

OFFICERS SUSPECT ROBBERIES LINKED WITH KIDNAPINGS

CHICAGO, July 17.—(AP)—Authorities studied today a possible link between the recovery of stolen jewelry worth \$45,200, a \$250,000 mail robbery and the \$200,000 Edward G. Bremer kidnaping.

Four women and two men were in custody, and Detective Chief William Shoemaker said two of the women, whom he refused to designate, stole the jewelry on June 14 from the hotel room of Mrs. Adolph Zukor, wife of the movie magnate.

Those detained were James Weinberg, 33; his wife, Edna, 33; her sister, Elsie DeLaney, 28; Miss DeLaney's roommate, Dorothy Jacobs, 27; Robert Vestal, 29, and his wife, Helen, 32.

Police said Weinberg, saloon and cafe operator, was under indictment as the result of a \$250,000 mail robbery in Chicago's loop on Dec. 6, 1932. Among others named in the charge was John J. (Boss) McLaughlin, former state assemblyman, later indicted for possessing ransom money paid for the release of Bremer, wealthy St. Paul brewer. This, police said, indicated a possible connection between the three crimes.

Wire tapping by police and Clarence Converse, a federal operative, led to the arrest of those held. The officers said they overheard conversations offering the jewelry for sale in New York and St. Paul.

Weinberg took the officers to the loot, but denied any part in the burglary. He claimed two women abandoned the jewelry in a tavern, fearing that detectives were following them.

headquarters of alleged communists, police raided their nightclubs and drove them into the street.

Assisting the officers, national guardsmen moved their trucks into position so as to block off the approaches to the headquarters.

About 200 men were placed in custody and communistic literature was seized. The prisoners were taken to jail and police then launched a roundup along the waterfront.

Police were said to have the names of 2000 known radicals in their possession.

They visited breadlines and picked out prisoners. Other small gatherings were approached and more men taken into custody.

EAST BAY HIT

SAN FRANCISCO, July 17.—(AP)—The general strike clutched the East Bay cities in its tentacles today and the full strength of the state's national guard ringed strategic points with walls of steel.

Some 40,000 union workers joined the paralyzing walkout, increasing the ranks of the strikers to 100,000 men. Motors roaring, big transport trucks conveyed more troops to the "battle fronts" and heavily guarded machines began to bring food supplies to a population of 1,300,000 persons.

As the East Bay strike became effective, Mayor William F. Murray of Alameda issued a proclamation declaring he would control the situation.

The crews of key system ferryboats and trains joined the strike, leaving thousands of commuters to crowd like sardines into the Southern Pacific boats and cars.

An almost ominous calm hung over San Francisco's streets when municipal street cars resumed their interrupted service.

General Hugh Johnson, NRA administrator, was expected to confer with President Roosevelt's labor disputes board in further attempts to bring about arbitration.

Mayor Angelo Rossi and his committee of 300 citizens were perfecting plans to distribute foodstuffs.

National guardsmen hastily erected barricades throughout the commission district here to furnish protection for trucks bearing vegetables and other produce.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 17.—(AP)—Leading newspapers of San Francisco bay cities were unanimous today in predicting a general strike could not be won and blaming its inception on communistic elements.

Here is what they said: CHRONICLE—The issue in this general strike is clear cut. It is a battle of the communists, by the medium of organized labor and for the destruction of constituted government. It is a reign of terrorism.

EXAMINER—They could not win a general strike—even if they knew what they are striking for. No community—least of all San Francisco—is going to let itself be defeated by a general strike captained by communists.

CALL-BULLETIN—There rests today on labor unionism a chance to rid its ranks of the stamp of communism and radicalism to maintain its reputation for integrity. A general strike has never been won.

OAKLAND TRIBUNE—In the present emergency citizens must keep their heads, with faith that city, state and federal government still function, and that in the final analysis American common sense will prevail.

HOUSTON, Tex., July 17.—(AP)—Docks along the Houston waterfront were worked by independent longshoremen today as the Harris county grand jury investigated the dock battle Sunday in which three longshoremen were killed and four wounded.

