This machine has a keyboard resembling that of a typewriter and is operated by persons at each end of the line who carry on conversations by using the keyboard as a sending and receiving machine. The teletype facilities transmission of telegrams. With this machine the Daugherty Lumber company will be able to get immediate connection with any of its customers that also have teletypes and to get an answer delivered to its office as rapidly as put on the wire at the other end. Connections are made direct with Portland and direct from there to other teletype stations. Two lines to Portland had to be cleared before installation could be made. Service will commence Monday.
