NORMAN, Okla., Aug. 1.—(Special)—Neal Myers, runaway college boy, pleaded not guilty at arraignment today on a charge of murdering Marian Mills, 20-year old campus beauty at the University of Oklahoma.

"All that came to me was the awful scandal that would come to the Millises and my family. I loved Marian and we had planned to get married."

"I had tried to get her to marry me before, but she wouldn't do it."
