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OAKRIDGE, Aug. 8.—(Special)—A fine new hatchery has just been completed at the state salmon hatchery here in the Salmon creek bottom near the Charles J. Hills home. Mr. Hills has been in charge of the hatchery for many years and will continue the work in the new building.

The building was erected by the State Fish commission who have their headquarters in Portland. Hugh C. Mitchell, directors of hatcheries was here last week looking over the work.

The 30 by 80 foot building is made entirely of wood, and is one story high. It is one large room which contains 50 troughs for hatching the eggs. The capacity of the troughs is 50,000,000 eggs. The eggs are hatched once a year. In May of this year 6,500,000 salmon were distributed in Salmon creek.

Nine hundred feet of 8-inch pipe line is being laid to bring the water from Salmon creek into the hatchery. Four local men have been employed during the erection of the building which cost approximately \$1400.

Earl Williams is Mr. Hills regular assistant at the hatchery.
