EX-CUSTOMS MAN HELD EMBEZZLER

SEATTLE, July 27.—(AP)—George D. Hubbard, former federal collector of customs for the 30th district, was arrested today under four United States grand jury indictments charging him with conspiracy and with embezzling liquor from the federal government.

Howard Crow, former deputy customs collector at Bellingham, also was indicted for conspiracy.

Indictment of Hubbard, a Republican appointed by President Coolidge on recommendation of the late Senator Wesley L. Jones, followed a long investigation by federal agents.

One charge was that he embezzled from government warehouses 84 quarts of whiskey on November 5,

1932, the day after the Roosevelt landslide. Hubbard had been endorsed by the Anti-Saloon League of Washington while Senator Jones was considering protests of Seattle businessmen against the appointment.

Hubbard was succeeded in office by Saul Haas, democrat in appointment of Senator Homer T. Bone, and Haas said investigation of customs agents who worked under Hubbard began before Haas took office. Haas suspended several customs agents after presentation by Special Agent Joseph Green of the treasury department, of evidence they believed implicated the men in diversion of liquor from federal warehouses to bootleggers, notably at one exclusive Seattle club.

It was generally believed, though not confirmed by officials, that other grand jury indictments named Henry and George C. Reifel, millionaire Canadian distillers now charged with gigantic liquor smuggling operations and free under \$100,000 bond each.

Parole System Is Denounced By Women's Leader

LOS ANGELES, July 27.—(AP)—A scorching denunciation of what she said was the working operation in most states of the parole system was delivered today by Mrs. Grace Morrison Poole, president of the General Federation of Women's Clubs, who arrived here enroute to Honolulu for the Pan-Pacific conference.

"Think of the human misery that would have been saved if John Dillinger had not been paroled in the first place," Mrs. Poole said.

"We must develop some procedure by which men with such tendencies as his cannot so easily be freed. Women throughout the United States are being aroused to the viciousness of the system as administered at present."

Mrs. Poole said the federation would ask the clubwomen of every

state to use their influence in having ratified the "compact law," through which state borders would no longer be protective lines to criminals.

The federation president said that organization was in favor of any wise movement to clean up motion pictures but against any plan verging on hysteria and censorship.

"Reform must come from within, not from without," she said. "In other words, if the people themselves demand certain standards for motion pictures, we will have them. Cleaning up the films takes time, just as cleaning a house takes time. It requires 365 days a year, and a good many hours each day."

Building Congress To Meet Tuesday

FORTLAND, Ore., July 27.—(AP)—Members of the Oregon Building congress will meet here next Tuesday to perfect plans for co-ordinated action in furthering the national housing act in Oregon.

C. C. Weidemann, executive secretary, said the act authorizes federal loans through established companies for remodeling work up to \$2000 and for new home construction up to \$20,000.

"The construction industry can render the public a great service," Weidemann said, "by being organized to function under the act, and it is to perfect such organization this meeting has been called. The congress stands for genuine public service in the industry."

He explained that the housing act "is one of the most significant acts of the recovery program, not only from the standpoint of the building industry but the public."

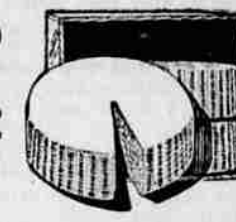

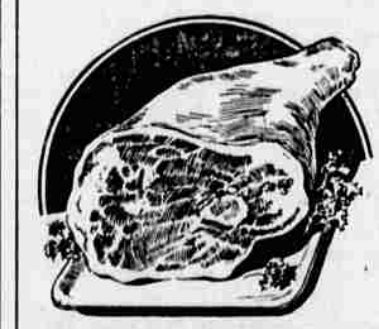

OREGON'S LIQUOR PROFITS SUBJECT TO FEDERAL TAX

PORTLAND, Ore., July 27.—(AP)—Profits from liquor stores
apparently will be subject to federal
tax, according to a ruling of
bureau of internal revenue.
However, gallons fees and licenses
paid from wine and beer dispen-
saries will not be taxed.
Making the ruling the general
of the revenue bureau held
that the liquor stores was a
primary as distinguished from an
incidental governmental activity. The
act is that if states find business
in liquor control commission
taxable other state may follow,
eliminating internal revenue. The
liquor control commission
petition to have the ruling set
aside as much as all profits realized
the venture must by law go to
state relief. Commissioner Alex
Harris said he did not know how
the matter would be taken up
on its outcome.

He said the commission has set
up a fund for paying the taxes,
which would become collectible next
year.

The revenue bureau's ruling read:
Profits realized from the operation
of liquor stores and similar activi-
ties by the state of Oregon through
Oregon liquor control commission
derived from proprietary as dis-
tinguished from essential governmen-
tal activities. Accordingly, such pro-
fits are subject to federal income

taxes and control by the dispo-
sition of the manufacture, sale, dis-
tribution, use, and advertising of
liquor by private parties constitute
exercise of essential governmental
functions. Taxes and license fees col-
lected in the supervision and regula-
tion of such activities do not consti-
tute income or profit which is sub-
ject to federal income tax."

W. Maloney, customs collector
requested the opinion.
May 21, 1934, the United States
circuit court upheld the federal gov-
ernment's right to levy taxes on the
profits realized by the state
which was a set-up similar
act of Oregon.

In its opinion the supreme court
held that "whenever a state engages
business of a private nature it
is non-governmental functions,
the business, though conducted
by the state, is not immune from the
taxes of the power of taxation
and the constitution vests in the
taxes."

The opinion further held that
the power is and remains a gov-
ernmental power, and applied to busi-
ness activities is the power to regu-
late such activities, not to engage in
them on."

The supreme court cited its pre-
cedent which sustained the right
of North Carolina to control the sale
of liquor by the dispensary system.
It is observed that "mingling the
right of profit with the necessity
of regulation may induce the state to
possess, in like manner, of
liquor, oleomargarine, and all other
of internal revenue tax. If
state finds it thus profitable,
states may follow, and the whole
of internal revenue tax be thus
lost."
