stir into hot cream. Continue stirring until mixture thickens slightly. Beat egg yolks, add sugar and salt. Dilute with little of hot mixture. Stir into the rest and continue to cook until it coats the spoon. Cool, add vanilla and freeze. This may be varied by adding crushed Swedish mints when the mixture is only partly frozen. Add enough red coloring to tint a faint pink, and flavor with peppermint. Omit sugar from the recipe when making peppermint ice cream.—R. Coughlin, 1054 Lincoln St., Eugene.

Tutti Fruiti Ice Cream
This delicious ice cream for the electric refrigerator is very inexpensive for it is made with evaporated milk instead of whipping cream, but no one would suspect its economy. It requires:
1 small can of evaporated milk (boiled previously and chilled)
1 cupful of crushed strawberries, with some of juice drained off
1 ripe peach, peeled, pitted and crushed.
1/2 cupful of drained crushed pineapple
1 banana, mashed
3-4 cupful of sugar
1/2 cupful of chopped nuts, if desired
Few grains of salt.
To prepare the milk for whipping, place the unopened can in a pan of cold water to cover, and boil for 5 minutes. Cool and chill thoroughly. Mix the crushed fruits with the sugar, stirring until it is thoroughly dissolved. Pour the chilled milk into a very cold bowl, and whip with a rotary beater as for whipped cream. Add the salt, and fold in the fruits, blending well. Pour into tray of refrigerator and freeze; when half frozen, stir in the chopped nuts, if they are desired. This ice cream does not need to be stirred while freezing. We consider it the best of all the

Apricot or Peach Mousse
1 cup double cream
1 cup fruit juice
6 tablespoons sugar
2 egg whites
Pinch of salt
Whip cream, peel peaches and rub through a coarse strainer to make 1 cup of pulp, add the sugar, fold with cream, add the egg whites which have been beaten with salt, pour into tray and freeze. This recipe does not need stirring.—Mrs. J. F. Fulop, 442 B St., Springfield.

Banana Ice Cream
2 cups milk
2 level tablespoons cornstarch
Few grains salt
1-3 cup sugar
1 egg yolk
1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla
1 cup cream
2 ripe bananas.
Scald milk. Mix cornstarch with sugar, salt and beaten egg yolk. Moisten with small amount of the scalded milk and add mixture to milk. Cook ten minutes, stirring constantly until thickened. Cool, add vanilla, turn into refrigerator tray and freeze to mush. Place in bowl and beat well with rotary egg-beater. Slice bananas and put through coarse sieve. Add banana pulp to custard mixture and fold in whipped cream. Return to chilling unit and freeze. This makes six generous servings. Use a sweeter ice cream is desired, use 1/2 cup sugar.—Gertrude M. Mourer, 1105 W. 10th Avenue, Eugene.

Brazilian Ice Cream
4 cups sugar
4 lemons
8 oranges
4 bananas
4 cups cream
4 cups milk.
To the juice of the lemons and oranges, add the sugar, stir until the sugar is nearly dissolved, then add the sliced bananas, cream and then the milk last. Freeze, remove paddle and pack to ripen. Excellent.—Mrs. A. L. Ingalls, Route 3, Colgate, Crest, Eugene.

Cooked Vanilla Ice Cream
1 cup milk
3 eggs
3-4 cup sugar
1-8 teaspoon salt
1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla
1 cup whipped cream.
Make a custard of egg yolks, milk and sugar. Add beaten egg whites and vanilla. Chill then add whipped cream.
Put into freezing trays and turn temperature regulator to cold. Stir twice during freezing process.
When frozen, move regulator to normal position and hold. A pleasant change from plain ice cream may be made by reducing amount of sugar by 1/4 cup, and adding 1/2 cup of fruit preserves.—Mrs. T. F. Kabler, R. 1, Creswell.

Grape Juice Sherbet
1 bottle grape juice
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup sugar
4 tablespoons lemon juice
1 cup cream.
Boil together half the grape juice with salt and sugar, for 2 minutes. Cool and add the rest of the grape juice and the lemon juice. Freeze slowly until partly frozen then add the cream. Stir well and finish freezing. Pack at least 1 hour.—Anna Pechins, 2089 East 15th St., Eugene.

Former Eugenean Reports Close Call
