"Gag" Rule Goes

One of the most important moves of the encampment was a resolution, presented by Seneca Fouts, first department commander, to allow politics to be openly discussed on the floor at regular camp meetings, and candidates to be mentioned by name and openly approved or disapproved. "We had to take the bill as a whole," he declared, "although it contained unsatisfactory features. I was glad to help override the pensioners." Edward F. Bailey, of Eugene, representative from the American Legion, told of his childhood hero-worship for Spanish-American war veterans, and gave a short talk on his own war experience.

As Emergency Act

MEDFORD, Ore., July 24.—(AP)—Formation of a "citizens emergency committee," composed of 200 members was announced this morning, to act under the guidance of constituted authority.

The committee announcement said it would be ready for "service on short notice in case of earthquake, fire, flood, hunting for lost persons, or disorder or riot."

Sheriff Walter J. Olmstead stated that the committee would act in conjunction with the last week, following the threat of workers strike, investigated he said, by representatives of the "cannery and agricultural workers union." A threat was made that strike would be launched unless demands of 40 cents per hour for year

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area and mileage of federal primary highways.

Fifty per cent of the appropriation is to be applied to federal primary highways, 25 per cent to secondary roads, and 25 per cent to highways within municipalities.

The allocation for primary highways follows: District No. 1, including northwestern counties north of Junction City, \$129,097; District No. 2, all western counties south of Junction City, \$293,701; District No. 3, central Oregon, \$310,000; Eastern Oregon, \$230,483.

For secondary highways the allotment was: District 1, \$360,911; No. 2, \$133,300; No. 3, \$148,811; No. 4, \$185,000.

Included in the total appropriation was \$170,581 for building of roads over public lands. This money will be divided between the eastern and central Oregon districts on the Idaho-Oregon-Nevada cutoff, the central Oregon highway in Harney county, and the Warm Springs cutoff.

Oklahoma's parched surface faced a new menace today—forest fires, 18 of which were reported licking up the valuable pastures—and the state relief administration asked \$500,000 immediately to fight conditions "the worst on record."

Housewives' Forum

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at home and easily reheated over the campfire. Chicken, veal or beef may be used. Whichever is used stew until tender and season well. Chicken is used in the following recipe:

Make a stiff cornmeal mush using the broth from the chicken instead of water. Cut the chicken into cubes and add to the chili sauce.

To make the sauce: Simmer the chili, then scrape off the pulp with the back of a knife or rub through a puree sieve. For each pint of the liquid cook 1/4 clove garlic in 2 table-spoons of oil, blend with 1 table-spoon of flour, then add 1 pint of chili pulp and the liquid in which the chili was cooked. Salt to taste and add a pinch of Oregano (Mexican herb). Remove seed and membranes.

(Note: A good chili sauce may be made by using the same amount of tomato puree as of chili pulp and adding 2 table-spoons prepared chili powder to each pint of puree and adding garlic, flour, salt and Oregano as stated above.)

Now have ready the dried corn husks, as many as needed. Place a large spoonful of the cornmeal mixture on husk and flatten out. Place a generous amount of the chili sauce and chicken on this and add a green olive also. Place another husk over this and roll up so that the cornmeal mixture forms a coating around the chili-chicken mixture. Tie each end firmly with twine. Continue until you have made as many tamales as needed. Then they are ready for the steaming. Steam thoroughly. Serve piping hot.—Nellie Morris, 744 High St., Eugene.
