WHEAT UP TO \$1 IN CHICAGO MART

CHICAGO, July 12.—(AP)—In a sudden outburst of speculative buying late today, wheat jumped to \$1 a bushel. The buying caught the wheat market temporarily bare of offerings, and prices went skyward in a hurry, with many stop loss orders forced into execution by the quick advance.

Foreign news of an unusual bullish character was reported as the chief incentive for the late rush of buying in wheat. December wheat contracts skyrocketed almost 4 cents a bushel in as many minutes.

Despite quick profit-taking on the advance, wheat closed strong with a fraction of the day's top, 2 7-8@3 1/2 cents above yesterday's finish. July new 90 1/2, corn 7-8@1 5-8 up, July 59 1-8, oats 3-8@7-8 up, and provisions at a rise of 5 cents to 22 cents.

INTEREST IN WOOL NOW AT LOW EBB

BOSTON, July 12.—(AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow:

"Interest in wool, both in the east and west, has been at low ebb this week. Manufacturers have evinced very little desire to own wool at the prices asked here, especially since the sharp drop in London and the buyers of goods evidently are convinced that a drop in wool prices is inevitable and so they are waiting. Sales for the week have been negligible and prices are nominally unchanged.

"London closed Thursday with a little show of interest at the new low levels established last week but the sales were sustained almost wholly by England. Of a total offering of 99,700 bales, only 44,000 bales were sold, England taking 25,000. Prices were down generally 20 to 25 percent from the previous series.

"In the west, little change is reported. The consignment of the Stillwater pool at 20 cents advance and the sale of the J. B. Long clip in Montana at 20 1/2 cents, each comprising about 400,000 pounds, have been the big items of the week."

From Rum Profits**

Lane county will receive \$2284.42 as its share of the first turnover of liquor sale profits, \$44,988.38, to the state relief commission, the Lane county relief committee was notified Friday.

Formal application for the funds to be applied for relief work in the current month will be made by the committee. The money is expected to be received immediately after the next meeting of the state group.

Another \$170,000 in profits is expected to be divided soon. The money is apportioned on the basis of population.
