

GERMAN MINISTERS REFUSE TO PLEDGE HITLER ALLEGIANCE

BERLIN, Aug. 16.—(AP)—Opposition pastors broke into open defiance today against the government's decision to nazi the church in Germany under the dictatorship of Reichsbishop Ludwig Mueller, Hitler's lieutenant.

Leaders of the Berlin Evangelical church in opposition to Mueller under the chairmanship of the Rev. Johannes Koch decided to refuse to take the new oath of office prescribed by the national church synod a week ago.

The oath would pledge ministers and church employees "to be faithful and obedient to Adolf Hitler and render the German nation every service and sacrifice befitting German citizens."

The evangelical bishops Meiser and Wurm, from Bavaria and Württemberg respectively, declared they would not exact the oath from ministers under their jurisdiction.

Chemical Factory Bunk House Burns

A frame bunk house at the Eugene chemical works, across the river near the Ferry street bridge, was destroyed by fire Wednesday afternoon and the main building of the factory narrowly escaped destruction. The city fire department responded to a call sent in at 3:40 o'clock and two trucks were sent out.

The bunk house was occupied by five employees of the plant and their families and all the contents were destroyed. The loss is estimated at \$10,000. No insurance was carried, according to Louis Wolf, the proprietor. Five hundred dollars worth of tallow in barrels was rolled to safety. Firemen learned that boys playing with matches near the building were responsible for the fire.

The department responded to an alarm at 4:45 p. m. Wednesday from Seventeenth and Washington where there was a grass fire.

still vary just as much under the proposed amendment.

Special Districts Omitted

The port, drainage, and irrigation districts are not cared for in the proposed law except as to bonded indebtedness and it is questionable if that can be provided for, Mr. Kelly stated.

Discussing another aspect, the division of the levy, Mr. Kelly pointed out that 10 per cent under the 20-mill limitation plan goes out to the state and elementary schools; 25 per cent to the counties; 25 per cent to the schools; 40 per cent to the counties.

Figures Are Discussed

The assessed valuation in Multnomah county is \$324,000,000; in Malheur county, \$6,680,000; in Crook, \$4,800,000. The five-mill levy allowed in Crook, Malheur, Lincoln and Josephine counties would produce no revenues for current expenses after deducting the compulsory levy for county school taxes, he said.

Lane county would have \$80,000 left, and the old age pension runs to \$500,000, leaving \$19,000 to run the rest of the county on, Mr. Kelly pointed out in showing how the ruling would work in Lane county.

The Portland Realty board, sponsor of the measure, apparently did not look outside of Multnomah county in drawing up the amendment, the speaker said. To set a fixed, arbitrary division would result in some very peculiar results in various parts of the state, he added. The school tax in Riddle, for instance, he showed, is 7 per cent. In Goble, 60 per cent. The county levy for Portland is 23.45 per cent, for Gaston, 32 per cent, for Eugene, 36 per cent. The city levy in Donald is 5.1 per cent, in Helix, 64 per cent.

He quoted these figures to show the startling differences around the state.

In Lane county, quoting another example, one school district has the assessed valuation per pupil of more than \$100,000, while another district in this county has the assessed valuation per pupil of only \$800.

In Ohio, where a 15-mill limitation law was enacted, the expenses were not out for the simple reason that they did not borrow, but as a result the police and fire protection has been practically worthless, many of the schools did not run for more than two months, none of them for nine months, he stated.

Indiana reported that not a single school had the full nine months, Mr. Kelly stated.

The entire state would get about \$1,000,000 under such a measure, this amount to be the total for running all institutions and state business. Higher education alone needs that much, Mr. Kelly pointed out.

Isolated cases may be found in Oregon where there will be some efficiency, Mr. Kelly stated. He quoted one where a municipality had both an auditor and a treasurer, both the same man. This man kept two complete files of records, identical, one for the auditor, one for the treasurer, and also hired an assistant.

