Her father had the saddle made for her there. Miss Mathews married Gaven Mathews in 1911 and they moved to eastern Oregon near Mayville where she has ridden the saddle for many years. Miss Mathews is a niece of Mrs. Gaven Mathews.

Can any Oregon Trail booster beat this for whiskers? The above is a photograph of J. W. Maine of Shenandoah, Iowa, the father of Mrs. John L. Paden of the Santa Clara district. The whiskers were seven and a half feet long when the picture was taken in 1908. Mr. Maine died in 1921. He wore the flowing beard under his coat and his daughter says he was never inconvenienced by their extreme length. It was believed that he had among the longest whiskers in the world.

Three events will be run off in the big motorcycle hill climb to be held at Springfield's Benson hill Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock. It was announced today by William Davis and Ray Tausser, race riders, who are managing the Lane county program.

The first event will be open to all amateur riders and will include Bill Tattersall and several others from Eugene.

Both amateur and professional riders will be eligible to compete in the second event, but all amateurs will automatically become professional riders if they win in this event.

The third event will be open to professional riders only and will offer some unusual thrills to sports fans.

Ray E. Garner, northwest representative of the American Motorcycle association, will come down from Portland to direct the events and to check all records which will become official in this race. Other riders in Eugene and Springfield have been secured to assist in the judging and supervision of the races.

DAVIS WILL RIDE BRITISH CYCLE IN HILLCLIMB SUNDAY

A flip of a coin determined that Bill Davis, co-manager with Ray Tausser of Springfield motorcycle hill climb to be held Sunday on Beacon hill, would ride in the open and professional divisions of the afternoon program. He will ride the English manufactured Douglas motorbike now on exhibition at Babbs Hardware store.

Both Davis and Tausser are professional riders and have several records to their credit, but they realized that at least one of them would have to remain out of the events to take care of the many details incidental to the climb. It was a tossup and Davis won.

Old Rivals Return
Davis is one of the few riders who have stayed on a motorcycle to the top of the 70 per cent hill, and with the specially built English machine which is said to have many superior advantages over the American models, he hopes to lead the pack Sunday. Davis started in pioneering hill climbing as a sport 17 years ago and is recognized as one of the best in the country. Several of his old rivals in the season of 1932 when he barely missed winning first place in the national championship events at Muskegon, Mich., will be here to renew their feud.

Ryan to Come
Gene Ryan of Sacramento who nosed out Davis in 1932; Bob Keller, of Los Angeles, who was runnerup in 1933; Otto Drazer of Portland, northwest national champion; George Faulder of Spokane; and Don Westergaard and Neil Forsythe of Seattle are among the large list of entrants who will make the going rough for Davis. The Springfield rider is expecting much of the machine he has chosen to ride Sunday. This Douglas motorbike will be used for the first time in competition on the coast that day.

Gus the Goat Runs Out On Mat Card In City of Roses

PORTLAND, July 20.—(AP)—Gus Sonnenberg failed to appear here last night for his scheduled wrestling match with Bob Kruse and Promoter Virgil Hamlin announced he would recommend Sonnenberg's suspension to the Portland boxing commission. Substituting for Sonnenberg, Abie Kaplan bowed to Kruse's punishing wristlocks, losing two straight falls. Kruse won the first in 33 minutes, 30 seconds. After taking extra time out, Kaplan quickly fell into another wristlock as Kruse grabbed the weakened arm. Referee Vern Harrington stopped the punishment after 15 seconds.

CHICAGO, July 20.—(AP)—With only five days of voting remaining in the nation-wide poll to select an all-star college team to play the Chicago Bears, national professional football champions, at Soldier Field Aug. 31, the personnel of the team began to take shape today. Only seniors last season are eligible for the team.

Ends—Skidaway, Pittsburgh, and Smith, Washington.
Tackles—Krause, Notre Dame, and Schwammel, Oregon State.
Guards—Rosenberg, Southern California, and Schammel, Iowa.
Center—Bernard, Michigan.
Quarterback—Laws, Iowa.
Halfbacks—Lukats, Notre Dame, and Feathers, Tennessee.
Fullback—Mikulak, Oregon.
Sauer, Nebraska, is leading the fullbacks but will be unable to play because of a recent operation for appendicitis. Twenty-seven players will be selected for the college team, which will start training Aug. 15.

Railroad Figures Show Northwest's Tourist Crop Good

Regarded as another sure sign of countrywide improvement in all branches of industry, vacation travel is registering a substantial increase over last year, according to Eugene representatives of the Southern Pacific company.

Summer tourists from all parts of the United States are turning toward the Pacific coast, with a steady growth in traffic as the season advances. It was announced. Eastbound travel also is heavy, the Chicago Fair again being a major attraction.

With roundtrip fares lower than in 1933, and Pullman rates cut one-third throughout the wide-spread territory served by Southern Pacific, indications are that the total summer business will show a remarkable gain, with practically all sections of the Pacific coast sharing in the distribution of the tourist dollar, company officials declared.

Air-conditioning of observation, club, lounge, room sleeper and dining cars on Southern Pacific's four crack trains, the Overland, Golden State, Sunset and Cascade, has been completed, it was stated. This innovation has made transcontinental trips cool and comfortable in the hottest weather, according to the announcement.

MISS SELLARS NEAR OREGON GOLF TITLE

PORTLAND, Ore., July 20.—(AP)—Miss Florence Sellars was within one step of her second consecutive all-Oregon women's golf championship today following her surprise defeat of Miss Marion McDougall, northwest golf association champion.

Miss Sellars will meet Mrs. Z. H. Lane in the finals today. Mrs. Lane also provided an upset by defeating Mrs. B. E. Egan, Oregon Golf association titlist, 2 and 1.

The defending champion took an early lead on Miss McDougall, finishing the first nine 3 up. Miss McDougall never did regain control of her putting iron and Miss Sellars had little trouble squaring holes on the last nine to win a 3 and 2 decision.

Mrs. Lane, a public links player, also found an early lead to her advantage in defeating Mrs. Egan. She was three upon her opponent at the end of the first nine, and lost only one hole on the incoming nine.
