COTTAGE GROVE, Aug. 16.—(Special).—Mrs. Mella Currin, last member of a prominent pioneer family of Cottage Grove, died at her home in Cottage Grove on South River road, Wednesday morning about 11 o'clock, following an illness of a few weeks.
Mrs. Currin was born in Trenton, Mo., Jan. 3, 1855 and was the daughter of Joseph D. and Mary Ellen Perkins. The family crossed the plains in a wagon train in 1864. Mr. Perkins was captain of the train. They located at Baker and came to Eugene in 1897 and to Cottage Grove the same year.
Mrs. Currin taught school in the early days at Latham and was married to J. P. Currin in Cottage Grove March 25, 1875. They resided six years at Creswell after which they returned to Cottage Grove and made their home on South River road. Three children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Currin, Hugh of Eugene and Mels and

and fill shells with stuffing. Cover the top of the stuffing with bread crumbs moistened with melted butter. Bake about one-half hour. Have a little water in bottom of pan.
Stuffing: One-half or three-fourths cupful of bread crumbs and the pulp of six tomatoes, one tablespoonful of chopped cold meat, one tablespoonful of chopped parsley, a little onion juice, salt, pepper and a teaspoonful of melted butter. If not moistened enough, add enough soup stock to make wet.—Catherine Kahler, Goshen
Cheese Peppers
Remove seeds from pepper halves. Boil 5 or 10 minutes. Have ground fresh cheese, season with salt, pepper and mustard. Pack into peppers and bake. Cheese should be hot but not melted.
Peppers may also be stuffed with left-over cooked rice combined with cold minced ham and mushrooms and onion sautéed in butter. Or use left-over corn combined with chopped celery, parsley and onion. Dot with butter and bake.—Mrs. A. I. Klimas, Rt. 2, Eugene.
Treasure Ship Salad
Halve, peel and scoop out three medium sized cucumbers. Salt and pepper to drain in the refrigerator. Prepare half a package of lemon Jello. Add 2 cloves of garlic and set to cool. Put into a bowl 1/2 cup grated cheese, (the new bricks with 3 kinds of cheese is good for this), 1 grated carrot, 1/2 cup finely chopped cabbage and a small amount of finely diced onion, green pepper and sweet pickle. Salt.
When Jello is cool, remove garlic and pour over vegetable mixture. Mix and fill cucumber halves and set away to harden.
At serving time, set in an "ocean" of lettuce crested with mayonnaise "foam" and insert small "sails" into the Jello made of this slices of crisp white turnips. Small anchors can be carved out of cheese if you wish.—Mrs. H. C. Griffin, Route 1, Eugene.
