

BLUE EAGLES WILL BE SENT OUT SOON

The Lane county food and grocery code authority will mail out the blue eagles to the retail food and grocery dealers within ten days or two weeks, it was announced Tuesday by local administrators of the code. This has been held up somewhat, due to the fact that some blue eagles were mailed out by the state compliance directors and the local authority is waiting for information as to those who have received the award.

Those who have not paid their assessments or those who are paying the proper amount or those who are guilty of violating the code will not receive the blue eagles at the present time, it was announced, until they have paid the assessment in the proper amount or otherwise have complied with the code.

The local food and grocery code authority has been meeting weekly ever since its creation in May and has handled a good many complaints in that time. The members express the belief that the grocery business is in materially better condition and position than it would have been but for the code.

SCHOOL DEMAND STORY

In that the state levy is made payable on June 1 and December 1 as against May and November for the school fund, further that in the event there is not enough cash on hand to make both payments, that the payment to the school fund be credited against the state levy payment.

Springfield, Cottage Grove and Junction City have been taking the lead in asking 100 per cent payment of the elementary school fund, although a change on the present policy would affect all districts in the county. Representatives of the three large districts and Superintendent L. C. Moffitt discussed the matter informally with County Judge Fred Fisk recently. Judge Fisk said Tuesday that he hoped to have members of the Lane county legislative delegation as well as representatives of other school districts present for the meeting next week.

Meeting to Be Held

Indications Tuesday were that both sides to the controversy will air their views at the meeting without any change being made in the present policy of sharing the cash shortage created by tax delinquencies. This would leave it up to the school districts to bring mandamus proceedings.

Judge Fisk and W. B. Dillard, county clerk, joined Tuesday in declaring that there had never been 100 per cent payment of the fund even in pre-depression times, the average payments then running from 0 to 95 per cent. Because of increased delinquency under the depression, payments in 1932 amounted to 70 per cent and in 1933 to 67 per cent, the percentage of taxes collected for all purposes in the county.

If the county is compelled to turn over 100 per cent cash to the elementary school fund regardless of the total amount collected and the state continues to insist on 100 per cent payment of the three mill levy, there is no other alternative but that county activities other than the schools must be curtailed, they pointed out.

Road work, maintenance and construction, they declared, could then be carried on only by the issuance of warrants which would speedily become valueless and unaccepted as the total increased.

Pro-rating the amount of money collected enables a wider distribution of the number of warrants which must be issued as long as there is no money enough available to carry on cash business.

Full payment to the schools and the state as long as heavy delinquencies continue can mean only crippling all other activities or sharp increases in the tax levy so that the total collected would compensate for the present rate of delinquency, Judge Fisk pointed out. This would amount to a penalty against those who do pay their taxes and increase the amount of delinquency, he stated. Even such a step, however, would not raise enough money as the six per cent limitation rule would prevent increasing the levy to an amount sufficient to cover the delinquency.

Huey's Henchmen Get Contempt Sentences

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 14.—(AP)—Two officers of Senator Huey P. Long's national guard, now holding the city registration office in his fight with Mayor T. S. W. Williams for political control of the city were found guilty of contempt of court today for failing to dismiss the militia as ordered by the court.

Adjutant Gen. Raymond H. Fleming, commander of the guardsmen, although his troops prevented him from being served with the orders, was found guilty of contempt. Lieut. Numa P. Avendano was also found guilty of contempt and sentenced to pay a fine of \$25 and serve 10 days in jail, but the jail sentence was suspended.

PORTLAND STRIKE TRUCE SUGGESTED

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 14.—(AP)—A proposal to end Portland's 24-hour strike of 400 transfer and drayage truck drivers by complete arbitration of all issues involved was being voted upon by the union this afternoon.

An official proposal to arbitrate from the Portland Draymen's and Warehousemen's association, representing 25 of the 55 companies affected by the walkout is being considered. The same association had previously offered the drivers 50 per cent of the one dollar per day wage increase asked.

drought-ridden farmers seeking the relative security of irrigated lands that approximately 500 farms were available on the Riverfront reclamation project in Wyoming.

Vacancies are comparatively few when stacked up against the demand, but the bureau said, it is "doing everything possible to give opportunities where they exist."

Seventeen of the 27 reclamation areas in the scorched west have water to last all season. Some look forward to the best crops in years.

While ten expect some water shortage, officials said they would be far better off than adjacent unirrigated tracts.

Next to Riverfront, the Belle Fourche project in South Dakota has the most vacancies.

Inquiries are particularly heavy at farm banks and real estate offices in the Yakima reclamation area in Washington, officials reported. With a little cash and ambitions to set up homes in the regions kept green by stored water in times of drought, many farmers are going directly to this territory.

DROUGHT LIFTS

CHICAGO, Aug. 14.—(AP)—The drought's long siege appears to be lifting.

Six agricultural states benefited by rain which fell over the week-end, and forecasters said precipitation should come more frequently during the rest of the season.

Rains proved of the greatest value where water shortages existed—coming too late, generally, to pour life back into the principal crops. Late crops, roughage for feed and pastures were stimulated and would be revived greatly by additional moisture. Showers were promised today for parts of Illinois, Michigan, Wisconsin, Iowa, Minnesota, North Dakota and South Dakota.

