sugar, salt and flour thoroughly. Add hot caramel mixture, stirring slowly and constantly, cook for 15 minutes, or until thick and, continuing to stir. Combine with beaten egg yolks. Cook slowly in double boiler for 5 minutes or until thick, stirring constantly. Latham... Cool, add whipped cream and vanilla. Pour into tray and allow to freeze. Before the cream has frozen solid enough to serve, remove tray from refrigerator. Stir well with spoon from front to back of tray. Then carefully fold in the stiffly beaten egg whites to which the salt has been added. Return to refrigerator and allow to finish freezing without further stirring.—Mrs. M. Johnson, 591 West Broadway, Eugene.

Hawaiian Nut Crunch
1 cup whipping cream
1 cup crushed pineapple
1 cup boiled rice
2-3 cups crushed nut brittle
6 marshmallows (quartered)
1/2 cup syrup from pineapple
Few grains salt.
Combine pineapple juice and marshmallows and cook over hot water until marshmallows are melted. Cool and then add the pineapple, well drained, rice, salt and crushed nut brittle. Chill slightly and then fold in the cream, stiffly beaten. Pour into refrigerator tray and freeze. Serve with additional crushed nut brittle sprinkled over the surface. Favorite Vanilla Ice Cream
1 pint whipping cream
2-3 cup powdered sugar
2 eggs
1 teaspoon vanilla
Whip whites of eggs. Whip cream and add sugar, and beaten egg yolks. Fold in egg whites and vanilla last. Freeze in trays. This ice cream is very quickly and easily made. Serve with crushed strawberries or any fresh fruit.—Mrs. Don A. Fraser, 5014 N. Post, Spokane.

with the elected representatives of their respective employees does not result in agreement within 30 days after the election the ship companies will submit to arbitration issues in dispute with respect to wages, hours and working conditions and they should agree now. All strikes should be called off immediately.

"Men should be returned to work without discrimination because of union affiliation or participation in the strike."

"Therefore be it resolved that this general strike committee assembled on July 19, 1934, now proposes upon acceptance by the shipowners, employers of striking maritime workers of the terms of the president's longshore board, for settlement of this strike, that this general strike committee will accept such a basis for the immediate termination of the strike."

"And be it further resolved that this general strike committee hereby advises all those unions that are now out on strike out of sympathy with the maritime workers and longshoremen, to immediately resume work and to pledge every resource, moral and financial for the continued progress of striking maritime workers of the successful termination of the maritime workers and longshoremen's strike."

MINNEAPOLIS, July 19.—(AP)—Fifty policemen armed with shotguns were assigned to escort trucks of a transfer company today by Chief of Police Michael Johannes. Striking truckmen so far have been successful in virtually strangling movement of commercial vehicles.

SANTA BARBARA, Cal., July 19.—(AP)—The condition of Marie Dressler, veteran actress, confined for three months here with a complication of cancer, heart trouble and uremia, was reported unchanged today.

ISTANBUL, Turkey, July 19.—(AP)—The age of Zaro Agha, the modern Methusalem, was attested officially today as 157 years. The register of births recorded his birth in 1777.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., July 19.—(AP)—Edward Young Clarke, former high official in the Ku Klux Klan, was sentenced in federal court today to five years in the Atlanta penitentiary on six counts of using the mails to defraud in connection with the organization of Eukasye, a fraternal order.

JOHNSTOWN, Pa., July 19.—(AP)—Southern Cambria county farms, transformed into watchful, armed camps, bear mute testimony today to the savagery of a trio of rabid-riden wild dogs raiding throughout the countryside. Three persons have been bitten and 20 head of cattle, sheep

and other livestock have fallen victim to the fangs of the dogs.

BERLIN, July 19.—(AP)—Chancellor Hitler was reported today to have expressed satisfaction with a report on the Nazi-sponsored program for unification of the Protestant church. The report was presented yesterday by Reichsbishop Ludwig Muller, who has suspended many pastors for their opposition to the plan. Opponents charged state interference with the church.

BERLIN, July 19.—(AP)—All novels and other literature by Upton Sinclair, widely known American author, were ordered confiscated and banned today. Sinclair's books have been among the best sellers in Germany.

WARSAW, Poland, July 19.—(AP)—Bodies of 120 victims of raging flood in southern Poland have been discovered, an official report said today, with 180 missing and believed to have perished. A new flood menace was feared at Cracow as a crest of water from the mountain regions roared down into the valleys. More than 55,000 were without food and shelter as swollen rivers continued to leave their banks after days of continuous rain.

Railroad Figures Show Northwest's Tourist Crop Good

Regarded as another sure sign of countrywide improvement in all branches of industry, vacation travel is registering a substantial increase over last year, according to Eugene representatives of the Southern Pacific company.

Summer tourists from all parts of the United States are turning toward the Pacific coast, with a steady growth in traffic as the season advances. It was announced, Eastbound travel also is heavy, the Chicago Fair again being a major attraction.

With roundtrip fares lower than in 1933, and Pullman rates cut one-third throughout the widespread territory served by Southern Pacific, indications are that the total summer business will show a remarkable gain, with practically all sections of the Pacific coast sharing in the distribution of the tourist dollar, company officials declared.

Air-conditioning of observation, club, lounge, room sleeper and dining cars on Southern Pacific's four crack trains, the Overland, Golden State, Sunset and Cascade, has been completed. It was stated, this innovation has made transcontinental trips cool and comfortable in the hottest weather, according to the announcement.

Carload of Hops Shipped From Here

A carload of hops, containing some sold by L. S. Christofferson, who operates a yard on the old Thornbury place north of the city, and some from the Lloyd Stafford yard near Goshen, was shipped from the E. B. Parks warehouse here Wednesday.

These hops were bought by John Roberts of Salem. The price was not given out but it is believed that the prevailing price—around 22 cents—was paid for these lots.

"When we boys left at the gate saw the car was not going to stop," Thomas' statement continued, "we put up our hands and yelled 'Stop.' We had to jump to keep from being run over. We did so, yelling 'stop' about five or six times. I then jumped through the gate and fired one shot in the air. The car, after the shots were fired, slowed up and let Mr. Marlowe off, then sped right on."

In the car with Ross was D. E. Nickerson, chairman of the strike strategy committee; Roscoe Craycroft, longshoreman; and Ernest Marsh, federal strike mediator.

Senator Wagner was in the car ahead, driven by B. A. Green, labor attorney. This car stopped properly at the terminal entrance and continued out well ahead of the Ross machine.
