

PLANS COMPLETED FOR LODGE PICNIC

Princess Marian Sees Bright Future For Eugene Pageants

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the third of a series of interviews with the four candidates in the contest to select Queen Susannah III, ruler of the Oregon Trail pageant.)

Princess Marian Davis, service club candidate for Queen Susannah III, sees a great future for the Oregon Trail pageant. "I had never fully realized what a great event our Oregon Trail celebration might become, until I heard what Hugh Rossen says about the future of the event," said Princess Marian.

"I believe Mr. Rossen caught the right spirit when he compared the contest to the Passion Play of Germany. The Oregon Trail is a memorial of Pioneer days even the memory of which is quickly drifting away. If the pageant is repeated regularly there is no doubt but that its meaning can be preserved and it will become renowned throughout the world," said the 21 year old service club candidate.

Princess Marian was born in Eugene, March 24, 1913, went to Woodrow Wilson junior high school, Eugene high school, and has just completed her freshman year in the university as a social science major. She is a pledge of Alpha Chi Omega sorority. She likes both modern and classical music, and plays the violin. Her favorite actor is George Arliss and her favorite actresses, Karen Morley and the late Louise Clouser Hale. She liked "The House

of Rothschild" better than any cinema she has seen in recent years. Of the older shows she favors "The Guardsman," which she says she saw eight times. She likes dark men best, and proudly says she is domestically minded even if she is the only princess in the race who is thinking of getting married someday.

In spite of being assured that she was wrong Princess Marian complained that she felt like a toothpick. "I only weigh 108 pounds and the other princesses seem to have gotten together on their weights because they all weigh exactly the same, 125 pounds. It makes me feel so thin."

The princess is 5 feet 6 and one-half inches tall with light brown hair and brown eyes and looked extremely presentable in a bright silk blouse and white linen skirt when interviewed the other day. She was waiting to go play golf, which is with swimming and dancing for her favorite form of diversion. She works at Newberry's store.

Being a princess is not new for Marian. She was a princess in the 1931 May festival at Eugene high school. She was very active in school

activities and was Girl's League president at Eugene high school last year.

When she was a child, Princess Marian used to like to dress up her parents old clothes and hand house and other children's clothes with her chums. She used to do a lot, she said.

Princess Marian traces her heritage by her father's side. Her said his father was an early settler to the Oregon country. Marian's F. Davis at 856 Lincoln street, used to be a Rainbow girl and a member of the Royal Neighbors lodge. She is a member of the Methodist church. She has two brothers, one, Burton, a year older than herself, and the other, Austin, a year younger, and a younger sister, Lucille.

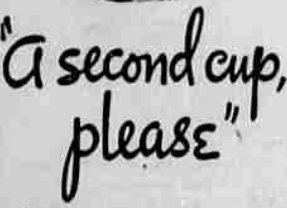