The independent longshoremen worked under protection of 200 policemen.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 17.—(AP)—Savings of hundreds of head of cattle and sheep from death by thirst and starvation, Oregon's first drought area with a heavy flow of water has been struck at 75 feet, 30 miles north of Burns, Ore., in the heart of the stricken country. Other wells are being drilled in Jefferson, Grant, Crook and Harney counties.

LA GRANDE, Ore., July 17.—(AP)—Opening sessions of the Western Union Meeting association of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers and the grand international auxiliary were held here this afternoon, beginning a three-day convention in La Grande.

SALEM, July 17.—(AP)—One million gallons of gasoline, declared to be "fair with striking unions" can be brought into Portland from Tacoma for distribution by numerous dealers, it was reported here today by Lester Baldwin, representing the Jobbers Petroleum Sales Corporation of Tacoma.

SALEM, July 17.—(AP)—Shipping into the state of gasoline from outside fields, because of the current shortage in motor fuel due to strike conditions, prompted a warning by P. J. Stadelman, secretary of state that stocks shipped into Oregon and resold to motorists by unlicensed dealers were subject to a 10-cent state tax, five cents as a liability to the state for the regular tax, plus an additional five cents levied against the "bootlegger" as a state penalty.

UNHAPPY KANSAS WEARS CROWN AS HOTTEST OF HOT

KANSAS CITY, July 17.—(AP)—The national heat crown which appears to have found something of a permanent resting place in Kansas today shed its dazzling rays on a crop-thrifty and drought-stricken middle west.

The mercury continued to bombard the century mark over a large area, reports of such temperature readings being general from Texas to the Dakotas.

Emporia, Kas., got set for another blast which yesterday boosted the mercury to 112 degrees, the hottest spot in the land.

Oklahoma experienced about the same temperatures today as yesterday with early readings around 100 degrees.

With but few points reporting, Missouri apparently was not to find any relief from the heat. Joplin had a new noon-day record for the year with a fraction over 99 degrees. Jefferson City reported 104.

Texas, too, was included in that portion of the country where 100 degree weather held sway. Readings over a large part of the middle west were expected to remain high.

Cafe Stays Open, But Closes Quickly

SAN FRANCISCO, July 16.—(AP)—Although the strike committee authorized only 19 restaurants to serve San Franciscans, a cafeteria owner in the financial district disobeyed the edict until mid-afternoon.

ASTORIA, Ore., July 16.—(AP)—Mandamus proceedings to force the Warrenton school district to make tax levies to cash district warrants held by the defunct Astoria national bank have been instituted in circuit court here by John H. Cole, receiver for the bank. The bank holds approximately \$23,000 of Warrenton district warrants.

MOBSTERS DISPERSED

SAN FRANCISCO, July 16.—(AP)—Several mobsters who forgot themselves so far as to threaten to overturn a parcel post light delivery truck making a round of the financial district scattered quickly, along with a crowd of several hundred, when a National Guard truck equipped with two machine guns drove up. The soldiers trained the guns on the crowd and ordered immediate dispersal.

NO ATLANTIC STRIKE

NEW YORK, July 17.—(AP)—There will be no strike of longshoremen along the Atlantic seaboard as long as the International Longshoremen's Association retains control of organized dock workers, Joseph P. Ryan, president of the association, told the United Press today.

His announcement was made as heads of the Marine Workers Industrial union and the Seafarers' council pressed for a strike, and as the American Radio Telegraphers Association ordered picketing of west coast inbound vessels.

FEED HUNGRY

SAN FRANCISCO, July 17.—(AP)—To feed hungry thousands, the strike executive committee today authorized a total of 51 restaurants to serve meals.

The committee also recommended the appointment of a permit committee to issue permits, thus assuring continued supplies to all grocery stores.

Both wholesale and retail trucks will be allowed to make deliveries, the committee said, upon applying for permits.

PENSION MEET CALLED

A mass meeting in the interests of the old age revolving pension has been called for 7:30 o'clock Friday night in the Lane county courthouse. A speaker from the local committee will explain the plan.

RIOT AT SAN PEDRO

SAN PEDRO, Cal., July 17.—(AP)—Three policemen were injured and two asserted communists arrested here during the night in a riot which followed attempts of the officers to halt a meeting of 400 marie strikers.

Fighting started when a small group of officers arrested the speaker at the meeting. The crowd took the prisoners away from the police. Police reserves changed the tide of the battle.
