

ROADSIDE BEAUTY EXECUTIVE GROUP DISCUSSES POLICY

Twenty-two men and women from Portland, Bend, Salem, Marshfield and other cities, convened in Eugene Saturday afternoon for an executive council meeting of the Oregon Roadside Beauty Council, which was held at a luncheon meeting at the Osburn hotel.

Many important issues were discussed with the following results: Mrs. Jessie M. Honeyman, president, will within the next few days appoint committees for the task of considering (1) the allocation of federal funds which will be available this fall for highway beautification; (2), the adoption of plant material foreign to the state for roadside plantings; (3) whether or not the council will ask for the appointment of a highway landscape engineer; (4) to decide whether or not the council will join with representatives from the nurserymen, the state grange and the state highway commission in opposing advertising on the highways, even when the advertiser is a state department.

Under the allocation of federal funds, two specific items were introduced for consideration, one the bridge heads on the Yaquina bay and Coos bay new bridges, described by Edward Miller, president of the Oregon Coast Highway association, and a unified plan for beautification of city entrances.

Judge Robert W. Sawyer of Bend recommended very little and careful planning, considering that planting efforts should be devoted more to saving what the state already has, and that the council continue to develop public appreciation for Oregon's natural scenic beauties. Dean Eric W. Allen of the University of Oregon School of Journalism spoke on the use of foreign material in this state.

A glowing tribute to Mrs. Honeyman was paid in behalf of the other members by Frank Branch Riley at this session. He commended her vision and untiring effort in nationalizing the group and the work which has made the Oregon group nationally known, he concluded by saying "her interest is as spacious as the nation itself."

Mrs. W. S. Nickelson, of Marshfield, president of the Oregon State Federation of Women's clubs was present and promised the wholehearted support of her groups in the projects of the roadside beautification group.

It was decided that the Oregon Roadside Beauty Council would have an exhibit at the state fair this fall and also at the Pacific Livestock show.

The annual meeting will be held this fall in Portland but no date or place was set.

BIBLE STANDARD ELECTS OFFICERS AT SESSION HERE

Election of officers closed the 14th annual general conference of the Bible Standard, incorporated, held in Lighthouse Temple, Eugene, this past week and Rev. Harry R. R. Neat, of Eugene, was named as general superintendent; Rev. R. E. Southard, of Tacoma, Washington, assistant superintendent; Howard N. Morse, Eugene, recording secretary and treasurer; Rev. F. L. Hornshuh, Klamath Falls, moderator; Earl S. Williamson, Lowell, editor of the Overcomer magazine. Other officers filled were the Home and Foreign mission boards, board of trustees, and board of elders. Rev. Fred Hornshuh presided.

The Bible Standard church is a comparatively new organization, having been incorporated in Eugene in 1919. The present headquarters is the Lighthouse Temple, the home church of the organization. Since its inception, branches have been established in the Pacific coast and mid-west states, Canada, Australia and missionaries placed in South Africa, Burma and India.

The official organ of the Bible Standard is the "Overcomer" magazine, which is published in Eugene under the editorship of Howard N. Morse. The organization has its own Bible training school, the Bible Standard Theological school, in the Lighthouse Temple.

At the recent conference, an international young people's organization was formed, known as the "International Bible Standard Overcomer" and is an extension of the former Overcomer group. The extension of the organization is a result of the establishment of Overcomer societies in foreign countries.

A survey of the churches shows a marked advancement in the church program during the past year, and further extension of the organization boundaries. The financial reports of the various departments, indicate a large increase in funds during the fiscal year.

New plans have been developed to extend the interests of the church in unoccupied fields, establishing churches where the need is most apparent.

Discharges Blamed On Union Activity

PORTLAND, July 28.—(AP)—A complaint charging that six employees of the Oregon Worsteds company have been discharged because of their membership in the union of "United Textile Workers of America," suit was filed here Friday to enjoin the company and officers from interfering with or intimidating its employees "with respect to their right to self-organization for purposes of collective bargaining or other mutual aid or protection."

The state federation of labor and the local union brought the action. Ray T. Bishop is president and general manager of the Oregon Worsteds company.

Medford Municipal Setup To Be Studied

Medford has been selected as the

second city to be surveyed by the League of Oregon Cities, and a complete analysis of its finances, administration and other details will be made available to officials of other cities of the state, it was announced Saturday by Herman Kehrl, executive secretary of the League and director of the University of Oregon bureau of municipal research and service.

