WALTERS FIRE STORY

(CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1)

Several fires seen here, flames shooting skyward over 200 feet and attracting hundreds of spectators to the scene. The central part of the mill appeared most damaged, with virtually all the machinery a total loss and hundreds of feet of lumber stock nothing but charred embers Tuesday morning.

Two trucks, which came in late Monday night and were backed into the plant for storage, were caught in falling timbers and burned. A tractor used for moving lumber around the docks also burned.

Fireman Is Injured

Fireman Elmer Smith fell when he broke through the burning floor and suffered severe burns on the left wrist.

The piles of stock lumber in the main portion of the mill on Pearl street were burning late Tuesday and firemen expected them to burn for several hours. They were being allowed to burn, Chief Nussbaum said, as they would smolder indefinitely if water were poured into the piles.

Firemen were on duty all day Tuesday with four lines of hose soaking down portions of the mill that were saved and keeping the burning mass under control.

The mill, operated by Fred Walters and R. O. Bushong, is one of the older mills in the city, having been in operation since 1922. Logs were trucked to the mill and fed into the electrically driven saws by power rollers.

No plans for re-building had been considered pending full determination of the loss and amount of insurance coverage, mill owners said.

SERA Projects Are Approved Tuesday

Approval of the state SERA committee of projects for improving the baseball park and city dump grounds at Cottage Grove and for additional work on Eugene's city hall was received Tuesday at the county SERA office according to Manager Earl M. Drew.

Work on the Cottage Grove project totaling \$2020 is expected to start next Monday. The city hall work, estimated at \$800, includes painting and kalsomining in the upper halls.

Roosevelt Getting Reports On Strike

U. S. S. HOUSTON, July 17.—(AP)—The news of strike developments on the Pacific coast was relayed to President Roosevelt today as his party and the accompanying U. S. S. New Orleans, halted off Clipperton island shortly after 11 a. m.

The island is a low atoll, two miles in diameter and owned by Mexico. The place is not inhabited by humans, but its rocky ledges are swarming with sea birds.

The president planned to depart late today on a course charged for Hawaii.

F-D Orders Probe Into Ocean Mails

WASHINGTON, July 17.—(AP)—President Roosevelt has signed an executive order directing the postmaster-general to investigate foreign airmail and ocean mail contracts made prior to June 16, 1933, and to make recommendations relative to the modification or cancellation of such contracts.

Scientist Digs Up 'Daddy of Serpents'

MONTGOMERY, Ala., July 17.—(AP)—What may be the "daddy" of sea serpents, a megalodon, has been unearthed in exploration of the state geological department, Dr. Walter L. B. Jones, state geologist, disclosed today.

"We have already taken out 10 feet of a 35-foot megalodon near West Green, in Greene county, that probably is 70,000,000 years old," Dr. Jones said. "And in the same county near Eutaw, we have unearthed a two-ton turtle, possibly as old. Both were encased in chalk of the cretaceous age."

Playing With Dud Kills 7 Soldiers

SAINT GERMAIN-EN-LAYE, France, July 17.—(AP)—The explosion of a forgotten trench mortar shell thrown playfully by a soldier at a group of comrades today killed seven of them and injured 25 on an artillery training ground.

This was the second accident to French armed forces due to forgotten shells within the past four days. A shell fired by accident from a destroyer at Toulon killed two sailors on a neighboring ship during cleaning operations.

British Warships Pay Call On Turks

ISTANBUL, Turkey, July 17.—(AP)—Eight British warships arrived here today as the British government requested a joint Anglo-Turkish inquiry into the killing Saturday of a British naval officer by Turkish soldiers.

When a skiff carrying a party of British officers approached the Turkish mainland off the island of Samos, Turkish soldiers were reported to have appeared and after waving the boat away, opened fire, killing Lieutenant J. W. Robinson, a surgeon.

Stolen Car Found In Dry Mill Race

Apparently stolen from where it was parked on Willamette street during the fire at the Walters-Bushong mill early Tuesday morning, a light sedan, belonging to L. M. Brown, Eugene, was found in the mill race at the east end of Fifth avenue Tuesday morning. The race is dry now.

Police found the car, which is registered in the name of W. J. Brown, L. M. Brown's father. Mr. Brown reported he was unable to find his car when he left the fire around 3 o'clock.
