

MOTHER ROOSEVELT BRINGS HOME SUIT FOR SON FRANKLIN

NEW YORK, Aug. 16.—(AP)—With a bolt of tweed for her "boy, Franklin," Mrs. Sara Delano Roosevelt, mother of the president, returned today from a two months' trip to Europe. "I want him to make it up into a suit," she said as the liner Ile de France came up the bay. "I bought it in Scotland and it's a bargain. It cost just five pounds, but it's splendid tweed."

She also brought her son first-hand news that "England and France are strong for him."

"That's why they made such a fuss over me," she chuckled.

Did she know she had been hailed as "the greatest hit in Paris since Lindbergh" and "the most effective good-will ambassador this country has sent to Great Britain?"

"My, my! Did the papers say that?" the president's mother asked. "It takes the newspapers to say nice things."

The radiant 78-year-old lady received reporters in her stateroom.

"I'm in fine health and have had a good rest," she began, after finding seats for several. "I've said everything else already."

"You see, I was traveling as a private citizen. I went mainly to be with my nephew and niece, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Fawcett Gordon, in Aberdeen, Scotland, and my sister, Mrs. Dora Delano Forbes, in Paris."

Asked about her chat with Queen Mary over the tennepus at Buckingham palace, she said, "Oh, we didn't talk about anything special. The king, of course, asked about Franklin. My son met him years ago."

"It was nice at the palace because we three were alone—much nicer than if I had to go with a crowd."

She planned to go at once to Hyde Park and get the house ready for President Roosevelt's coming.

"He hopes to arrive August 25," she said. "But I'm hoping he'll make it sooner."

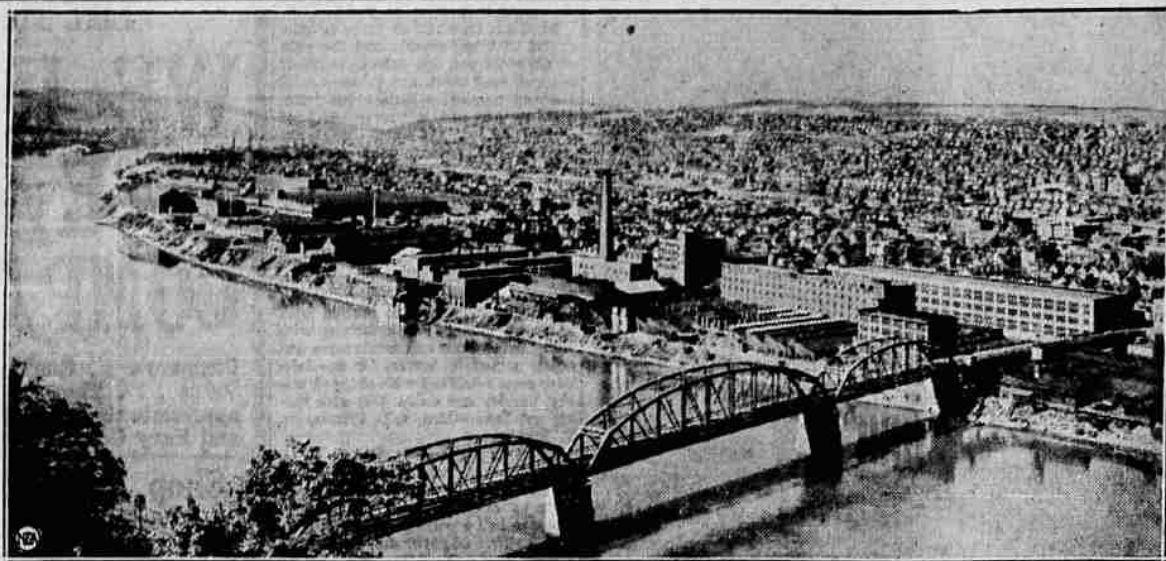

Harrisburg Needs New Fire Equipment

HARRISBURG, Aug. 16.—(Special)—Because of the Mills fire a few days ago, the need of new fire equipment for Harrisburg was shown. The south part of town was in danger for a while. The fire truck is an old one and makes only 20 miles an hour and there is danger that the pump will quit some day if the pressure on the mains is low.

For two years the town council has been putting a small sum in the budget for fire equipment and another fund is said to be available which makes the total \$1000.
