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county chapter, Oregon Republicans—In face of the facts the calling of the state troops by Governor Meier was a mistake. Arbitration is the only answer to the longshoremen strike. Force will only aggravate the situation.

F. L. Beard, Eugene merchant—I do not believe the governor was justified in calling out the state troops without greater provocation. I doubt if it has the desired effect and I believe it will not meet with the approval of the citizenry of the state at large. At this late date, such display of military force seems unnecessary and it appears that the governor was possibly ill-advised in the matter.

Art Hendershott, city councilman—I am sorry to see such drastic action, and it is to be hoped Governor Meier knew what he was doing when he decided upon a move.

J. J. Rogers, lumberman—I am inclined to think the governor has done the right thing in calling out the troops. If the strike continues, the hardships enforced on other people, with no interest in the strike, would be unfair and I believe some action of a positive nature was necessary to end the strike.

M. L. Edmunds, banker—I understand conditions along the waterfront, the governor's action in calling out the troops was the proper thing to do. Business has been held up by a group of a few hundred persons. Sentiment among business men and among the working class too was becoming very antagonistic toward the few who were keeping the port closed and holding up normal business. Meier's action was favorably received by the majority in Portland and I was pleased to hear of his decision.

Fred L. Fisk, county judge—The governor's action seems surprising at a time when the situation appeared to be greatly relieved. The decision of the shippers to start work without further negotiation at this time is an invitation for more trouble.

Walter B. Dillard, county clerk—It looks bad from the outside.

Ben F. Keeney, county assessor—Men have a right to strike when they are not satisfied but they do not have the right to keep others from working if they wish to do so. It is a good thing that the troops are ready if needed.

M. R. Irish, grocer—Governor Meier had apparently had some information we do not have which led him to make the decision he did in calling out the troops. Till we know

what that information was, it is unwise to criticize his action.

C. K. DeNeff, Merchant—The governor's action in the present crisis seems premature. I believe he should have awaited arbitration of the matter to see what settlement could be effected in that way.

Rev. Cecil F. Ristow, pastor, Methodist church—I do not approve of the action of calling out the militia. I feel that any attempt to coerce a settlement by a display of military force is likely to cause more harm than good. The way out is to be found in peaceful procedure, through arbitration, not by displays of force. My understanding was that labor had agreed not to call a general strike unless the militia were called out and the action at this time appears to be an attempt to provoke a general strike.

M. E. Cully, secretary, Eugene chamber of commerce—It seems unnecessary to call out the militia at this time. Information coming from the strike front indicated an amicable settlement might soon be forthcoming with strikers about to submit the matter to arbitration. In face of the situation, I believe it unnecessary to call out the troops at this time.

C. J. Fulton, member Eugene water board—The governor appears to have adopted a policy of procrastination during the strike crisis, withholding definite action till too late to accomplish any good purpose.

Edward F. Bailey, chairman Lane county democratic committee—General Johnson said he could settle the longshoremen's strike in 24 hours if the general strike was called off. In considering this statement, the governor's action in calling out the troops seems a bit hasty. He has held off this long, he could have waited another 24 hours to see if the strike could have been settled.

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waterfront until then Governor Meier can dare the general strike threat with perfect confidence knowing that a mass walk-out will in the end vent its severest punishment upon the strikers themselves.

San Francisco unions would not believe predictions of that obvious outcome. Now that they have learned the truth, and waterfront strikers find their cause shaken as a result, Portland strikers would be blind to invite similar disaster. Portland commerce should resume at once.

Baker Democrat-Herald—The call for troops might well have been withheld a few days since the ending of the general strike in San Francisco gave promise of an early settlement by arbitration. We fear that Portland will now be faced with the danger of a general walkout.

Salem Capital Journal—President Roosevelt wirelessly Secretary Perkins that his confidence that common sense and good order would enable a reasonable solution of the dock strike. Both have been sadly lacking. Governor Meier's belated mobilization of the national guard at a time when Senator Wagner, and the president's board are on the job with good prospects of satisfactory settlement, and when the San Francisco unions have co-operated by calling off the general strike, is anything but commonsense. A more inopportune time could not have been selected for it inflames anew the belligerency of the strikers. All of the impelling reasons set forth by the governor exist in fact. The commerce, industry, business and agriculture of the state have been seriously crippled by the strike of 900 longshoremen—but it has been since May 9, and the governor failed to act.

Salem Statesman—The calling out of troops was justified when after the longshoremen rejected the very reasonable settlement endorsed by their own leaders, their pickets by violence and intimidation interfered with commerce. Thus the calling out of troops is somewhat belated. It is not clear just what what precipitated the calling out of troops at the moment when clouds appeared to be breaking. But the ports of the coast must be opened, and law and order must be restored.

Roseburg News Review—It is time for a show down. This is no longer a labor strike. A condition exists where 1000 men, unwilling to submit their arguments to arbitration by an impartial board have destroyed the commerce and industry of a million people. Instead of being down-trodden laborers striking for their rights and so entitled to a full measure of public sympathy, the longshoremen, by refusing any reasonable settlement by means of arbitration, have thus earned the classification of "public enemy" and shall have to be dealt with accordingly.

The governor has ordered the mobilization of the state troops. The mobilization is a sensible precaution and one that may finally save much bloodshed and property destruction.

Pendleton East-Oregonian—People are tired of strife, turmoil, violence and intimidation that produces disruption and unemployment. Governor Meier did not act hastily. He tried desperately for many weeks to bring about a settlement and it was through no fault of his that a peaceful adjustment was not obtained long ago. There will be no trouble unless lawless men create strife and if they do so the responsibility will be upon those who cause the disorder.

MEDFORD, Ore., July 20.—(AP)—This city and county, facing the bare possibility of a banner winter period of delay by the prolongation of strike condition at Portland, generally approved of the action of Governor Meier in calling out the national guard.

Frank L. Tou Velle, orchardist—I approve of the action of the governor. He undoubtedly been well-advised in his course, and is doing what he regards as best for the greatest number of people.

B. E. HARDER, banker—I don't want the troops called until it is necessary, but I want them handy if that time comes. Sixty days is long enough for the port of Portland, to be tied up while the business and commerce of the state slowly strangles.

E. M. Kelly, attorney—This is the first sign of fortitude the governor has shown, its about time, but better late than never.

W. A. Gates, merchant—The commerce of the state should be kept open, and the farm crops allowed freedom of movement. The labor dispute has lasted too long already.

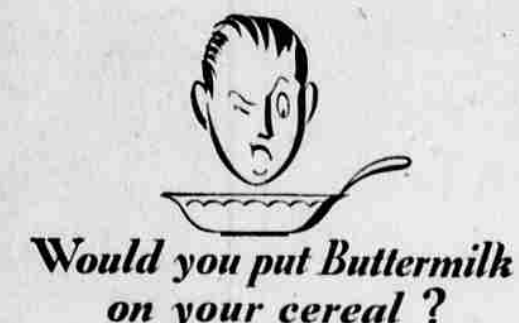
