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COST OF GUARDS HEAVY DRAIN ON EMERGENCY FUND

SALEM, July 20.—(AP)—An appropriation from the state emergency fund will be necessary for the Oregon national guard as a result of mobilizing troops at Clackamas, it was learned here today. The amount necessary to see the guard activities through the year could not be determined until after the strike in Portland has been settled.

The emergency board meets here Tuesday, unless the tentative date set by Fred E. Kiddle, chairman, will be changed. The guard budget was cut to strict normal maneuvers and the preparation and mobilization will increase the expenditures beyond the budget, it was pointed out.

More than \$2,000 will be required daily to maintain the 1,100 men at Portland, it was estimated at national guard headquarters here today. This does not include the traveling expenses in the mobilization today. In the mobilization nor the work in preparing for the emergency.

Virtually all staff officers of the national guard moved into Portland yesterday, most of whom will be located at the Multnomah county armory during the present situation.

ASTORIA, July 20.—(AP)—The six naval seaplanes, comprising Squadron No. 1 which arrived here yesterday, left at 1:30 p. m. today for Seattle. Squadron No. 9 was due to arrive here at 5:30 this evening. Both squadrons are bound for Alaska.

PENDLETON, July 20.—(AP)—A drizzling rain was falling here this afternoon, the first precipitation in over three weeks. Some harvesting operations were forced to halt until the weather clears.

ASTORIA, July 20.—(AP)—The trawler Valiant, valued at \$5000 and operated by John Somersness, Astoria, was swept onto Peacock spit at the north entrance to the Columbia yesterday afternoon and sunk. Somersness and Hans Hansen, the other man in the boat, were rescued by Carl Fromstad, a passing fisherman.

Union officials said here the men would "help out" in the strike and would remain in Portland indefinitely. Thomas was slated to return here tonight.

TRANSIENT GROUP MAY BE UTILIZED IN CANNING WORK

Approval of a project for setting up a small canning unit at the Eugene transient relief bureau with the expectation of providing about 10,000 cans of fruit and vegetables for the bureau's use during the coming year was received here Friday. The project calls for the expenditure of \$305.

Most of the foodstuffs to be canned will come from the gardens which have been worked by the transients. It is stated by I. F. Koch, director, about \$75 worth of peas and beans have been picked and are being held in cold storage until the canning unit is ready for operation. This is but the start of the crop of these vegetables, said Mr. Koch. A large yield of beets is ready also. Large quantities of tomatoes and corn are expected to be ready for canning within the next few weeks.

Fruit to be canned for use at the relief camp will have to be purchased. Of the 10,000 cans expected to be put up, 6000 will be in fruits and vegetables. Mr. Koch hopes to procure enough salmon during the fall run to make 4000 cans.

About \$125 worth of goods have been canned with the use of the portable county cannery but the necessity of caring for other sections of the county led to securing the special unit for the camp.

The garden project in connection with the local transient bureau has been outstandingly successful both in quantity and quality of the produce, said Mr. Koch. Reports from other centers indicate that the Eugene center ranks high in general achievements and is one of the leaders in coming close to the goal of making the transient camps as self-supporting as possible.
