

HARBOR PROJECT AT CRESCENT CITY IS URGED BY REP. LEA

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—(AP)—Representative Lea, of Santa Rosa, Cal., urged the army board of engineers at a public hearing today to consider future needs for a water outlet for Southern Oregon and northern California. He appeared at a hearing on the Crescent City harbor project.

The army's district engineer recommended recently construction of a south jetty at Crescent City, extension of the present jetty and dredging of the harbor to a 30-foot depth. The suggested improvements would cost \$4,312,000.

Lea told the board that with the dredging of the bar at Humboldt bay at Eureka to a 30-foot depth, only the development of the outlet remaining to provide adequate transportation to the Pacific coast. That outlet, he said, was Crescent City. The board recently recommended dredging the Humboldt bar to 30 feet for a width of 500 feet.

Lea described to the board the potentialities of the region to be served by a deep-water harbor at Crescent City, saying that three Oregon counties and Del Norte county of California had 48,510,000 feet of virgin timber, a large proportion of which must eventually move through the harbor.

"Within a comparatively short time," Lea said, "this timber will be needed. It would be a mistake and a short-sighted policy to judge the need for a harbor development at Crescent City by present conditions. The harbor should be built for the future of the community. It is the natural and sensible outlet for the region. Transportation developments, roads, railroads or harbors, undertaken along the natural lines or communications are imperishable."

Lea said Grants Pass, Ore., and Crescent City, Cal., residents were ready to bear a fair share of the burden of the improvement. He said the agricultural hinterland to be served by the project ranged back to the Klamath Falls, Ore., area.

Local interests, Lea said, originally talked in terms of a 24 or 26 foot depth, but the 30 foot depth, sufficient for ocean going steamers, was the logical development, he contended. He said it would not be necessary to undertake construction of the \$1,171,000 south jetty immediately, if the board felt the present needs would not justify the entire cost.

U. S. Chamber Slaps at Theory Of Cheap Power

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—(AP)—The U. S. Chamber of Commerce today threw cold water on the theory that cheap power rates would automatically make electricity the maid-of-all-work in the American home.

The chamber's statement was cautiously worded but pointed out many pitfalls in the path of wider use of electricity through cheaper rates.

"Even with substantial reductions in equipment cost and energy cost," says the report, "it is questionable whether the economic status of the potential 'electrified home' customers is such the growth of home electrification can be greatly accelerated, unless forced by some artificial stimulus such as government subsidy."

"General electrification of our homes would require an investment of 15 or 20 billions of dollars for appliances alone, not including air conditioning."

Crash Kills One; Traps Another in Cockpit Two Days

BLITHE, Cal., Aug. 7.—(AP)—Trapped for two days in the cockpit of a plane beside the body of his flying companion on the Colorado river bottom, William Henry of San Diego lay critically ill in a hospital today.

He was rescued yesterday by cowboys who searched the area when Pilot Walter Ballard with a broken shoulder, several fractured ribs, and blood streaming in his eyes, fought his way through the wilderness and the blinding heat of the Imperial valley to bring out word of the crash.

Trapped in the plane's wreckage with Henry was the body of James McFadden of San Diego.

NATIONS START RACE FOR GREATER NAVAL AND AIR ARMAMENT

PARIS, Aug. 7.—(AP)—French officials indicated today that a lapse of the Washington naval treaty of 1921 would conform to French desires.

France, they said, has always been dissatisfied with the treaty feeling that the French navy was not granted sufficient prestige in relation to that of Italy.

This attitude was expressed today in connection with preparations toward the 1934 naval conference which is intended to design a new naval treaty for the United States, Great Britain, Japan, France and Italy.

Already France has begun a naval rejuvenation which the government sees as a means to obtaining a better bargaining position with Italy in the forthcoming naval conference.

The construction of three new 23,500-ton battleships is in prospect. Their completion would bring the French heavy fleet up to the 175,000 tons capital ships limit allowed by the 1921 treaty to France and Italy, neither of which signed the London treaty of 1930.

ROME, Aug. 7.—(AP)—The authoritative newspaper Il Piccolo indicated today that Italy felt obliged to increase her air force because the United States and other nations had done so. The remarks were relative to the \$100,000,000 appropriation for the purpose which was announced for Italy Thursday.

Il Piccolo said the disarmament conference had failed and the rearmament of nations, including that of Italy, had commenced. It cited the English and American appropriations as the initiative which Italy must follow.

State Police Open School at Clatsop

SALEM, Aug. 7.—(AP)—The school of instruction for state police opened at Camp Clatsop today with about 25 per cent of the force scheduled to be on hand for the first week's course. The school will continue for four weeks with a different group attending each week.

