

EUGENE SHOULD BE PURGED OF WORLDLY LIFE, SAYS PASTOR

Rapping the theaters, the dance, the "modern saloons" with those immoral influences which go hand in hand with the saloons, and declaring there is an increase of worldly pleasures here as elsewhere, Adjutant C. Ford of the Salvation Army today evening at the weekly union services Sunday evening that "back to God and the Bible is the only cure of the present ills which afflict this and other communities."

The services were held in Central Presbyterian church.

"The Pull of the Unseen" was the general topic for his talk, his text being John 12:32. "And I, if I be lifted up from the earth, will draw all men unto myself."

His sermon in part followed:

"The derelict ship in the mud of the East River, New York, provides a problem for the engineer in charge of construction of the great bridge; powerful tugs failed to move the sunken vessel which lay directly in the spot where one of the central piers of the bridge was to be placed. A workman thought of using a large flat stone carrying boat to assist in removing the obstruction. At low tide, lines were made fast, and at high tide the derelict was lifted clear and carried away to another resting place. The 'Pull of the Unseen' had taken away the obstruction."

"A boy holding to a stout string in a storm caught the attention of a man who was passing near where he stood. Wondering at the boy's behavior he stopped but could see nothing above. Upon inquiry the boy informed him he was holding on to his kite; the man replied saying he could not see it, so the boy gave him the cord and the man felt for himself the 'pull of the unseen'—the kite hidden in the clouds above."

"The birds at a certain season of the year feel the pull of northern shores and forthwith obey. The smallest avian feels the mighty drawing power of the sun and answers. Special hours in the experience of us all are filled with the drawing-power, the strong urge, the pull of the unseen."

"We are constantly reminded that, as the scripture records, 'The things which are seen are temporal, but the things which are not seen are eternal.' We should be prepared to listen, heed and respond to 'the pull of the unseen' in our lives. There comes to us all the pull of the conviction of sin; sometimes, yes, doubtless many times, the still small voice saying touch not, taste not, handle not—referring to all manner of wrong-doing—and the voice of the Holy Spirit, God's messenger to earth, saying 'This is the way, walk ye in it!'"

"Let us accept and recognize the truth of the Bible statement that 'All have sinned and come short of the glory of God.' This does not doubtless shall all answer the 'Pull of the Unseen' and experience a changed heart which will result in a changed life as did Saul of Tarsus. The woman of Samaria, the Philippian Jailer, Mary Magdalene, the Publican and millions of others in both ancient and modern times. Time and space allowed me fail to permit the relating of many striking illustrations of the actuality of the above statements."

"Eugene is not the city it used to be some years back. The theaters, the dance, the modern saloons with those immoral influences which go hand in hand with the saloon; the increase of worldly pleasures, the passing away of the old family altar, failure to accept the Bible as the word of God; these things have all contributed to separate the people, in the main, from a 'life hid with Christ in God.' A noticeable increase in women and young people engaged in the pursuits of sin, brazenly, openly and defiantly, remind us constantly that we are living in a time when people as a whole are 'lovers of pleasure more than lovers of God,' and that the young people today without the influence of Godly parents at home, are to be the men and women of this country and others who shall direct the affairs of the nation, remind us that 'Righteousness exalteth a nation, but sin is a reproach to any people.' Back to God and the Bible is the only cure of the present ills which afflict this and other communities."

DRYERS OPERATE ON EARLY PRUNES

Three dryers in the vicinity of Eugene have started operations on petite and date prunes, and the Italian variety will be ready in about ten days, according to Walter P. Fell, prune grower and buyer of this city. The plants in operation are those of N. L. Nielsen, near the S. P. terminal grounds; William Barker, half a mile west of Santa Clara; and Ernest Brunner, south of Santa Clara. The latter is an entirely new plant built soon after Mr. Brunner's old dryer was destroyed by fire several months ago.

The petite and date varieties of prunes are a fair crop this year but the Italians will be only about 25 percent of a crop in Lane county, Mr. Fell said.

This year's prices as agreed upon by the state marketing committee are expected to be announced Tuesday. Mr. Fell stated. There is considerable speculation as to what they will be and if they are so high that the packers cannot operate at a satisfactory profit it was predicted by Mr. Fell that many of the plants may remain idle.

THREE NORTHWEST STATES OBJECT TO DRIED FRUIT CODE

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6.—(P)—The Pacific coast dried fruit industry submitted its proposed code of fair competition to the recovery administration today, and after a brief formal hearing it was sent to conferences to iron out objections.

While the labor advisors of the hearing board suggested the wage and hours provisions of the code were deficient in that no arrangement was made for paying overtime in certain cases, the most strenuous objection to the proposal came from the Northwest Dried Fruit association, which said Oregon, Washington and Idaho packers could not afford to pay the minimum suggested.

The code was sponsored by the Dried Fruit Association of California and the Northwest Dried Fruit association. The latter, while opposing the wage provisions, did not withdraw as a proponent of other provisions of the code.

Dwight K. Grady, vice president of the California association, appeared as the proponent, Robert C. Paulus, of Salem, Ore., and New York, appeared in opposition to the wage proposals, contending the three northwestern states were at a disadvantage in competing with California members in the industry because it cost them about \$20 a ton more to dry their fruit by artificial processes. He said the wage scale proposed was higher than that in the canning code and the same employees and plants were used in both industries in the northwestern states.

Paulus suggested the labor commissions of the northwestern state be allowed to fix the scales in Oregon, Washington and Idaho.

"The Oregon and Washington labor commissions," Paulus said, "are familiar with the conditions prevailing and in the past they have displayed no intention of favoring the employer."

