

TRUCE IS CALLED IN DISPUTE OVER LAKE BED LANDS

CRANE, Ore., July 17.—(P)—Fence cutting, dam breaking and vitriolic contention over rights to 600 acres of land whose title is a supreme court question was halted by a truce called Sunday between embattled farmers and rolled cattlemen.

Last week a mile of fence was torn out, permitting thousands of cattle to trample and feed upon prize grain ripening for harvest in the "No Man's Land" of the dry lake bed 12 miles southwest of here.

Two irrigation dams also were opened, threatening to turn the fertile area into an unharvestable mire. However, the flow of water was checked.

Oats, wheat, barley and rye were planted on the soil which is claimed by the state and federal government.

Grain growers have been patrolling the area against further grazing attempts. Cattlemen contend the area is as much open to them as to grain men.

At yesterday's meeting, attended by the sheriff, district attorney and county relief heads as well as interested ranchers, arrangements were made whereby a grazing area was set out where grain was not planted. Patrols were hired at the expense of the ranchers to protect all interests.

The land, now part of the Malheur lake federal bed refuge, is not under title. The land is held under government supervision until outcome of supreme court action.