Captain H. Lee Noe, of Baker, was placed in charge of the school, and Lieutenant Walter Lansing, of Salem, and Sergeant W. H. Ellensburg of Medford in charge of the Red Cross training.

Highway Contracts Are Being Rushed

SALEM, Aug. 7.—(AP)—All contracts for 80 projects in Oregon under the federal highway aid appropriation of \$3,100,000 for the

years 1934 and 1935, were expected to be completed by December 31 of this year, R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer, declared today.

Highway department field operatives were now obtaining the necessary rights-of-way, Baldock said, and work of preparing plans and specifications for the various projects has been under way for more than a week. The first of the contracts probably will be awarded at a meeting in August, while others will be let at succeeding sessions.

Californians Buy Three Lane Farms

Three more Lane county farms have been sold the past few days to recent arrivals here from California, according to announcement at the office of the Hyde Realty company, which handled the deals.

Carl Sorenson of Bakersfield, Cal., has bought 72 acres known as the Tyson farm a mile south of Goshen. This is a part of the pioneer Hampton farm. Fred C. Hicks, of Oakland, Cal., is the purchaser of 60 acres in the same locality known as the Rice farm. Both deals were for cash.

Mr. and Mrs. Harry R. Merrill of Pacimo, Cal., have bought a 160-acre farm on Poodle creek four miles north of Noti from the United States National bank.

"Dudd" Gas Shell Explodes; 11 Hurt

FORT RILEY, Kan., Aug. 7.—(AP)—A "dudd" 105 millimeter gas shell exploded in a tent here and 11 persons, including three women, were wounded.

The shell had been picked up on the firing range and carried to a tent at Camp Whiteside, home of the national guard encamped here, where the women, another civilian visitor, and a group of guardsmen, in camp for the first time, were examining it.

3-C Enrollment at Record Total Now

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—(AP)—Enrollment in the civilian conservation corps reached an all time peak today with 370,000 young men and war veterans in 1568 camps.

The record mark was set by the enrollment of 50,000 men in the drought area, in addition to the 320,000 already engaged in reforestation work. All the men in the drought area quota have been selected and virtually all of them have been enrolled.

LIQUOR WAR ON!

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—(AP)—Sweeping reorganization of the alcohol tax unit of the internal revenue bureau was announced today by Secretary of Treasury Morgenthau as the first step in what he termed "a war to the finish" with illicit liquor traffic.

MARKET PRICES FOR BASIC COMMODITIES INCREASE UNDER AAA

CHICAGO, Aug. 7.—(AP)—Market prices of the four basic American agricultural commodities, produced this year under a government sponsored program designed to benefit farmers, averaged today at Chicago 21 per cent higher than a year ago and 83 per cent higher than two years ago.

The steady and sometimes sharp improvement in domestic grain prices since May has accounted for the bulk of the percentage increases. The quotations, however, still are far below the all-time peaks which belong to the war and post-war era.

Prices at Chicago of wheat, corn, hogs and cotton, defined as the basic commodities by the agricultural adjustment act, showed today the greatest improvement over quotations for a corresponding date in 1932 recorded so far this year.

Wheat prices are approximately 93 per cent higher than two years ago while only 6 per cent higher than a year ago. September delivery of wheat on the Board of Trade closed at \$1.04 3-8-5-8, near the season's peak in June, and 50 cents better than on Aug. 8, 1932.

tion for Christmas, and one week for Easter. Two days will be taken off at Thanksgiving, and the students won't have to attend classes on Armistice Day or Memorial day.

Racing of Fishes Is Newest Betting Sport of Resorters

DEPOE BAY, Ore., Aug. 7.—(AP)—The bass with the crossed eyes won by a fin, paying his backers 3 to 1.

This statement may be expected frequently in the sports columns, if a new pastime inaugurated at Depoe Bay today becomes popular. This sport is fish racing and was one of the features of the annual fish bake at which 2,000 pounds of fish were served to some 10,000 persons after being cooked in a huge stone pit.

The fish races were held in a 100-foot square roped area in Depoe Bay. Each fish entry had a toy balloon attached by means of a string and clip to his upper fin. Then the racers were simply released inside the roped-off square. Promoters had previously discovered the racers would obligingly swim in a circle, so the first one to return to the starting point was declared winner.

Three races were run—two for bass between three and four pounds and one for sharks between five and seven pounds. Pari-mutual bets were laid on the results.

County Shovel Is Moved On Tuesday
