attitude of those voting today that an arbitration policy will be favored.
A newspaper man passed from the balloting room down the corridor lined with longshoremen waiting to cast their votes.
"Well, the first man has voted," he said.
"How did he vote?" several waterfront workers asked.
"Yes," twice," the reporter wisely cracked, and the men laughed and cheered.
Conrad Negstad, president of the Portland local of the I. L. A. was among the first five to vote. He declined to make any predictions on the outcome. Negstad was quoted yesterday as having said that he, personally, was "not sold on arbitration."
The election was run off in a business-like manner under the jurisdiction of Ernest P. Marsh, federal department of labor conciliator. The balloting was to continue until 8 p. m., at which hour the boxes were to be closed and the ballots sent to San Francisco for tabulation by the president's mediation board.

versal issues to arbitration.
A protest against the presence of national guardsmen at the headquarters of the International Longshoremen's Association, whose strike May 9 gradually led to the general walk-out, was voiced to President Roosevelt's labor disputes board.
Longshoremen's officials said the soldiers hurried to the voting place when some 3,000 stevedores appeared to cast their ballots.
Street Car Wrecked
"National guardsmen are preventing longshoremen from going to their hall to vote on arbitration," Ralph Mallen, I. L. A. publicity representative, informed Dr. Louis Bloch, chairman of the president's board.
Dr. Bloch promised to call the matter to the attention of the board immediately.
Acts of vandalism in the street car strike meanwhile were reported to police. One man was injured and four other persons were endangered when a No. 19 car was wrecked at the north end of Polk street. Police said vandals apparently had greased the track and the motorman lost control.
J. J. Mitchell, 56, the motorman, suffered a broken hip. Howard Holbrook, 45, conductor, and three unidentified passengers escaped injury.
Carmen Attacked
An attempt was made to fire the home of H. Poteet, a conductor. An unidentified person hurled a flaming gasoline saturated rag against the building, but the fire was extinguished quickly.
A shot was fired through the window of a restaurant adjoining the Haight street car barns of the Market Street Railway company. The cafe is patronized by employees.
William Hutchins, 65, a motorman, was attacked by men who leaped upon him as he left his home to report for work. His face was badly lacerated.
Mrs. S. Lovelock, whose husband is a street car man, told police a rock was hurled through a window of her residence. Several instances of street car men being beaten, allegedly by striking pickets, were reported to police.