Medford was selected as a representative of cities from 8,000 to 12,000. Charles McKinley, professor of political science at Reed college in Portland, will make a thorough study of all city activities. The information will be sent out from the Eugene office of the League.

Oregon City was the first city to be selected for the survey, and the work there has been completed by Professor McKinley. Selection of a city from 2,000 to 2,500 population will be made as soon as the work is completed at Medford.

18 State Employees Out at Salem; No Funds Is Reason

SALEM, July 28.—(AP)—Eighteen employees of the Motor Carriers Division of the Public Utilities Commission today received notice their jobs were at an end due to reported insufficient funds to carry on the full enactment of the transportation act.

Herbert Hauser, supervisor of transportation, said none of the eighteen had been discharged for any other reason than that the funds remaining would not provide for maintenance of the full staff of 42 which he declared necessary to carry out the work in collecting fees from trucks and busses as provided in the 1933 legislative act.

The state emergency board this week appropriated but \$10,000 to continue the work. The department had requested \$30,000 which they declared was necessary for full enforcement of the law.

Bristol Bar To Be Closed to Fishing

SEATTLE, July 28.—(AP)—The entire Bristol Bar area in Alaska, habitat of the Alaska red salmon, will be closed to fishing next year, United States Commissioner of Fisheries Frank T. Bell announced following his return today from a six-weeks tour of Alaska.

He said a year's lay off would aid the anticipated light run-year and give the area a chance to build itself. He said the industry could afford to lay off a year after packing about 1,700,000 cases this season.

The Pacific canned salmon association considered Bell's action would offset a likely decrease in price, which might follow the heavy pack of this season. E. B. McGovern, president, said the closed season would likely promote buying and prevent demoralization of the market.

Guilty? Attempted Escape Proves It

PORTLAND, Ore., July 28.—(AP)—An attempt to escape from a police court detention room here today cost Clifford A. (Count) Clark, 40, a negro, a \$500 fine and a six-month jail term.

Clark, booked here as a fugitive from Los Angeles and Seattle, pleaded guilty to a charge of disorderly conduct by attempting to escape. Sentence was passed within a half hour after the attempted break. He has long been known as one of the "swell dressers" of Portland's north end waterfront district.

EXCHANGE BOARD TACKLES TASK OF REGISTERING STOCK

WASHINGTON, July 28.—(AP)—The stock exchange commission is setting about the task of registering the country's stock exchanges and the securities sold on them.

The law requires that an exchange must be registered or specifically exempted from registration by October 1 in order to continue in business.

Similarly, the shares bought and sold on the registered and exempted exchanges must themselves be registered with the commission by that date if transactions in them are not to violate the law.

The act says exchanges and corporations which wish to have their stock listed may make application beginning September 1. Thus the time limitations of the law leave the commission exactly 30 days to complete this phase of its work.

Liberal exponents of strict regulation have complained that this is insufficient, since the commission must make numerous weighty decisions in connection with the registration, especially as the result of a section of the law which says:

"No registration (of an exchange) shall be granted or remain in force unless the rules of the exchange include provision for the expulsion, suspension, or disciplining of a member for conduct or proceeding inconsistent with just and equitable principles of trade, and declare that the willful violation of any provisions of this title or any rule or regulation thereunder shall be considered conduct or proceeding inconsistent with just and equitable principles of trade."

Equipped with a voluminous mass of information gathered by the senate banking committee, in the course of its investigation of Wall Street practices, including the rules and much other information regarding the New York stock exchange, the commission is making an early start on this first phase of its work.

The wording of the law, gives it authority to decide what are "just and equitable principles of trade," which in the opinion of those who have studied the act, is one of the widest discretionary powers that it confers.

Survivors of Ship Wreck Arrive Safe In Canadian Port

NORTH SIDNEY, N. S., July 28.—(AP)—Six survivors of an explosion which wrecked the fishing vessel Astrid W., off the Grand Banks last Saturday arrived in port today on the Danish steamer, Allisund.

The survivors were unable to fully explain the tragedy. All 15 members of the crew took to life boats after the explosion, they said, but the fate of the missing nine members was unknown.

The Allisund picked up the six men early today.

Still unreported and missing was the captain's boat bearing Capt. Walter Crowe, Mate Albert Crowe, Walter Corkum, Noble Conrod, and Bradford Wyncat. In the second missing boat were Wallace Flener, Clyde Oxner, Amos Crowe and Albert Shankle.

Today's survivors were Clarence Crowe, Lloyd Flener, Walter Demont, Harry De Courcy, Eric Smith and a man whose name was not immediately learned.

36,000 Toothpicks Make One Violin
