## Emergency Schools' Enrollment 34,410

### Oregon's Response To Program Shows Importance Of Work, Howard Says

Enrollment in 1880 classes organized in the Emergency Educational Relief program in Oregon reached the amazing total of 34,410, and 1517 teachers were given employment during the past five months, it was revealed here today to the supervisors and other educators attending the training institute now in session on the University of Oregon campus.

There is another group of recipes for fruit used:

- Stuffed Tomato Fondue**  
8 ripe tomatoes.  
1 small onion chopped fine.  
1 cup cold veal, chicken or beef chopped fine.  
1 egg.  
1/2 teaspoon ground mace.  
Salt, pepper.  
Cracker or bread crumbs.  
Packer.  
1/2 cup grated cheese.  
1 teaspoon paprika.  
Peel tomatoes, remove center pulp.

## PORTLAND HAS NEW TIEUP AS DRIVERS QUIT

### Docks Hampered by Trouble Between Truckers and Their Employers

### NO VIOLENCE OCCURS

### Federal Conciliator Sent To City at Once to Suggest Truce

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 13.—(AP)—Four hundred drivers left their dray trucks in garages today as they walked out on a strike which threatened to tie up commerce, just recovering from a devastating strike of waterfront workers.

The drayage section of the truck drivers' union went on strike for higher wages, but about 600 other union drivers, engaged in delivery service and distance hauling were not affected.

Wage increases are demanded. The current wage scale for drayage men ranges from \$4.25 to \$4.75 an 8-hour day. The strikers demand a scale of from \$5.25 to \$6.25.

Employers announced they were willing to concede a 20-cent advance and would arbitrate the difference, but they said the leaders of the drivers' union would not consent to this.

## Conciliator Is Rushed In

The start of the strike was followed by swift action on the part of the federal government. The department of labor immediately ordered E. P. Marsh, federal conciliator, to Portland to attempt to reach an early settlement.

Descending more than half a mile below the surface of the sea Dr. William Beebe, famous naturalist, established new records by new methods Saturday. Instead of the usual diving apparatus he is using a heavy metal ball not unlike that used by the kind explorers who are adventuring miles into the stratosphere. Beebe goes down, through windows observes and photographs the strange life in the depths. Phones connect him with the crew on deck. ### No Real Shortage Expected But President Aims to Conserve Stores

### BLOCKS PROFITEERS

### Drastic Policy Is Indicated At Conference Over Drought Crisis

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13.—(AP)—President Roosevelt in conference on the drought today ordered federal purchase of any foodstuffs which might otherwise go to waste and laid down an emphatic ultimatum against profiteering in the relief campaign.

He authorized Aubrey Williams, assistant federal relief administrator, and Secretary Wallace to draft a plan for government purchase of hay and fruits in small quantities which might not otherwise be harvested.

Not worried over supply but—Williams emphasized this was primarily to afford relief for the small growers. He said there was no concern over a possible lack of sufficient food. Officials have explained all along food supplies would be adequate.

The president and Williams were described as holding the opinion that a slight improvement has occurred in the drought area in the last three days.

## Political Candidates Must Go To Dismiss Immediately any federal relief worker who is a candidate for office this year or who prefers to participate actively in the political campaign.

Williams reported a "general difficulty" along this line in many states. Williams said he thought the \$325,000,000 for drought relief probably would be sufficient for relief needs alone.

## Protection For Consumers

Wallace said after conferring with President Roosevelt that the administration would meet the agricultural situation resulting from the drought.

## OREGON DROUGHT AREA SPREADING

PORTLAND, Aug. 13.—(AP)—Oregon's drought area is spreading, even as the state emergency relief committee spends its facilities and spends thousands of dollars to save feed and forage and to provide water for thousands of thirsty sheep and cattle.

Nine of the state's 36 counties have now been listed as drought areas—three as emergency, and six as secondary regions.

In Harney county 70 men are employed on the water projects; Lakebur has 45, Grant has 40, Lake 30, Crook 28, Wheeler 24, Jefferson 18, Wasco 12, and Umatilla six men at work.

## CAPE WRECK PUTS FOUR IN HOSPITAL

### Tire Blowout Causes Auto To Climb Steep Bank And Turn Over

The condition of the three persons brought to Eugene at midnight Saturday, following an accident on the coast highway, is reported to be very serious by attending physicians. The three are at the Pacific hospital.

All are given chances for recovery, however. Patricia Vaughn is listed as the most seriously injured. She is suffering with back injuries as well as internal abdominal injuries, and other cuts and bruises. Ith Mesick has concussion of the brain, eye, neck, and mouth injuries. Alfred Smith is suffering with head injuries, a scalp cut, and other bad bruises and cuts.

Beralee Himes, the fourth person in the car, was taken to Marshfield for hospital treatment. All four are from Booth.

The car was going north on the highway near Hegets beach, traveling about 45 miles an hour, according to police reports. A blowout caused the car to swerve into a ditch, climb the bank, and fall back on the highway.

The accident happened during the afternoon. A call was put in for an ambulance from Marshfield but it was able to care for only one. A call was put into Eugene about 7 p. m. for an ambulance to bring the other three here.

First aid treatment was given the trio in Florence before the Eugene ambulance arrived.

## Pruett Reports Perseid Show Small But Brilliant Display

Some of the Perseid meteors for this season will be seen for several nights yet, but their hourly rates will diminish greatly after the date of maximum display, which is Sunday morning, according to J. Hugh Pruett, astronomer and official of the American Meteor Society.

Mr. Pruett has given the following account of his observations on Sunday morning:

"That average expectations were far more than fulfilled was indicated by observations of the Perseid meteors on Sunday morning, Aug. 12, the time of predicted maximum display. The average number usually visible over the entire sky when they are at their best is about 70 per hour. Last year it was better than this. Local observations indicate that when reports are studied at American Meteor society headquarters at the University of Pennsylvania, it will be found that the earth struck a very rich part of the stream this year.

The writer made counts from 1:45 to 3:45 a. m. in the southeastern quadrant of the sky. (An observer cannot watch more than one-fourth of the sky.) During this time 114 meteors were seen. Of these, 10 were random shooting stars and 104 were

## Uncle Sam Piling Up Home Mortgages

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13.—(AP)—The government holds the mortgages on more than 450,000 American homes, a survey showed today, and before the activities of the Home Owners Loan Corporation are completed the total may reach nearly 1,000,000.

The HOLC's bonds, guaranteed by the government, have been exchanged for mortgages totaling \$1,200,000,000. This leaves the corporation with \$1,700,000,000 in bonds it can still put out.
