

ADVERTISE OREGON SAYS HOLLIS AFTER VIEWING MID-WEST

A long-term program of honest advertising, designed to give residents of the middle west accurate information regarding conditions in Oregon, was held forth as an outstanding need for the development of Oregon in a talk by Orlando Hollis, of the university law faculty, at the Eugene chamber of commerce forum luncheon at McCrady's cafe Thursday noon.

Mr. Hollis' talk was a feature of the program sponsored by the Eugene Active club which met with the forum.

After sketching drought conditions in the mid-west, Mr. Hollis emphasized that residents of that area still have money and that by giving them honest information regarding the benefits to be derived from living in Oregon, people would come here to locate, establishing markets for produce and bringing about a real development of this country.

"From the summit of the Cascade eastward to Kansas and Missouri, we found a scarcity of water," the speaker declared, adding that crops in Kansas and Nebraska were ruined beyond hope by the extreme heat and lack of water. Corn had never exceeded a height of two feet, he said.

"In advertising Oregon, we need to avoid the type of propaganda sent out from California," Hollis warned. "Talking to people in the middle-west we found they didn't believe anything they heard about California. They also had much misinformation about Oregon, some of them saying they wouldn't care to live in a state where it rained 360 days a year."

Hollis paid tribute to the technical skill displayed by Oregon's state highway department in construction highways, declaring that throughout the middle-west they saw road construction methods long since discarded in Oregon. One of the first impressions received by Oregonians when traveling away from Oregon, is that of respect for the roads in this state, he said.

Hollis touched on the liquor situation in other states, showing how they differed from Oregon and wherein this state's system was superior to plans in many other states.

"Cities in the middle-west are busy and their activity appears based on sound industry," he commented.

He told of making guesses on the population of each city from an inspection of business districts, basing guesses on Eugene's business district in regard to its population, and declared that in virtually every instance, the guess as to the population was two or three times more than the actual figure. He laid this to the fact that business districts in cities ordinarily seem larger than the city population would warrant because of the large trade area of each city beyond its own limits.

In commenting on mid-western cities, Hollis said residents seemed to take great civic pride in their towns, building beautiful parks and museums. "In no city we visited did we find parks as bad as those in Eugene," he declared.

Before turning the program over to Ed Johnson, as president of the Active club, the chamber reported on new members and brought out the point that more than 300 out-of-town visitors had registered at the chamber during the pageant. These people came from New York, Florida and other states and stopped here for the pageant, H. E. Culey, secretary said.

Mrs. Alberta McMurphy, chairman of the special chamber park committee, reported that that group would make a tour of inspection of city parks next Monday for the purpose of outlining definite plans of improvement.

The next meeting of the forum will be held at McCrady's cafe Friday with the Eugene Lions club having charge of the program.

with white sauce, put buttered crumbs on top, bake 30 minutes 350 degrees. Shrimp Creole

1/2 cup butter
2 small onions
2 green peppers
1-8 cup flour
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 to 1 teaspoon paprika
1 quart can tomatoes
6 cups shrimp
Could use 2 cups mushrooms
1-8 teaspoon tobacco sauce
1 tablespoon Chile sauce
2 tablespoons butter. Put butter in saucepan add onions and peppers simmer 15 min. put remainder of butter in large double boiler. Add flour and seasonings and blend well. Add tomatoes, stir until smooth, add remaining ingredients, cook until thoroughly heated. Serve in patties.—Mrs. Anna Peebin, Eugene.

Pineapple Napoleons
Bake a rich pastry crust or puff paste, and cut immediately into squares. Spread first crust with a half-inch layer of well drained crushed pineapple and sprinkle with powdered sugar. Add another crust and spread with whipped cream. Put on the top crust and garnish with pineapple and whipped cream.

Cheese biscuit (to serve with salad)
—Sift together 2 cups flour, 3 teaspoons baking powder, add 1/2 cup cheese, grated, and 1/2 teaspoon salt. Work in 2 tablespoons butter with tips of fingers, add 1 cup milk. Drop from spoon in uniform small portions on baking sheet. Bake 15 minutes in moderate oven.—Mrs. P. G. Bradway, Motor Rt. 3, Eugene.

Norway Sandwich
Boil two cups of tomato, add a pound of chopped dried beef, half a pound of rich cheese which has been put through a food chopper. Let come to the boiling point, add one beaten egg and cook to the spreading consistency. Add cayenne and spread on buttered bread. Bonneville Trip First
Almost as soon as the president's feet touch American soil again after his month's ocean voyage, about noon tomorrow, he will be off to the site of the \$31,000,000 Bonneville hydroelectric and canalization project, 40 miles up the Columbia river from Portland.

Saturday morning after an overnight trip to Spokane, the train will backtrack to Ephrata in central Washington where the president will drive by automobile to the \$63,000,000 Grand Coulee damsite 55 miles away.

Thousands of Oregon and Washington residents anticipated hearing brief talks by the president. Parking space for more than 3,500 automobiles has been provided at Bonneville, while a natural amphitheatre near the Grand Coulee damsite will accommodate the 40,000 or more Washington citizens expected there for the president's visit.

Saturday night will see the president aboard his train for the trip from Spokane to Belton, Mont., en route to Glacier national park.

President Roosevelt will travel by automobile through the Ark. passing over the continental divide of the Rocky mountains on the newly opened "Going-to-the-Sun" highway, which is said to surpass Switzerland in scenic beauty.

The president's first address to the nation after his vacation cruise to Hawaii will be broadcast from Two Medicine Lakes, Mont., about 7 p. m. (M. S. T.) Sunday night.

EMERGENCY EXPORT GROUP SELLS WHEAT

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 2.—(AP)—Lorraine Hall, Willamette university's women's dormitory, will serve as residence for 60 unemployed Oregon women for one month of educational and relief work financed from federal appropriations, acting President F. M. Erickson announced today. The school will open August 10. Those to attend will be selected among women between the ages of 18 and 35 by relief agencies throughout the state.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2.—(AP)—The farm administration announced today it had sold 27,641,005 bushels of wheat and flour and export through the North Pacific Emergency association up to the close of business July 26.

A total of 27,649,204 bushels has been purchased by the association, of which 22,751,526 bushels had been purchased by the association, longshoremen's strike in the northwest paralyzed shipping.

The association has paid an average of 22 cents per bushel, or a total of \$5,071,493, in subsidizing these exports it pays the difference between the Chicago market price to Washington, Oregon, and Northern Idaho farmers and the low export price at which the wheat has sold on the world market.

The administration declared that while Pacific Northwest wheat supplies are smaller than a year ago, the crop of 1934 will maintain supplies well above the needs of local consumption.

Some hard types of northwestern wheat are now moving in considerable volume to interior and eastern markets by rail and greater volume is anticipated as shipping activity is resumed from Seattle, Tacoma, and Portland.

The price of wheat at North Pacific ports is now about 15 cents per bushel under the Chicago September quotations. If this price relationship can be maintained and the surplus portion of the crop can be used in other sections of the country without disturbing prices, continuation of the export association may not be necessary, the administration said, although it will be maintained for future use if needed.

Leroy Canoy, Portland, placed first in drafting and Will E. Smith, Salem,

first in cartooning. S. Wakefield, Milwaukie, was second in a commercial contest. Perole Olsen of Marquette, in fourth place in the "commercial" contest, while an ensemble design by Walter Hoffmeister of Portland, accepted by the conference as a national ensign.
