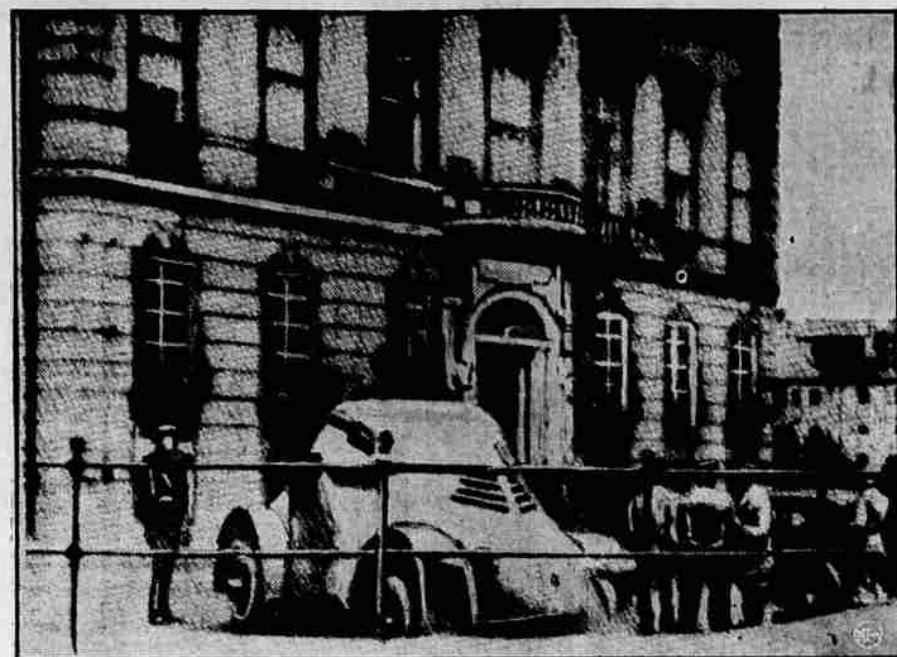

Holman Responsible For Holding Draft

SALEM, July 28.—(P)—The state treasurer, which holds a \$1,000,000 draft of a Portland bank on the federal reserve bank of San Francisco, without interest, does so at his own responsibility, the Attorney General ruled in an opinion requested by State Treasurer Rufus C. Holman.

Holman stated that they have funds from various sources which he had not been able to deposit at interest and so took out a draft on the federal reserve bank. The law provides the treasurer should deposit funds in solvent banks at the best possible interest rate. Being unable to do this has resulted in the treasurer following the other course.

Attorney General Van Winkle pointed out that the statutes made no provision for this procedure. The treasury still has funds on hand which have not been deposited because so far none of the banks desire interest-paying time deposits, and government securities on one year or less yield no interest.

General Markham To Meet Roosevelt

PORTLAND, July 28.—(P)—The Portland office of the United States army engineers announced today that Major General Edward M. Markham, chief of engineers, will reach Portland late Tuesday from Washington, D. C., via San Francisco, and will meet President Roosevelt here Friday on the president's return from his tropic sea cruise.

General Markham will go to Seattle Wednesday and will return to Portland Thursday afternoon. He will assist the president on the latter's tour of army engineer projects on the Columbia river and in Montana.

Admiral W. R. Gherardi, chief of the navy hydrographic service, is expected here next Wednesday or Thursday on a Pacific coast tour.

Ickes Kids Press Group When Caught Visiting Johnson

SAN FRANCISCO, July 28.—(P)—Secretary Harold Ickes poked fun at a group of newspapermen here today when they caught him on a vacation visit at the office of Senator Hiram Johnson.

When one newspaper reporter told of having to go without food a day during the general strike, the secretary intimated it might not have been due to the strike, recalling "when I was a newspaper man I often went without meals and there was no strike either."

Ickes would not give his itinerary beyond the few hours he intended to spend here. He admitted he would meet President Roosevelt when he lands at Portland next week, and go with him to visit the great Bonneville and Grand Coulee projects, and thence to Washington.

He was asked to comment on the labor and strike situation throughout the country.

"Well, the only thing I can say is that they don't strike unless they have jobs."
