Mrs. Stouffer was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Shirley and was born at Carrollton, Missouri, Nov. 18, 1845. She was the last surviving member of a family of eight. She was married to J. C. Stouffer Nov. 11, 1866, at Mandeville, Mo. In 1872 they moved to near New Orleans and thence to Reno, Nev., in 1878. In 1878 they came to Oregon and located at Latham before Cottage Grove had a postoffice.

Two children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Stouffer in Missouri. Mrs. Jennie Schellbrede who died at Redlands, Cal., in 1912 and Mrs. Clara Burkholder of Cottage Grove who survives. California Prune Code Is Approved
WASHINGTON, Aug. 17.—(AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace today approved a marketing agreement and license for California dried prunes, effective at once.

The agreement limits the quantity of prunes which handlers may buy directly from growers and provides for adjustment of the total supply available for shipment during the marketing war.

Handlers will be required to grade all prunes received from growers. All the world's flowers are descended from the simple little buttercup, according to many famous botanists.

stake, Mott pointed out, being that the board doubted the economic feasibility at the present time. Contingent approval of Secretary of Interior Ickes was granted to an amendment introduced by Mr. Mott to the original O. and C. land grant bill which would permit the government to advance money to the full extent due to the counties affected, then charging this against the fund, the government being reimbursed when the actual sale of timbers is transacted. The present method works a great hardship on the counties, Congressman Mott pointed out, as the funds are gradually diminishing through the policy of the government not to sell timber on the public domain. Under the present system the counties receive allotments contingent to the amount in the fund. Lane county is greatly affected by this, Mott said.

The passage of this bill, Mott states, is one of the great objects of his for local legislation.

Farm Problems Discussed
Farm legislation in the last session was described by Mr. Mott and the legislative tactic adopted by the administration to keep the Frasier Farm Mortgage Refinancing bill from coming to a vote. He announced that a large block was gathering of both conservatives and liberal republicans and democrats to force the passage of this bill next session, along with the Swank-Thomas Cost of Production bill, both of which are highly advantageous to the farmer.

The work of the state department of agriculture in securing uniform system of packing and marketing was described by Charles R. Coe, chief of the plant industry division of this department. The benefits to the grower of standardization were outlined by Mr. Coe.

Wendell Bartholomew, Springfield farmer, and William James, Eugene distributor, spoke briefly on the resultant benefits of standardization.

The September meeting of the County Chamber of Commerce will be held in Eugene, announced O. E. Crowe, president.

A large turnout of Eugene, Springfield, Oakridge, Junction City people and several from other places was at this meeting to hear Congressman Mott.

Interior Wilhelm Frick decreed that polls should remain open an hour longer than usual.

Holland today prepared to seize German credits to satisfy claims. Its move was motivated rather by a determination to obtain money due its exporters than to satisfy bondholders. The Hitler government was frankly worried, for the emphy of the financially powerful Dutch neighbor would seriously affect the currency situation.

Crop Failure Is Serious
Crop failure has added to an economic crisis precipitated first by world trade decline and secondly by a trade boycott because of Nazi anti-Semitism. The drop in exports made it impossible to transfer money abroad to satisfy debt holders or buy raw materials.

Curtailment of raw material purchases reached a stage today where women in all stages of life were appealed to dress simpler in order to conserve textile materials.

A brief government order gave evidence of the food situation. Distilleries were forbidden to use potatoes until Sept. 1. Minimum prices were decreed and it was ordered that every larger sale of potatoes must be by written contract to be submitted to the government.
