Special Train Will Run To Portland For Roosevelt Visit

Recognizing that statewide interest is centered in the visit of President Roosevelt and party to Portland and Bonneville Dam, Friday, August 3, Southern Pacific will operate a special train from Eugene and points north to Portland and Bonneville and will offer special roundtrip fares at less than one cent per mile for the event, according to advice received at local Southern Pacific office today from J. A. Ormansk, general passenger agent at Portland.

The special train will leave here at 7:30 a. m., arriving at Portland at 11:25 a. m. It will depart from Portland for Bonneville at 11:45 arriving there at 1:00 p. m. On the return trip the special will leave Bonneville at 5:00 p. m., arriving Portland at 6:15 and departing for Eugene at 7:00 p. m. The excursion tickets will carry a return limit of midnight, Monday, August 6, so that excursionists can spend the week-end in Portland, returning on regular trains, if desired. The roundtrip fare from here to Portland will be reduced to \$2.00 and to Bonneville and back from here, \$3.00. Only once before, in recent years, have such low fares been offered. That was on the occasion of the visit of "Old Ironsides" to Portland last year.

The President is scheduled to arrive in Portland aboard the U. S. S. Houston about noon on Friday. He will participate in a parade through Portland streets and then leave for Bonneville where he will make a public appearance and deliver a talk.

Business Good in Spite Of Drought, Heat And Strikes

SALEM, July 27.—(AP)—Full enforcement of the restaurant code in the state, including collection of fees, will be pushed immediately since the withdrawal of the suit in the Marion county circuit court attacking the validity of the act under which the codes have been formulated.

Max Gehlar, director of agriculture and administrator of the state codes, announced today the suit, entitled L. N. Sturtevant vs. Governor Julius L. Meier and Max Gehlar, had been withdrawn. The suit challenged the validity of the legislative statute under which all codes affecting agricultural products have been started, but particularly specified the restaurant code.

Gehlar announced that representatives of the prune group were among the most influential workers in bringing about the withdrawal of the suit, although all code groups formed a

defensive organization to fight the case.

Collection of license under the restaurant code was held up by the suit, but the department of agriculture announced collection of these fees will be started at once.

Man Is Found Dead At Hotel On Friday

Merrill D. Hammel, 40, of Fall City, died suddenly Friday morning about 5 o'clock at his room in the Eugene hotel. Mr. Hammel registered at the hotel Thursday evening and about 3 o'clock in the morning called a clerk and asked for some milk, saying he was ill. When the clerk returned to his room at 5 o'clock, he found Mr. Hammel dead and the milk untouched. Mr. Hammel was a salesman, buying and selling oak staves for a contracting firm in Portland.
