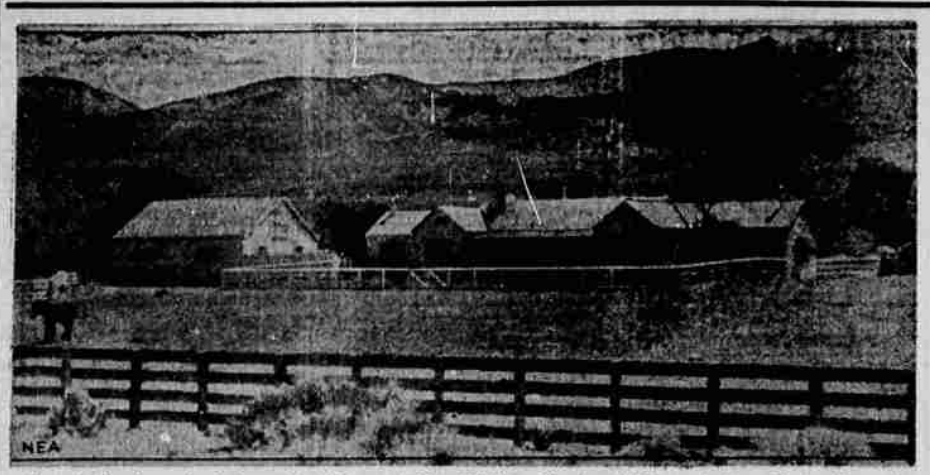
