The president wore a light gray suit which emphasized the bronzed tan which he acquired on his long sea voyage.

As the president prepared to leave the cruiser that had been his home for a month, a brisk, unseasonable shower beat down from quickly gathering clouds. The slanting rain dampened the clothing of the thousands in the harbor area, but it could not dampen the enthusiasm of the crowd already stirred to wild cheering by the sight of the president's radiant and magnetic smile.

**MRS. F. D. JOUSTED**—PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 3.—(U.P.)—Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt was tumbled by a mob of mis-directed persons who closed in about her in the courtyard of the Hotel Portland as she waited to be driven to the harbor to greet the president today.

Because the car in which she was to be taken could not get through a crowd, the first lady was forced to stand in the courtyard for several minutes. The crowd closed in and was forced by those on the outside.

Some women seized at her coat and hat and she was jostled about quite roughly before she was rescued by secret service men and police, and dispatched to the harbor in another car.

**THOUSANDS AT DAM**—BONNEVILLE, Ore., Aug. 3.—(U.P.)—Ten thousand persons milled about the damsite here at 1 p. m., awaiting the arrival of President Roosevelt.

Fain had fallen intermittently all morning and the works were deep in mud.

**Pitchers of Beer May Be Outlawed**—PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 3.—(U.P.)—The "pitcher of beer" may be outlawed in Oregon. The state liquor commission at an adjourned meeting here last night instructed George Neuner, its attorney, to draw a regulation limiting the size of beer containers to be legally sold for consumption on the premises at 12 ounces.

The regulation was to come up at the commission's next meeting.

It was reported that a number of beer parlor owners were offering extra large pitchers to attract the thirsty trade. Administrator Sammis told the commission the pitcher parlors were nuisances.

**MAY BE KING!**

**ROOSEVELT GIVEN**—PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 3.—(U.P.)—His lips forming unspoken words of greeting, through the streets of this proud happy city the president went in an open car, the second of the motorcade. Mrs. Roosevelt with him in the rear seat of the automobile, and Governor Julius Meier sat between them.

**Head For Bonneville**—A presidential caravan left city center, crossed the Willamette river and headed eastward over the highway to the Columbia river. It gained speed, not much speed, though, as secret service operatives instructed. The way was slippery in spots and there was no emergency calling for full speed.

The caravan proceeded up the highway route to the site of Bonneville power and navigation on the Columbia, where other thousands waited for the president. At the site of this \$51,000,000 project the president was to deliver a brief address.

This done, and having made a tour of the workings of the dam, he was to board the presidential train for Spokane. Arriving tomorrow, he will make a trip to another huge federal undertaking, the Grand Coulee dam, and again be planned to address a large assembly.

**GUNS FIRE SALUTE**—PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 3.—(U.P.)—By shooting thousands, President Roosevelt docked at Portland after 11 a. m. today.

Brilliant sunshine beamed through the clouds as the president's train pulled into the Portland station.

A salute was fired as the train pulled slowly and majestically under the high draws of the bridge, under which the president passed as it entered the downtown area of the "Rose City."

**President Bronzed**—The president was not on the bridge as he passed, but his two secretaries, Colonel Louis McHenry Howe and Stephen T. Early, moved to the front of the officers and crew.

## Orders For Lumber Show Big Increase

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3.—(U.P.)—Continued improvement in the lumber industry was reported today by the National Lumber Manufacturers' association for the week ending July 28.

Based on the activities of 1345 mills the association's report showed orders at 263,553,000 feet compared with 140,406,000 feet for the previous week. Production was 106,783,000 feet against 162,535,000 feet while shipments climbed to 144,341,000 feet from 134,072,000 feet.

The week's new business was higher than at any time during the past nine weeks while production reached a new high for the previous four weeks.

peace worries nations more than Germany's internal situation.

**VOTE RESULT FOREGONE**—(Copyright, 1934, by United Press) BERLIN, Aug. 3.—(U.P.)—The German people at a referendum on Aug. 19 will be asked to confirm Adolf Hitler in office as supreme ruler of the nation—fuehrer and reich chancellor—for life.

Preparations for the referendum began today. The ballot will ask a "yes" or "no" answer to the question: Whether the Aug. 1 cabinet law merging the offices of president and chancellor is approved. The ballot mentions Hitler as reich fuerher with no restriction whatsoever on the period of his term.

The result of the referendum is a foregone conclusion. The former Austrian housepainter thus will achieve his life's ambition. He will become the absolute ruler of 65,000,000 people, capable of being overthrown only by revolution.

**Goebbels Lays Plans**—Paul Joseph Goebbels, minister of propaganda has been laying the groundwork for the referendum since the beginning of the week, when it became apparent President von Hindenburg's condition was hopeless.

At a conference today, Goebbels gave Nazi party officials preliminary instructions for a propaganda campaign which will be similar to the high pressure campaign which preceded the Nov. 12 referendum on Germany's leaving the league of nations.

Technically, Goebbels is functioning in this campaign as the Nazi party's propaganda chief, distinguished from his function as reich propaganda minister.

past month, or nearly 14 cents a sack.

The factor pointed out specifically by dealers is the reduction in production of best grade grains as well as the drought. There is much low grade wheat that goes into low grade flour and feed, but a big scarcity on the best grade of wheat, oats, rye, etc., a big factor in advancing prices for such.

Retail prices on flour, Friday, varied considerably on the best, hard wheat varieties, being quoted all the way up to \$2.19 a sack.

The latest wholesale advance came Thursday when flour was boosted another 10 cents a barrel.

Officials of the organized bakers

group here could not be reached until late Friday and others contacted said they preferred any statements regarding bread come through the officers of their association. It was pointed out, however, that there is no move now to advance bread since the bakers are working with code regulations.
