Obituaries

J. Q. Willits
COTTAGE GROVE, Aug. 7.—(Special)—Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at Mills chapel for J. Q. Willits who died Saturday at his home in this city following a lingering illness. Rev. James A. Smith, pastor of the Presbyterian church officiated. Floral offerings were numerous and beautiful. A large number of out of town relatives and friends were in attendance. The Odd Fellows and Rebekahs attended in a body and the Odd Fellows lodge of which Mr. Willits was a member, officiated at the graveside ceremonies at the A. F. & A. M. O. O. F. cemetery, with E. J. Kent in charge.

J. Quincy Willits was born May 26, 1852 at the family farm in Cedar county, Iowa. One of a family of eight children and son of Amos and Sarah Willits.
Interested in educational and musical work from boyhood, Mr. Willits attended Cornell college at Mt. Vernon, Iowa at an early age and began his teaching career at the age of 18, continuing almost without interruption for 50 years. He attended music conservatory in Chicago for one year and for many years held singing schools at night in school houses where he taught by day and parents as well as children received their musical education from him.

In 1875 he came to Ashland, Ore., where his parents and most of the family were already located and at once began teaching in the Jackson county schools. At one time Mr. Willits and three of his brothers, Rush, Levi and Will, were teaching in the schools of Jackson county.
June 27, 1877, he was married to Amy Dunn, daughter of an old pioneer family at Ashland. She passed away in December, 1883. In 1884, Mr. Willits went to Lake county to become principal of schools at Lakeview, remaining there until 1913. Continuously during that time he was actively engaged in educational work either as principal of the school or as county school superintendent, which position he held for twelve years.

December 8, 1887 he was married to Minnie Wharton at Lakeview. To this marriage were born three children, Docia Norris of Cottage Grove; Hallie Willits of Roseburg and Leland F. Willits of Klamath Falls. There is one granddaughter, Sharon Lee Willits.

In 1914 the family moved to Kerby, Oregon and Mr. Willits was principal of the school four years. Then the family located at Cottage Grove and he taught in various parts of the country until his hearing became bad and he retired from active work at the age of 70 years. For a number of years Mr. Willits had the distinction of being the oldest teacher in point for continuous service in Oregon.

Educational, religious and fraternal work filled his life. He served as superintendent of Sunday school and church organist in Lakeview for years and was a member of the
