Telephone Probe To Be Resumed First of August

SALEM, July 24.—(AP)—The investigations into the practices, rates and charges of the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company, begun nearly two years ago, will continue in Portland, starting August 1, Charles M. Thomas, public utilities commissioner, announced today.
Considerable engineering data, dealing mainly with property valuations, has been compiled and will be introduced at the hearing, which will probably continue for two weeks, Thomas said. The commissioner expected to write the final order in the case before the first of next year.
Thomas will preside at a hearing in Newport next Monday, on the application of the Southern Pacific company for permission to discontinue train service between Toledo and Yachima. Several residents of Toledo and Newport, had filed complaints, Thomas said.

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I've Figured It Out!

Water is cheaper for irrigation in Eugene than in any of the principal cities on the Pacific coast, except Seattle — and in the larger amounts even cheaper than Seattle.
The table below gives a comparison of cost of water for irrigation in principal Pacific coast cities, through a 5/8 in. meter, residential rate.
This is the way to figure your water bill. If your meter card shows "35," that means you have used 3500 cubic feet.
Used 3500 cubic feet
First 400 cubic feet (minimum charge) \$1.00
3100
Next 600 cubic feet at 11c per 100 .66
2500 balance at 5c per 100 1.25
\$2.91
If you will look at the Eugene column, under the 3500-ft. heading you will see that 3500 cubic feet costs \$2.91.

The Eugene rate is so constructed that at any time more than 1000 cubic feet are used you are charged 5c for each 100. The table below proves that this gives you a very low rate compared with other cities.
