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HINDENBURG DIES QUIETLY; DEATH WIDELY MOURNED

in the early days of the war, will be the scene of a memorial service over the body of the dead president tomorrow.

The body will be taken to Hohenstein, a small town close to the Tannenberg monument, the scene of state observance. Government officials, diplomats, and von Hindenburg's brothers-in-law, as well as a large number of fellow citizens from all parts of Germany are expected to attend.

Thus it will be East Prussia, the province in which the Hindenburg family rose and where the field marshal played an important role as a soldier which will be the background of the service—not the capital.

The body will be brought the 30 miles back to Neudeck Tuesday and there it will be buried.

It was said that von Hindenburg did not wish to be buried in the Neudeck cemetery but, instead, had selected a solitary spot a short distance from the Neudeck mansion. It is in the midst of a wide lawn and there are no trees close by.

Von Hindenburg's wife died in 1921.

PERSHING HAS PRAISE—PARIS, Aug. 2.—(AP)—General John J. Pershing, World War opponent of Marshal Paul von Hindenburg, paid tribute to him today as "one of the outstanding figures of the World War."

The American general said the late President von Hindenburg's "masterly conduct, his campaign on the eastern front, marks him as a great general."

General Pershing said: "His devotion to Germany and her people, whether in military or civil capacity, was his most striking characteristic."

KAISER WIVES SYMPATHY—DOORN, Holland, Aug. 2.—(AP)—Former Kaiser Wilhelm sent a telegram of sympathy today to Colonel Oskar von Hindenburg, referring to his father, the late president of Germany, as the "immortal" hero of the battle of Tannenberg.

The text of the former kaiser's message:

"The kaiserin and I mourn with moved hearts with you and the whole German people. A life richly blessed by the Lord has found its end. The crown prince will convey our last greetings and homage to the immortal hero of Tannenberg."

"Signed, Wilhelm R. I."

CAPITAL APPREHENSIVE—WASHINGTON, Aug. 2.—(AP)—The death of von Hindenburg, Germany's "grand old man," and the assumption of the presidency by Chancellor Hitler came as no surprise to official Washington, but administration officials refrained from making any official comment on the political significance of the event.

Secretary of State Hull, immediately after being informed of von Hindenburg's death, issued a short formal statement in which he expressed his sorrow at the passing of Germany's president and World War hero.

Official Washington has pondered the future of Germany without the stabilizing hand of von Hindenburg with considerable apprehension. Little doubt exists in the minds of officials here that Germany now faces its great crisis.

OBSIDIAN CAMP TO START ON SUNDAY

now totaling \$362,000, progress on this highway will go far toward final completion, it was said.

With \$15,000 allocated for the South Alder street road, the section graded by the county before the work was taken over by the state under the secondary highway regulations, will be started this year. This does not complete the road, but merely gives a hard surface to that portion graded by the county, according to P. M. Morse, county engineer.

A fund of \$21,000 is allocated for oiling the old territorial road in the vicinity of Elmira and Veneta. A four-mile stretch will be oiled under this allocation, it was said.

Resurfacing of Sixth avenue from Blair boulevard to Willamette street and of East Broadway, sought by city officials, is provided for under an allocation of \$16,200. Non-skid

SALEM, Aug. 2.—(AP)—The state highway commission will probably open bids on a large number of the \$9 projects, to be paid for out of the \$3,100,000 federal highway aid funds, at a meeting early in September, officials announced here today.