Real estate is one of the most fundamental things, he said. If taxes are not paid and the services wanted are not provided then real property is going to decline because the desire or demand for it declines, Mr. Kelly said, pointing out that real property in the long run is not relieved.

Real property is in need of relief, but this proposed measure is not the solution. There must be a re-alignment, a re-adjustment generally whereby governmental units can tax wealth where it is to be found and thus relieve those unable to pay, he concluded.

JUVENILE REFORM STORY

year for juvenile work but collections have prevented doing anything about it. However, with the city and the schools bearing their share toward the expense, we may not have to wait so very long before we can get a start on proper handling of juvenile cases."

Judge Fisk is one of the originators of the movement for a unified handling of delinquency cases, his contacts with boys and girls in trouble convincing him that state homes or parole without adequate supervision was not getting the best results.

Mayor Elisha Large Thursday expressed himself as deeply interested in the proposal and pledged his cooperation in efforts to work out a suitable solution.

Chief of Police Carl F. Bergman, who contacts most of the juvenile cases handled here, stated that he was prepared to recommend that the city police budget for the coming year provide for a substantial sum to be used in curbing juvenile delinquency.

Twenty-seven Eugene boys and 11 Eugene girls have been committed to various detention homes about the state in the past 18 months, according to figures compiled by District Attorney W. H. Brooke and Chief Bergman. In the same period, 12 have been given paroles and seven taken through the process of hearings before Judge Fisk without formal complaint being made against them.

Commitments and paroles are the only cases of which there is record, the policy of the officers having been to do everything possible to protect boys and girls in trying to draw them away from following up their first missteps. Chief Bergman estimates that he has handled at least 75 cases since January, 1933, without any record being made. In addition, cases have been handled directly by the sheriff's office, state police, constable and various peace officers through the county.

The 38 commitments, 12 paroles, seven hearings, plus the cases handled entirely by Chief Bergman, make a total of over 130 for Eugene, which with one-third of the population of Lane county, is estimated to have 80 per cent of the total number of juvenile delinquency cases in the county.

Inability to follow up on cases of juvenile delinquency is agreed on by all officers concerned as the chief

cause of the problem. It is more of a social problem than one for police work. First offenders are lectured and sent home with the officers hoping that they will not repeat the offense. Commitment to an institution is reserved for those who offend repeatedly or are involved in more serious violations.

Conditions in the home are said to be the chief causes of delinquency. The rate is higher in the city than in the country because city children have more leisure time. More cases occur in summer than in winter when school takes up the children's time.

The trained worker as a probation officer would maintain contact with the young offenders, studying factors leading to the violation, making recommendations as to disposal of the case and endeavoring to keep the child out of future trouble.

To aid the probation officer, there would be a board of examiners composed of a representative of the court, a trained social worker, a psychologist, the district attorney, and a representative of the public schools. Further, there would be an advisory

board representative of the service clubs, the churches, school board, the press, police department and county officers.

San Franciscan Buys Farm On Wolf Creek

James Allen, a retired streetcar man from San Francisco, has purchased a 45-acre farm from Sam Long at Panther, on Wolf creek, 21 miles southwest of Eugene, and has taken possession. The deal was made through the Hyde Realty company and F. I. Kinney's farm catalog.

Twenty-five acres of this farm are cleared and the rest is pasture and timber land. The place is under irrigation with a dam already built and ditches installed. This was the first of several farms examined by Mr. Allen upon his arrival here. He is now improving the buildings on the farm and preparing to occupy them.

Two of his friends arrived in Eugene from San Francisco Wednesday and they, also, may buy land in this county.

Two Injured Men In Hospital Here

Two accident cases were brought into the Pacific hospital late Wednesday night.

William Harold Hill, route 2, Eugene, was severely injured when his car ran into the approaches of a small bridge about a mile south of Hayden. He is pretty badly bruised and may have a broken leg, although attending doctors were making more thorough examination on Thursday.

P. F. Lesh, transient, fell from a Southern Pacific train, receiving cuts about the face and hands. He is also at the Pacific hospital.