The wage proposals made in the code would mean an increase of about 16 percent in the compensation of the men employed and about 35 percent in that of the women.

Labelers, packers and sorters would be paid 33½ cents per hour, other packing house employees 40 cents. They could work eight hours a day and six days a week provided the week's total number of hours should not exceed 40 hours. For 14 weeks during the year, during the peak of the preparation for holiday trade, they could work 48 hours per week.

Clerical help would be paid from \$14 to \$16 a week for 40 hours of work, the scale being governed by the population of the city in which they were employed. Watchmen would be paid \$18 a week for 56 hours of work.

Chauffeurs, deliverymen and their helpers and engineers and firemen would be allowed to work 48 hours a week. Executives and outside salesmen would be exempt from the maximum-hour provisions.

The code would be governed by a code authority composed of 15 members. Nine members would be elected by those firms which packed 5,000 or more tons during the fiscal year June 30, 1932, to June 30, 1933; two members by other California packers; one member by packers of dehydrated California apples; one member by packers of dehydrated bleached raisins, and two members by packers in Oregon, Washington, and Idaho.

LOS ANGELES HAS SCARE OVER MOBS OF SILVER SHIRTS

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 6.—(P)—The Los Angeles Examiner in a copyright story in its Sunday edition declared that testimony has been given before the congressional committee now in Los Angeles investigating un-American activities, "That armed men known as the Silver Shirts, with a secret auxiliary called Storm Troopers and avowedly organized to change the government of the United States" are drilling in the neighborhood of San Diego.

The testimony the newspaper asserts, was presented to the committee, presided over by Congressman Charles Kramer, of California, in a session held behind closed doors.

While the testimony was being given before the committee, the newspaper will say, it was learned that an "investigation was being pressed vigorously by intelligence officers of the army, navy and marine corps, as well as by other government agencies" into the activities of the Silver Shirts on the entire Pacific Coast.

The Silver Shirts, so the newspaper says, display no swastika, the emblem of the Nazi party, on their uniforms, but that the swastika emblem is conspicuous in their homes.

Captain William Hynes of the Los Angeles police department anti-radical squad said today the police have been watching the Silver Shirts in Los Angeles for several months. He said he did not know what testimony had been given the congressional committee.

"Revelations made by government operatives disclosed that 2,000 rounds of .30 calibre ammunition was purchased for the Silver Shirts at the naval air station at North Island, San Diego," the newspaper said. "It was purchased from members of the United States armed forces on active duty at the time."

Membership in the organization is secret, the members themselves not knowing, generally, the names of their comrades.

"Members of the United States navy, United States marine corps, and the California national guard are enrolled in the organization," the newspaper said the committee was informed.

"An 'Old Man' supplies the San Diego organization with gold, and also supplies arms and ammunition, operating through 'fence' on University avenue, San Diego."

A corporal of the United States marine corps in San Diego, assigned to intelligence work to obtain information concerning the Silver Shirts, was "one the spot" once, being targeted for mysterious shots, and again being attacked by five men.

"The avowed purpose of the Silver Shirts and their auxiliary, intelligence officers reported, is two-fold: 'First: They plan to use their armed strength to overcome the communists, because they believe the communists will stage an uprising and will seize the government of the United States, and they in turn are planning to wrest it from the communists.'

"Second: They are planning to remove all Jews from public office, including Henry Morgenthau, United States secretary of treasury."

The newspaper charges that hundreds of the Silver Shirts and their auxiliary members own a rifle range in sparsely settled country beyond El Cajon and La Mesa where they engage in target practice and drill. They are being taught the use of infantry weapons, in military tactics and in methods of street fighting.

Representative Kramer early today was unavailable for comment on the story.

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Upper Mabel Road Being Finished to Link With Santiam

A Lane county road crew is working two and a half miles of the road extending above Mabel to the Lane county line and when this improvement is completed Lane county will have carried out its agreement with Linn county, made a number of years ago, to provide a good connection from this county to the South Santiam road to Central Oregon.

Lane county's portion of the road was graded several years ago and the stretch has been maintained ever since but Linn county has done nothing to its part of the road in the vicinity of the summit, according to Lane county officials.

There is only a short section of road to be built on the Linn county side and Lane officials are hoping some action will be taken soon on the part of the Linn county court to complete the connection.

A. A. U. W. OFFERS FELLOWSHIPS TO WOMEN STUDENTS

A large number of fellowships, each carrying a substantial cash value, are offered to advanced women students during the next two years by the American Association of University Women, according to information reaching the office of Dr. C. V. Boyer, president of the University of Oregon.

The fellowships, points out Dr. Boyer, fill a definite need, since assistance in the early stages of graduate work is widely available from other sources, and these fellowships are intended primarily for women who hold doctor of philosophy degrees or the equivalent, or who have already completed much of their work toward this degree.

Applications and recommendations for the fellowships must reach the secretary of the awards committee of the association, 1634 I Street N. W., Washington D. C., not later than December 1, 1934.

Among the fellowships open are the following: Sarah Berlinger Research fellowship in physics, chemistry or biology, \$1200 for research only, and \$1500 for research and teaching; A. A. U. W. international fellowship of \$1500 to enable holder to carry on a year's work in some country other than her own; Dorothy Nridgman Atkinson fellowship valued at \$1500 for students who give promise of distinction in arts, science and literature; Mary Pemberton Nourse memorial fellowship valued at \$2,000 for candidate in field of public health; Anna C. Brackett memorial fellowship valued at \$1,000 open to women planning on entering teaching; Alpha Omicron Pi fellowship valued at \$1,000; Fellowship Crusade fellowship, \$1,500.
