CITY COUNCIL
STORY

(CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1)

The meeting of the council appear-
 ed to be almost finished, with little
 business transacted, when Councilman
 Arthur Hendershott addressed Mayor
 Large.

"Mr. Mayor," the councilman be-
 gan, "complaints have been coming to
 me and other citizens of this city that
 there are too many amusement fea-
 tures in the beer parlors. I made a
 personal investigation of these com-
 plaints last Saturday night and I was
 amazed at what I found. At one place
 there was a crowd that extended al-
 most into the street and inside there
 was music and singing and a loud
 speaker was used to carry the voices
 of the singers out over the crowd. I
 think it is time something should be
 done."

Councilman George A. Simon,
 chairman of the police committee, re-
 plied that as far as amusements in
 beer parlors were concerned he be-
 lieved they have as much right as any
 other place to conduct amusements
 up to 1 a. m. as long as there was
 order. He said that since he recently
 returned from his vacation he had
 heard complaints of rowdiness and
 that he intended to make a personal
 investigation some Saturday night.

Dr. Simon said that he had heard
 of disorder in some of the beer par-
 lors as late as 3 a. m., but said that
 as far as he knew it may have been
 mere rumor. Mr. Hendershott, fur-
 ther dwelling upon his recent visit to
 one of these places, declared that
 several men were drunk and that
 while he was there someone dragged a
 couple of them out of the place.

"Our schools will soon be opening
 and it appeared to me that we should
 begin to regulate these beer parlors,"
 the councilman declared.

"With or without schools, they will
 be regulated," Dr. Simon rejoined.
 City Attorney Calkins said that the
 city is empowered to pass any regu-
 latory measure and gave it as his
 opinion that an ordinance prohibiting
 music or any other amusement in such
 places could be passed.

Councilman P. J. Edwards counsel-
 ed against hasty action in passing any
 measure to prohibit music and dancing
 in the beer parlors. As chairman
 of the judiciary committee he said
 that he was perfectly willing to bring
 in an ordinance as long as the council
 is within its rights but he thought
 there might be entanglements if an
 attempt were made at this time to
 prohibit amusements where beer is
 sold. He mentioned entertainment at
 hotels, conducted in an orderly man-
 ner.

Dr. Simon took occasion again to
 call attention to the alleged disorder-
 liness that prevails in the beer par-
 lors. "Before the saloons were closed
 they had eliminated all these objec-
 tionable features and all that was left
 of them was the bar where liquor was
 sold," he said. "But our beer parlors
 are being operated upon the order of
 the old-time saloon, the very thing
 we promised the public we would not
 bring back when liquor was voted in.
 I want the council and public to un-
 derstand that we are not allowing
 these places to run wide open for
 political purposes."

Mayor Large asked why it would
 not be a good plan to revoke the li-
 censes of those places that do not
 maintain order and someone expressed
 the opinion that this would cause the
 others to "cut out the rough stuff."
 The judiciary committee chairman
 agreed to have an ordinance drafted
 and to present it at a future meeting
 for consideration.

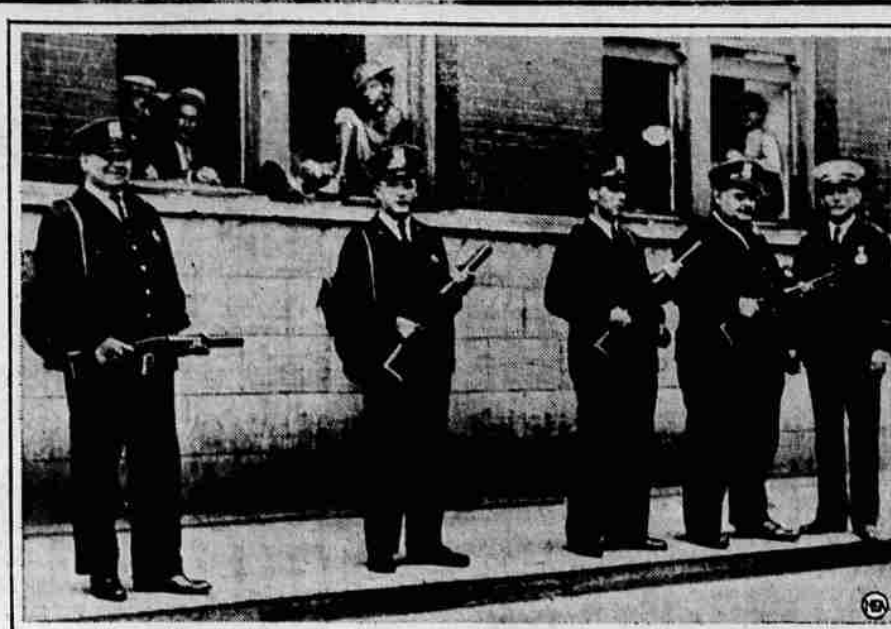
The council earlier in the meeting

and legal procedure was taken a short
 time ago by the council, Monday night
 being the time set for a public hear-
 ing. Mr. Gaylord appeared in person
 and addressed the council at length.

He declared that he was not being
 treated fairly by the council and particu-
 larly criticized Councilman E. W.
 Zumwalt, chairman of the health com-
 mittee. He declared that if the
 council should go on with the proce-
 dure he would take it to the courts.
 He said that the council was trying
 to destroy the only thing from which
 he could make a living, but admitted
 afterward that a good part of his
 income on the property was what he
 is being paid for allowing a large bil-
 board to stand at the south side of
 the building. This building, members
 of the council who have examined it
 declare, is a fire trap of the worst
 kind and is unsanitary.

The resolution to condemn the
 building as a nuisance was unani-
 mously passed. Mr. Gaylord was given
 a further extension of time to abate
 the alleged nuisance and a committee
 consisting of Councilman Lamb, Ed-
 wards and Bond was appointed to
 confer with him on the matter.

E. H. Esteas was given permission to
 move a building in the Cooper addi-
 tion to a location at Fifteenth and
 Lawrence.

The old fluff rug factory building
 on Jefferson street was ordered con-
 demned upon recommendation of
 Councilman Zumwalt and the matter
 of slowing traffic on narrow Sixteenth
 avenue between Lincoln and Law-
 rence streets was referred to the
 street committee upon his recom-
 mendation.

Councilman Harris, chairman of the
 park committee, recommended that
 the city park superintendent be given a
 new pickup truck and Councilman
 Bond was instructed to find a suit-
 able vehicle. He was allowed \$200 for
 that purpose. The committee chair-
 man also asked for \$13.50 to finish
 the fireplace in the club house in
 Skinner Butte park and was granted it.

NRA Is Branded
As "Dictatorship"

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14.—(AP)—The
 Recovery Administration was
 charged with being "a dictatorial
 form of government" in a major test
 case before the federal trade com-
 mission today involving NRA's price
 fixing powers.

Edward J. Ramsey, New York
 shoe manufacturer, answering NRA's
 complaint that he was violating the
 code by granting excess dis-
 counts, said congress violated the
 constitution in delegating legislative
 powers to the executive.

Dern Okays Plans
For Bigger Locks

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14.—(AP)—Secretary
 of War George H. Dern today
 approved plans whereby the lock
 at the Bonneville dam on the
 Columbia river near Portland, Ore.,
 will be increased in length and depth.
 The new plans as recommended by
 the chief of army engineers will in-
 crease the length of the lock from
 300 feet to 500 feet and increase the
 depth over the sills from 15 feet to 27
 feet so that the lock may be usable
 when and if a 30 foot channel is pro-
 vided in the Columbia river below the
 dam.
