Coast Bridge Work Soon at Its Height

Within ten days several hundred men will be at work on the big bridges on the Oregon Coast highway, according to J. M. Devers, attorney for the state highway department, who was in Eugene Wednesday, accompanied by Mrs. Devers.

When work is under full sway there will be 1500 men at work on the five bridges, 700 of whom will be engaged in actual construction and the rest of them will be engaged in getting out piling and in handling gravel, Mr. Devers said. This number of men will be employed for two years.

Construction having started on the Alsea bridge at Waldport, sooner than on the other bridges, the faster work on that span has been completed clear across the river and work of pouring concrete for the piers has started.
