WHAT YOU MAY CALL SPECIAL SESSION

BATON ROUGE, La., Aug. 3.—(AP)—Temporarily quitting the scene of the tense political war in New Orleans, Mayor Huey P. Long came to the state capitol this morning by automobile, reviving reports that he planned to call a special session of the legislature to take a hand in his dispute with Governor Allen.

See Long went at once to Gov. E. Allen's executive suite. After visiting briefly in the executive office, he went to the East room of the state capitol where a highway commission was appearing before Judge K. Fayot to answer a contempt citation issued out by the judge of New Orleans.

The city cited the commission for contempt of court on an allegation that the state road body had violated injunction by paying out highway funds for other purposes while still waiting from paying to the city of New Orleans the \$700,000 a year due the city for street maintenance. State motions asking dismissal of the contempt action were overruled by Judge Fayot.

Later in the executive mansion where he was Governor Allen's guest, the senator said he had "asked the governor to dismiss the national guard in charge of the New Orleans administration office."

"What did he say?" he was asked. "He told me to go to hell," Long answered with a grin. "Does that mean the militia will be on duty in New Orleans?" "I don't know. You'll have to ask the governor. I don't think he'll talk to me," was the reply.

The governor, who was present, was silent.

COURT ORDER IGNORED
NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 3.—(AP)—The court order calling for the dismissal of the militia was ignored by the national guard at Jackson Barracks, Adjutant General Raymond H. Long today replied to a civil disobedience order by directing his officers to ignore the order.

Warning Issued On Electric Appliance Salesmen in Eugene

Many Eugeneans have called the merchants' division of the chamber of commerce this week concerning the activities of two salesmen from another state who claim they have the promise of an endorsement from the division to sell electrical appliances in the city. It was announced Friday. Their statement was held untrue. "One of these salesmen applied for an endorsement claiming that he desired to sell 'rebuilt' appliances, but the calls we have had indicate that the machines offered for sale were 'repossessed' by the finance company," stated H. E. Cully, secretary of the chamber.

In checking up with local finance companies and electrical dealers it was found that the finance companies seldom, if ever, repossess a vacuum sweeper or any other appliance which they finance. Whenever an article is sold on a partial payment plan the

finance company merely advances the unpaid balances to the merchant, and holds the merchant wholly responsible. In case the buyer defaults in any payments the merchant must make the payments good to the finance company. If necessary to recover the machine it is the merchant's job to do so and the machine goes back to the merchant, who in turn reimburses the finance agent. The machines are then resold by the merchant and not the finance company nor any agents representing them.

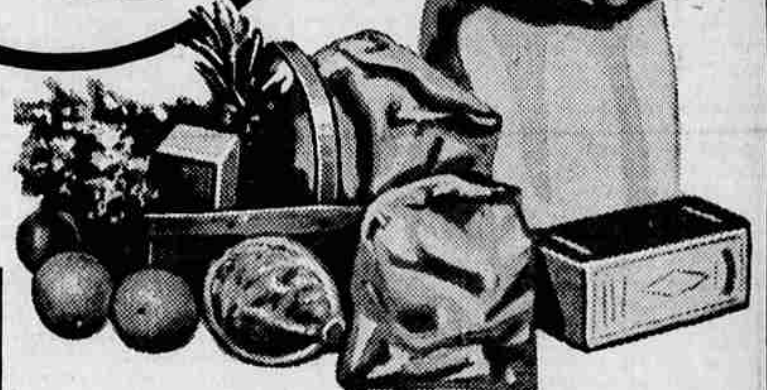
