

BOARD CONSIDERS CHOOSING MAN FOR CHANCELLOR POST

PROBLEMS ACUTE
PORTLAND, July 23.—(AP)—Wrestling with the deplorable financial prospects of the coming biennium, 1935-37, the state board of higher education today heard a lengthy detailed report of the situation from Chancellor W. J. Kerr, and after transacting other routine business, went into executive session with the finance committee this afternoon to decide what tentative budgets will be submitted to the governor in advance of the next legislature.

No public discussion of the progress being made in the search for a new chancellor was made in the open meeting today, the situation "officially" remaining as it was at the June session when a committee was appointed to look over the field to seek a successor to Chancellor Kerr who previously had announced his impending voluntary retirement.

Officers Are Re-elected
This was the annual organization meeting, with all present officers of the board re-elected. These are Willard Marks, Albany, president; C. A. Brand, Roseburg, vice-president; B. F. Irvine, Portland, treasurer, and E. C. Sammons, the third member of the executive committee. C. D. Byrne, present acting secretary, was reappointed to that position. Among those present was Mrs. Cornelia Marvin Pierce, La Grande, who has been in Washington with her husband since congress opened last December.

In his report to the board Chancellor Kerr emphasized statements he had made previously that higher education is facing a real crisis the magnitude of which even many connected with the institutions themselves do not fully understand.

People Must Be Informed
"It is not for us to decide what the state can afford for higher education, that is the province of the legislature," declared the chancellor. "But it is our duty to report to the governor, the legislature and the people what the institutions must have if they are to continue to exist and render the service for which they were created by the people."

"The time has come that the people must know that higher education in this state is in real jeopardy, hoping they will not permit continued discrimination against education in comparison with other governmental functions."

Before presenting the detailed financial studies to the board, Chancellor Kerr reviewed the trends in higher education and pointed out the responsibility of administrators in keeping the services abreast of the changing needs of the people and of carrying on with every economy as dictated by general economic conditions. These functions, he said, he felt are being met in this state.

Major Schools Hard Hit

The major institutions in particular and all in general have had their millage support drained away in these major wars, the chancellor pointed out. First the two major institutions will have contributed out of their former normal millage income, a total of \$1,843,372.57 over two bienniums to compensate for the former direct appropriations made by the legislature for medical school, normals, extension and the like, lost through referendum.

Secondly, \$508,000 of the millage money itself was diverted to other state purposes during the current biennium. Finally the "millage pot" from which these moneys have been taken has dried up to the extent of \$1,057,940 loss through reduced tax valuations. This is comparing the 1920-31 millage yield with the prospective yield in 1935-37.

Continuing his figures, Chancellor Kerr showed that operation on the present restricted basis has been made possible only through the use of accumulated reserves which have now been all budgeted for the current fiscal year.

Nearly Million Dollars Needed
Thus, if the operation of the institutions were contemplated on the same basis as for last year, 1933-34, there is a prospective deficit in progress.

pective income of \$797,366 for the biennium even with no salary restorations, if the half million diverted two years ago is not restored by the legislature.

With this restored, and still no salary restorations, the deficit is still \$288,366. With salaries half restored, which many believe is the absolute minimum for maintenance of standards, the prospective deficit even with the half million diversion restored amounts to \$604,234. These and many other financial facts Dr. Kerr delivered to the board with the request that a definite decision on the position the board is to take be arrived at today so institutional heads may complete their tentative biennial budgets as required by law.

Minor bright spots reported by the chancellor included the notification of continuance of federal work aid to newly students on a slightly enlarged basis over last spring. This and other facts indicate an upturn in enrollment for next year of indefinite proportions, thus increasing the fee income to that extent. Summer session enrollment increased from 9 per cent at the eastern Oregon normal to 32 per cent at the state college, his report showed.

The AAA has come to the aid of the cooperative extension service to the extent of \$17,710 additional to compensate for duties piled on the county agents and others, while the university has received definite grant of private foundation funds to match sums set aside for municipal research. CWA and SERA projects brought the institutions \$96,700 in the last year supplemented with only \$18,000 in state board funds. These expenditures made possible averting serious plant depreciation, said Chancellor Kerr.

Gifts accepted by the board today included valuable equipment to the medical school from Dr. George W. Swift, of Seattle, and a gift to the state college of \$2880 by Mrs. Mary J. L. McDonald of San Francisco to equip a library room for housing the book collection she had presented to the college previously.

Sabbatical leaves were granted Dean R. B. Dillehunt, head of the medical school, after 22 years of service without such leave. Exact date of starting was left indefinite.

A. E. Engstrom, superintendent of the Astoria branch experiment station submitted his resignation to accept a position with the federal credit bank at Spokane. The place he has filled for 18 years was given to H. B. Howells, former county agent of Josephine county.

E. M. Smith, head of purchasing and claims in the central business office at Corvallis was advanced to assistant comptroller. At the university, Claud H. Brown was appointed assistant professor of law, and Henry L. Everett associate professor of law. Other minor adjustments or advancements in rank were passed upon as submitted.

TYPES OF BEARD IN ANCIENT TIMES TRACED FOR CLUB

Many ideas of what real whiskers were like in the days of ancient glory were obtained by members of the Eugene Kiwanis club, Monday, when Prof. Frederic S. Dunn of the University of Oregon Latin department presented an illustrated lecture on the history of whiskers.

Professor Dunn had a large collection of slides to show the different styles in whiskers throughout the ancient empires. His series began with pictures of Adam and it was pointed out how all artists' conceptions of Adam show the first man with a heavy beard. Mr. Dunn then showed several pictures of the deity, pointing out that while the Bible state God made man in his image, man has, through illustrations, created a god in his image, since all interpretations of God show him with whiskers.

Other pictures showed various Hebrew characters, including Moses, all with beards. Other pictures of ancient Assyrian rulers depicted them all with varied styles of beards. One group of pictures was given over to the unique style adopted by the Egyptian pharaohs.

Another group depicted the barbarians, Gauls and others, with their long mustache type of whiskers, this set of slides going on down to Charlemagne.

Another set traced the development of beards among the ancient Greeks. Beards were worn by all rulers and men until the time of Alexander who decreed that his army cut off its beards as a greater protection in war times, since the enemy could not grab the men by the beard. Mr. Dunn then showed a collection of pictures on the Romans, who had various stages of bearded men, first with beards, then a period without, and, finally, again with them.

Professor picked the man at the luncheon with the best set of whiskers to introduce him, the honor falling to John Jay Rogers.

An invitation was read from the Bend club to meet with the Eugene Kiwanis for a supper at Belknap Springs, the evening of August 3.
