

RAINEY RECEIVES FUNERAL TRIBUTE

CARROLLTON, Ill., Aug. 22.—(U.P.)—Leaders of nation and state joined 2000 Carrollton residents today in final, neighborly tribute to the late Henry T. Rainey, distinguished native son.

As speaker of the house of representatives, the picturesque Rainey was an outstanding figure in the battle for national recovery, and at the head of those who came to mourn his passing was his chief, President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

Those who came to pay him homage found Carrollton in mourning. Business houses were closed. Public buildings were draped in black. Flags were at half-mast. Neighbors conversed respectfully about his long career, about his nearly 30 years in congress, where he was dean of the house.

Mr. Roosevelt, after previous plans to establish his summer White House at Hyde Park, N. Y., later in the week, left Washington at 6 p. m. last night to be here for the funeral, scheduled for 4 p. m. He left for the east immediately after the services.

Final rites are to be held on the spacious grounds of "Walnut Hill," the Rainey summer estate beyond the town limits. Carrollton's Episcopal church, whose service will be used, was tendered for the funeral but was found too small to accommodate those who wished to attend.

After services at the home, the body was borne to the family plot, beside the graves of the late speaker's father and mother.

Roy Devaney to Open Thursday In Eugene

As a good-will gesture, Mr. Devaney, who is also an accomplished dancer, will give free tap-dancing lessons to the young people of Eugene starting next week. Registration will be at Rich's Gardens.

The well-known organist has appeared in Australia, which he toured successfully and he has been appearing at Jantzen Beach this summer.

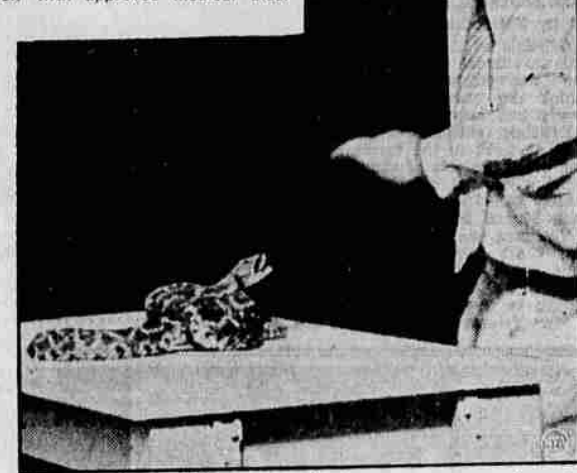

Staging the demonstration as warning that the great majority of rattlesnake bites will result fatally unless given proper treatment, Woolems cured himself with approved medical aids.



A warning to "credulous persons" who may scorn services of a physician after a rattlesnake bite, relying on faith alone for a cure, was given in heroic fashion by Willis Woolems, San Antonio, Tex., reptile garden curator, who, as pictured here, allowed a rattlesnake to bite him, then showed a horrified crowd the approved medical treatment for extracting the poison. Most cases will result fatally, Woolems declared, unless prompt treatment is given.

20-MILL LIMITATION SUBJECT FOR LIONS

C. L. Kelly, professor of business administration at the University of Oregon, addressed the Lions club at its meeting, Wednesday noon, on the proposed 20-mill tax limitation amendment to be voted upon in the November election.

As he told another service group a week ago, Mr. Kelly told the Lions also that the measure was not the solution to Oregon's tax problem. He told the club something of the arguments for both sides regarding the measure but showed that there were no benefits from such a limitation, since the property owners, whom the law would relieve supposedly, would have to pay in the long run.

Public services would be demanded the same, such as fire and police protection, roads, etc., and to get them the governmental units would have to borrow money. They would have to borrow because one of the weaknesses of the proposed measure is to curtail income but not expenditures. Interest would mount on the sums borrowed, and the indebtedness would have to be paid off some time with result the property owner would have to pay eventually.

Real estate is overburdened, he said, quoting figures to show that real estate carries 75 per cent of the tax burden, yet in actual value in relation to the wealth of the state is 50 per cent.

As in his other talk, he cited figures to show that Lane county would receive only \$90,000 under such a ruling after its compulsory payments had been made. The \$90,000 would be all there would be left to meet all county expenses and operations and the old rate pension would take \$50,000 of this sum.

He quoted experiences of other states which have similar measures and reported that none of their schools had run the full term, many of them only two months, and in many cases police and fire protection and similar public services were practically cut off.

Prof. N. H. Comish, first vice-president of the club, presided at the meeting. Wayne Akers led the club singing.

Bonneville Locks Work Gets Underway

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 23.—(P)—No time is being lost in enlarging the Bonneville dam lock excavation to proportions suitable for sea vessels.
