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JUNCTION TO ENTER IN TRAIL PARADE

JUNCTION CITY, July 25.—(Special.)—Junction City will be represented by at least two entries in the Oregon Trail parade on Friday. A. E. Thomas went to the Nehalem valley near Vernonia where he has been in the early 80's and brought back a "backboard." The first light vehicle that entered that valley in '88. This has been continuously in the same family and is in a good state of preservation. Mr. Thomas will enter this in the parade and he will be dressed in the broadcloth wedding suit of his brothers. The wedding occurred in 1872. Mrs. Smith, the present owner of this backboard, will be with Mr. Thomas and they will have Nehalem valley pioneer badges, both of them being Nehalem valley pioneers.
Another object of interest will be the cart entered by the Rust brothers of Blachly and E. A. Rust of Junction City. The oxen are a fine pair of matched animals and have been well trained. The cart wheels were cut from one of the largest if not the largest fir tree in the Lake country. Two feet from the ground the tree was 14 feet in diameter and the wheels are nine feet through. It took two husky young "Rusts" four days to cut the two wheels, using an eight foot cross cut saw. The butt cut of the tree was too big to take out for lumber but the rest of the tree cut 43,000 feet of lumber up to the first limb. And this tree was perfectly sound, no decay. When Cal Young was told of this tree he said they couldn't get wheels out of it through because the tree would be decayed and so sure of this was he that he went to investigate and found that he was wrong. The tree was perfectly sound. J. W. Rust, a man that knows timber and on whose place the tree was, very carefully counted the rings and found 245, indicating the tree was that many years old. This cart was assembled in Eugene and will be an interesting feature of the parade.