In Kansas and Nebraska, hotbed of the nation, the forecast was for weather somewhat unsettled and continued warm. Parts of blistered Kansas were drenched with week-end rains, however, giving late grain crops another chance to live.

Heavy rain helped corn in Nebraska—won the thanks of farmers in Oklahoma and Illinois. In Missouri, scattered showers drove down the temperature for the first time since late June, but grain crops were reported virtually past aid.

are thick fleshed and bright green. They'll be mild flavored. Remove stem, seeds and inner membrane. Cover with hot water and simmer 10 minutes. Drain immediately and cool.

While cooling prepare: Filling, melt butter in skillet. Add onion. Fry until delicately brown. Remove from stove. Combine this with rice, meat and tomato juice. Sprinkle inside of peppers with salt. Stuff peppers. Sprinkle tops with bread crumbs, mixed with melted butter. Put just enough water in baking pan to cover bottom.

Place peppers upright in pan and bake in hot oven for 10 to 15 minutes. These can be prepared in the morning and baked just before mealtime. They help to use leftovers.—Mrs. P. G. Bradway, Motor Rtr. 3, Eugene.

Stuffed Peppers

2 or 3 cold boiled potatoes chopped 1 thick slice of ham

Parboil till half done and grind. 3-4 pound cheese chopped 5 or 6 crackers rolled fine

Butter size of an egg

Mix all together, salt to taste. Clean out seeds from peppers. Stuff. Set closely together in pan containing a little water. Bake till tender and stuffing is brown.—Alice L. Dicks, 901 Oak St., Eugene.

Stuffed Tomato

Peel medium sized tomatoes, remove thin slice from top of each, take out seeds and some pulp. Sprinkle inside with salt, invert, and let stand 30 minutes. Fill tomato with pineapple cut in small cubes and English walnut meats using 2-3 pineapple to 1-3 nut meats, mixed with mayonnaise. Serve on lettuce leaves with mayonnaise.

Or, prepare tomatoes as above stated. Mix diced celery, cucumbers, onion, green pepper and mayonnaise, and fill tomato. Put small ball of cheese on top, sprinkle with paprika and serve on lettuce leaf.—Mrs. Laurel M. Hoyt Jr., 1450 E. 18th St., Eugene.

Stuffed Tomatoes

Use the required number of tomatoes of same size and with a sharp knife take a thin slice off the smooth end, large enough to scoop out the inside, using a small spoon but being careful not to break the skin.

With the tomato taken from center mix as much or more boiled beef, one-half as much potato that has been boiled with the jackets on, a little pepper and onion for seasoning, using either red or green pepper of the sweet variety. Chop all together, sprinkle a little cayenne and salt and stuff the tomatoes full and bake until they are tender. If too moist add a few stale bread crumbs.

Should there be more stuffing than the tomatoes will hold, place in center of the pan in a heap and bake with the rest.

Try them; they are good.—Mrs. H. E. Walker, 1005 High St., Eugene.

GENEVA, Aug. 14.—(AP)—The governing commission of the Saar region—where a plebiscite will be held in January to determine whether it shall become French or German territory or remain under the control of the League of Nations—today informed the league it needs at least 2,000 additional foreign police to maintain order. The commission declared that the situation in the Saar had become so much worse that it was beyond control.

HONG KONG, Aug. 14.—(AP)—General apprehension continued today in Foochow, heightened by reports that 2,000 brigands attacked the suburb of Peihai and three the population into panic.

Olson directed cessation of the payments.

PORTLAND, Aug. 14.—(AP)—Work projects totaling many thousands of dollars—the largest running around \$20,000—and giving employment to hundreds of men and women on relief rolls of Oregon, were approved here today by the state relief committee.

The \$20,000 project includes clearing, grading and installing culverts and bridges on a four-mile section of the Wilson River road from Smith creek to Fall creek in Tillamook county. Materials will cost about \$6,000.

federal housing administrator for the credit insurance under the provisions of section 2 of the national housing act.

Loans Not Slow Assets

"Since loans which are held in trust by the trustee are insured up to 20 percent by the housing administrator, participating certificates in such loans will not be classified by examiners as slow, doubtful or loss until the losses exceed the 20 percent of the insurance."

"Under the plan, the books of the trustee are open at all times for examination, and inspection by the bank examiners and participating banks."

By nightfall the Federal Housing Administration expects every city to have at least one bank where property owners can obtain insured loans for repairs and improvements.

Inquiries Are Pouring In

Roger Steffen, director of modernization credits, said so today as telegrams from bankers piled high upon his desk.

His chief—James A. Moffett—backed him up with an optimistic statement about bankers' willingness to make such loans.

"Enough banks already have accepted the loan insurance plan," Moffett said, "to handle more business than we can set them immediately. The response of the bankers has been fine. They may not come in 100 per cent but that isn't necessary and we never expected it."

The Housing Administration announced the names of bankers selected in cooperation with the American Bankers Association to advise and inform financial institutions in each state on the modernization program.

The bankers appointed as "liaison officers" included H. L. Temple, Portland, Ore.
